



Mt 21:28-32

Dear St. Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Matthew 21:28 Jesus starts a parable today saying, "A man had two sons...". Likely, those first words make our minds jump to the popular 'Prodigal Son' parable (Prodigal Brother and Older Brother). But, this is a different parable here in Matthew. That more popular Prodigal Son story is found only in Luke's gospel (chapter 15). It runs on to a lengthy 22 verses, whereas this 'Two Sons' parable of Matthew today is only 4 verses long. A good question to ask is whether they teach a similar lesson. The Prodigal son story explores how we are to live Christ's love amid the complex history of family dynamics and sibling rivalry. But Matthew's short parable today is very straightforward. Two sons react to their Father's command to go work in the vineyard. 1) One son bluntly defies his dad, saying 'No I won't', and the 2) other halfheartedly says 'Yes, I'm going'. However, they both turn out to do the opposite of what they said. In the end, the initial 'Yes-Man' turns out to be a deadbeat slacker, and the initially rebellious son turns out to be the faithful good worker. So, the point of it all? We have to wait and see. Really, one lesson of the parable is the same thing that people mean when they say, "the proof is in the pudding!" We wait until the pudding sets up, and the final proof is in the tasting of it. What counts is what happens in the end—who shows up! I think Jesus taught this summary moral lesson of the parable earlier in the gospel of Matthew when he said, "By their fruits, you will know them" (7:16). Jesus consistently calls for integrity in our lives between our words spoken and our actions taken so that our conduct matches what we confess. Just a couple of chapters later in this same gospel, Jesus repeats this lesson again when he calls out the Pharisees & scribes who were accustomed to talk a good talk, but not walk a thing. They are only words. In Matt 23:2-3, He says, "The scribes and the Pharisees have taken their seat on the chair of Moses. Therefore, do and observe all things whatsoever they tell you, but do not follow their example. For they preach but they do not practice." Those Pharisees know what to say, like 'Yes, I will serve', but they just go on and do whatever they want, disregarding God's will. So Jesus says, "Okay, do what they say; just don't do anything they do!" That is a major indictment of the leading teachers of religion in His time.

We can be for sure that Jesus is calling out these religious leaders, because the whole conversation leading to the parable began when Jesus was confronted by the 'chief priests and elders of the people' (Matthew 21:23). They were the authority on religious matters, and claimed the power to teach/lead all the services in the Temple. So, to get back to the parable, we ask ourselves, "Which son did the Will of the Father?" It was the one who got the work done, regardless of what he said. The real stinger in this confrontation from Jesus comes when He tells the selfrighteous priests and elders, 'Tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the Kingdom of God before you' (Matt 21:31). So, the true measure that leads us to the kingdom or not, is what we practice not what we proclaim. We may fool people by what we say, but what we do, proves what we profess. Those 'chief priests and elders' are not as 'obedient to God' as they say they are! Probably none of us are surprised to hear that human leaders tend to be more mouth than movement, when it comes to getting things done. An old popular radio show personality always used to say, "Words mean things" (he has his own fall-from-grace story!) And absolutely, it is true that words do mean things, but it is actions that prove them!

I love Matthew's conversion story and can't help but think that Jesus' comment about 'tax collectors and prostitutes' entering the kingdom of God ahead of the priests, meant a lot to Matthew's heart. Recall that the initially rebellious son changes and converts. He realizes his disrespect shown to the Father by defying him. Matthew can say, "Been there; done that". As a young upstart, Matthew looked to make riches in the tax business doing his own thing, cheating others and ignoring his religious upbringing (defying God). Maybe things changed for him when he realized the hurt he caused people by his greedy extortions. So, he converts and leaves behind his tax collecting trade and follows Jesus (Matthew 9:9). He had initially said 'No' to God, but in fact he comes around and ends up serving God more faithfully than the chief priests! Those 'chief priests and elders' claimed to say 'Yes' to God, but may in fact be denying God as they selfishly doing their own thing. Like the last being first and first being last (Matt 20:16), this parable humbles us all to say less and do more!

#### Another Saint in a Time of Plague: St. Juliana Falconieri, (born 1270 died 6-19-1341)

St. Juliana Falconieri for this week's saint is a unique selection, because she is the patron saint of people with long-suffering sicknesses. While some people only endure short term mild symptoms of COVID 19, some others are turning out to have longer term recurring symptoms that continue to surface intermittently. St. Juliana was a Servite religious sister dedicated to giving care and staying by those with chronic or recurring illnesses. She never gave up offering care to the sick. Also, since she is a little known saint, who dedicated her life to sick people who otherwise would be overlooked or forgotten due to their chronic pain and suffering, she has much to offer us about keeping aware of those who may be suffering outside of public view.

Juliana was born into the prestigious and wealthy Falconieri family of Florence. She had an uncle, St. Alexis Falconieri, who was as one of the seven founders of the Servite Order. She was so moved by his holiness and his love of serving God, that she decided young to follow his life's example in a religious order, too. Her father may have opposed this calling of hers, because it was not until her father died (circa 1285 AD) that she entered the Third Order of the Servites. While her mother was still alive, St. Juliana did wear the Servite habit and performed their works of mercy, but she still lived at home and watched over her mother too. When her mother passed in 1305, she and several companions moved into a common house (convent) to live and work together. This was the first community of Servite Sisters, and St. Juliana would be the superior until her own death. The sisters devoted their days to working in hospitals tending to the wounds of the sick, washing their clothes and linens and serving them as they endured their protracted illnesses. The sisters were described by the people as "Mantellate", because of the different style of their habit. They wore a black gown and a white veil, but the gown only had three quarter or half-length sleeves. People thought the outer layer was only a 'mantle' laying over them because the sisters readily jumped into work and wanted their clothing to have no sleeves to constrict their movements.

About her uncle Alexis Falconieri, he along with Amadeus of the Amidei, Hugh dei Lippi Uggucioni, Benedetto dell' Antella, Gherardino di Sostegno, Buonfiglio dei Monaldi, and Giovanni di Buonagiunta founded the Order of the Servites (I know why they just refer to the whole group together as the Seven Founders!). They all share one feast day of February 17, under the title of 'The Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order'. Her uncle St Alexis was known for his great humility, spending long hours seeking alms to provide medicine and food aid for the sick. Though he was approached many times to be ordained a priest, he always refused and fled from the person requesting him to be ordained. He claimed he was unworthy and that priesthood would keep him from living among the poor. It is easy to understand how he influenced his niece to follow Christ and serve the church's poor in her consecrated life.

A miracle occurred to her as she was nearing death. Afflicted with stomach pain and non-stop vomiting for several days, she desired to receive Holy Communion and asked her pastor to set a host upon her chest so she could receive him into her heart. He placed a host upon a corporal on her chest and over the next few hours the host disappeared. She passed shortly afterward, and as her body was being washed and prepared for burial, a cross within a circle was found impressed upon her breast over her heart where the host had lain. In holy cards of her image or her statues, often the image of host is seen on the outside of her religious habit over her heart to signify this miraculous Holy Communion. She is certainly a fitting patron saint of the chronically ill, and supports the need to faithfully minster to people even in usual and in novel ways when necessary to comfort and provide them sacraments. St. Juliana Falconieri, pray for us.
