As we come to the end of 2011, I would first like to personally THANK each and every employee of the Village of Liberty for their dedication and professionalism this past year. Given the present state of not only our local economy, but our national economy you all have done your best to keep us moving forward.

I am pleased to report that despite all the negative feedback we encountered with the elimination of our court this past year, we are no longer losing money. In fact, we are actually seeing positive revenue from the town court and have had no real issues with the transformation.

I would also like to let you know that while we weren't able to pave as many roads this year that we would have liked to, the ones that we did get to were done the right way, for a change. By this statement, I mean that I wanted to be sure that the proper drainage was installed prior to the paving so we won't have to repave them every year due to frost damage.

The work on our sewer main near Green Lane is almost complete. Completion of this project will save the Village the cost of running another pump station by returning the flow there back to gravity.

We are trying to find funding to be able to deal with a DEC (Department of Conservation) compliance issue with the Griebel Park Dam. We must either repair it or remove it or face huge fines. (Is this another unfunded mandate?).


Work continues on bringing our sewer plant back to its proper operating levels. Hopefully, the Red Meat project is getting closer to a reality. The timber harvesting at the Water Department property is under way that enabled us to purchase a couple of new trucks and pay for the engineering for a new reservoir without having to increase rates.

I want to take a moment to say a special THANKS to Don

Nichols who is stepping down from our Planning board after more than forty years of service of which he spent a majority of that time as the Chairman. He will be missed but we wish him well in his future endeavors.

I would also like to thank the business folks on main street that continue to work very hard to keep our main street looking great and what seems to me a renewal of the sense of community that has been missing for a while downtown. THANK YOU.

Sewer Department News

There has been a lot of repairs and updating going on in our Sewer Department.

The Green Lane sewer main has been repaired. The repairs have allowed us to eliminate the temporary pump station that had been set up.

The pump station on Sullivan Avenue at the Days Inn has been upgraded.

An emergency water line repair has been completed.

There are plans for Winter and Spring upgrades on the head-works and oxidation ditches at the Sewer Plant. The new equipment being used for the upgrades promises to be more energy efficient.

Winter Etiquette

Please remember to keep dumpsters and garbage pick up areas free from snow and ice. The Sanitation workers need to be able to access your dumpsters. Keep the area shoveled and sanded or salted. Make sure the wheels and lids are in good repair.

Business owners are responsible for the sidewalk in front of their business. Sidewalks must be kept cleared of snow and ice free. When there is a snow storm, sidewalk need to be shoveled and salt or sand put down within four hours after the snow stops.

As of December 1st, there will be no parking on Village streets from 3:00 a.m. until 7:00 a.m. This is to allow the plows to clear the street faster and with less obstacles to plow around.

From Our Police Department

The Village of Liberty Police department would like to wish residents a safe and happy holiday season. If any village homeowners plan on vacationing or weathering the winter by heading south please call or stop by the Police Station so your home can be placed on our house check list. By placing your home on our house check list, Police Officers know you are away and vigilantly check your home for signs of suspicious activity and break- ins. If a problem is found, you or someone you designate will be notified immediately.

This past summer and into the fall of this year the gang problems plaguing Monticello has overflowed and has become a problem in the Village of Liberty. This problem led to a driveby shooting in the Carrier Street area and several Felony Assaults with weapons in the Orchard Street area. All of these occurrences were investigated by the Police Department and arrests were made.

In June of 2011 the Liberty Police teamed up with the United States Marshall's Sex Offender Task Force and did surprise home visits of over 30 sex offenders in our jurisdiction. One sex offender was arrested for Possession of Child Pornography and Failure to Register Internet usage with the Police Department.

In October 2011 the North Main Street Mobil gas station collapsed during construction trapping two workers in the debris. Two Police Officers and an Off Duty Sergeant responded to the incident and provided assistance with medical care and extrication of the workers. Both workers are alive today thanks to all of the emergency services that responded that day. The Village had a safe Halloween night with no major incidents reported.



Everything that you wanted to know about the Sullivan County Soap Box Derby, but didn't know who to ask...

With a name as American as apple pie, the Soap Box Derby is a 76 year old tradition that's fun for children and adults alike. It's been years since a Derby was held in Sullivan County, and the village will be holding its inaugural race in the late spring of 2012. Interested in learning more details? Purchasing a car? Getting involved? Read on!

The Sullivan County Soap Box Derby, scheduled to be held in Liberty on Sunday, May 27 (the Sunday of the three-day Memorial Day weekend), is expected to attract hundreds of people from across the entire Catskill/Hudson Valley region; the race in Port Jervis was the largest in the United States in the 2010-2011 racing season and drew thousands of spectators. Dale and Carol VanDenberg, co-founders of the all-volunteer race committee, saw an opportunity to add an extra spark to our alreadyvibrant community!

The 2012 Derby will feature two divisions of racers – Stock (ages 7 - 13) and Super Stock (ages 10 - 17). All cars and wheels need to be approved according to guidelines specified by the All American Soap Box Derby, and an official scale will be used the day of the race to make sure that the racecar/driver are within the weight limits proscribed by the Derby.

Drivers will be selected by the owners/sponsors of each car and the winning racer from each division will be sent by the Sullivan County Soap Box Derby to Akron, Ohio, to compete in the international competition.

If ordered before the end of 2011, shipping and handling on the cars (from Ohio) will be waived, and racecars make excellent holiday presents! In early 2012, the Board of Directors of the Sullivan County Soap Box Derby will arrange a construction clinic with representatives of the Ohio-based headquarters and master technicians and mechanics on-hand to answer questions. In the meantime, if you are interested in volunteering or purchasing a car, please contact the Sullivan County Soap Box Derby!
