

You see, Chuck had a bad broken leg and ultimately lost that leg due to a botched operation over 25 years ago, but that never slowed him down! Today, he's one of our top hitters for both average and power and is a solid defender as well. He's also a key member of our super-competitive travel team that recently won the Triple Crown of Senior Softball.

A native of Palo Alto, California, Chuck grew up in San Mateo and San Carlos where he was a three-sport star at Carlmont High and Athlete of
