The Reverend's Ruminations - July 2023

Greetings in the name of Christ our Savior! I pray that this finds you adjusting to, and even enjoying, the heat and longer days of mid-summer in Southern Minnesota. For some of you, those extra daylight hours mean a little more unstructured time in the daily schedule. Perhaps you like to work in the yard or garden during the coolness of the early morning and stay indoors midday when it gets hot? Maybe your duties take you poolside for a few hours in the afternoon while the kids or grandkids splash around, or you're waiting patiently for a baseball or softball practice to get over. What helps occupy your personal time? What's on your summer reading list? Perhaps the reigning international best-seller?

The Bible can be a huge challenge to read if you attempt it from cover to cover, but perhaps your summer reading goal could be to examine a few small sections that follow our Sunday morning lectionary readings. July's epistle readings will again come from one of the Apostle Paul's most well-known letters: Romans. During the last three weeks of June, we read from chapters 4–6, and July will continue with another brief selection from chapter 6 before continuing with passages from chapters 7 and 8. Along the way, Paul wrestles with some of the same deep struggles we all share: turning toward righteousness and away from the temptations of sin; separating good and evil in our thoughts and actions; and overcoming weakness through the power of the Holy Spirit so that we cannot be separated from God's love.

July's gospel readings from Matthew will begin with chapter 10's encouragement toward extravagant welcome and continue with Jesus' familiar assurance that all who are "weary and carrying heavy burdens" can yoke ourselves to him and find not only rest, but encouragement and training. The last three weeks of July will include several familiar parables from chapter 13, and Jesus' explanation of their significance for our lives and the ministry of the church.

As we continue our sermon journey through the origins of our faith in the book of Genesis, chapters 22, 24, and 25 will guide us from Isaac's early life (and near-sacrifice at the hands of faithful Abraham), through the search for a suitable wife, and to the birth of his sons Esau and Jacob. Chapters 28 and 29 will then refresh our understanding of Jacob's famous dream about a ladder reaching from earth to heaven, as well has his long service to his kinsman, Laban, in return for the hand of both Leah and Rachel in marriage. Societal and religious customs were obviously much different in the culture of those early days, but there are still many lessons to be explored from the context of our modern era.

In response to some recent issues of inappropriate comments and conversations within our own church family, I would like to invite as many of you as possible to participate in a fourpart group study called *Divided We Stand: How to Love When We Disagree*. We will meet in the chapel at 7:00 pm on Wednesdays, July 5 and 12, and schedule the two remaining sessions with those in attendance. Unfortunately, we do live in divided times. The tension of disagreement can be felt at dinner tables, in board rooms, at church gatherings, and in our communities. It can be hard to know how to engage with each other when the gap between us feels like it's widening. As a church family, we must be part of the solution instead of feeding the problem. Let's work together to be Christ's light in our world!

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. The meeting was called to order by Moderator Abigail Anderson. Pastor Cory led in prayer. Motion to approve the minutes from the May 17th meeting was M/S/C (Larry/Erica).

Treasurer's Report: Catherine reported that after five months, we have 40% of pledged giving received. We received a gift from the Don and Dorothy Simpson estate of \$3500 and received \$1000 from the Hy-Vee fundraiser.

Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of 18 June 2023

During the last four weeks, \$8,510.57 (4.26%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 25 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$101,280.36 (50.64%) toward the 16th goal which is now \$200,000. We have been getting to the \$150,000 goal in about 44 weeks and the new \$200,000 will take almost 60 weeks.

During the same time, \$1,273.46 (0.85%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 11 weeks, Fareway is at \$13,262.33 (8.84%) toward our 5th \$150,000 goal.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house. Even the very small amounts help.
