Welcome to Houghs Neck Congregational Church

When Houghs Neck Congregational Church gathers for worship every Sunday at 10:00 a.m., we feel profound gratitude for our community of faith. Our worship seeks to be uplifting and joyful; with the Choir singing beautiful music led by our gifted Choir Director and Organist, Steve Reed. It meets every Monday night from 7:00-8:30 p.m. Both groups meet in the Rev. M. Alicia Corea Fellowship Hall of Houghs Neck Congregational Church. Our congregation treasures this relationship and we give thanks for the many leaders who year after year give so much to serve the boys of our community.

This year we'll be there again at the Community Council's "Chowdafest" (September 10) hosting our bake sale to raise funds

for the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Program which supports the homeless children of the Quincy Public Schools. On September 30, our well-known "Lobster and Fish Dinner" will take place.On November 4&5, the Church's Fair will offer wonderful crafts, cakes, sugar and spices, bling, raffle prizes for children and adults, delicious foods, and much more. Other community events such as the Chili Cook-off, Princess Tea and the Strawberry Festival complete the year's programs. Houghs Neck Congregational

Church partners closely with Interfaith Social Services (ISS) throughout the year, collecting and delivering groceries to their Food Pantry each week, donating children's gifts at Christmas and Easter to support their many families in need. Church members including many children participate in the ISS Walk & Run each April to support their many programs.

The children of the Houghs Neck Congregational Church Sunday School have grown a substantial vegetable garden on church property for the past two years and all the produce is donated to the ISS

Over the summer, the City has been doing sewer rehabilitation along Sea Street, with many vehicle detours near the Willows. We anticipate this project being completed in the next two weeks. The City has been utilizing low interest MWRA loans and grants to improve our water and sewer infrastructure and Ward One has been the beneficiary of many of the projects.

I will be hosting a community meeting on Thursday, September 22, 2016 at 6:30pm, at the Houghs Neck Maritime Center, 137 Bay View Avenue, to review and discuss a proposal from K&R Auto Body, 1200 Sea Street to increase their hours of operation, increase the number of vehicles allowed and update their business license to include towing, on street loading and offloading to allow for delivery of parts and supplies, and permission to display a sign on the property that is seen from both sides of Sea Street. Located in a Business B zone, an automotive use has operated at this address for decades. The applicant has requested an opportunity to present his proposal to the neighbors before submitting to the License Board for approval. The Business Owner, Brandon Bergstrom, who grew up and lives in Houghs Neck, took over the business from his father Ken and partner Ray Mitchell. He has worked to improve the conditions of the property and wants to bring this successful business to the next level while being respectful of the Residence A zone his business abuts. The City has received complaints regarding work occurring after hours and tow truck parking. Brandon has acknowledged and been responsive to these matters. The community meeting is the first step in the process. This proposal requires

approval from the Licensing Board and is scheduled for hearing on Tuesday, September 27, 2016 at 4:00pm at Old City Hall, 1305 Hancock Street, First Floor Meeting Room. This is a public hearing and anyone can attend to express their support or opposition to the proposal. If you cannot attend the meeting, you can send a letter by mail to the City Clerk, Nicole Crispo, 1305 Hancock Street, Quincy, MA 02169 or by email ncrispo@quincyma.gov

Chronic blighted properties is an issue that I have spent a lot of time working on with our Inspectional Services Department. It's unfortunate that owners neglect their properties and are a detriment to the entire neighborhood. Fines have been issued, some are in the court system (foreclosures, estate issues, etc). We have even brought the Attorney General's Office to visit the worst properties in the city as they have the authority to take them into receivership. In Houghs Neck, the Attorney General's Office has taken interest in 54 Spring Street and 45 Shennen Street. 54 Spring was sold two years ago and the owner knew the blighted conditions when purchasing, yet barely mows the lawn and has shown no progress. A few houses on that block are under construction and this eyesore has had a negative impact on all who live near it as it's been in dilapidated condition for 10+ years. 45 Shennen Street bought the property two years ago and while the property was blighted, the new owner submitted plans to the Zoning Board of Appeals and were granted a variance to tear down and construct two new homes on the lot. However, the owner did not act on the variance and it has expired. They have refiled for Zoning

Approval. I have advised the owner, Zoning Chairman Marty Aikens, and Inspectional Services director Duca, that I am opposed to the variance without a sign of good faith in having the current structure demolished. This case has been continued all summer. I met with the owner, his architect and realtor, and finally they have moved the lawn, the utilities are being disconnected and demolition is supposedly imminent. The next zoning board meeting is Tuesday, September 13th at 7:15pm in the first floor meeting room of Old City Hall. As of now, we are uncertain if this matter will be heard or it will be continued.

The Maritime Center project was awarded another grant of \$225,000. This funding is for engineering, design, and permitting for a new building. We have not yet begun this phase of the project but will be reaching out to stakeholder groups this fall to get an understanding of what the community needs and wants for utilization in this public building. We have filed the necessary permitting for the boat ramp. We expect the agencies reviewing the permits to take a few months before granting. Once the permit phase is complete, the boat ramp construction will be put out to bid, most likely in the winter/early spring. When we have a construction contract, I will have a community meeting specific to boat ramp construction so everyone understands what to expect. We anticipate construction occurring in the spring of 2017 and the new ramp open for boating season in May 2017. I look forward to seeing everyone at the Chowdafest. It's community events and the efforts of the Houghs Neck Community Council that contribute to Houghs Neck being such a great place to live. I hope the good weather continues so I can get a few more days out on the water. Best regards,

I hope you had a safe and enjoyable Labor Day weekend. August is a slow month in the Legislature with less than a dozen public hearings and executive sessions by legislative committees. In July, I received well past a thousand individual emails, United States postal service mailings, social media messages, and phone calls from constituents supporting or opposing legislation. This does not include the many organizations advocating their positions andother constituent service requests. Even now, I am averaging 50 emails daily, including on weekends, from many different organizations. If you have a constituent service issue, especially a time sensitive one, please send an email and telephone my office. Also, please do not include sensitive information over email such as social security numbers, bank accounts, or insurance company accounts, unless my office requests it. Like all government agencies, the state is on the receiving end of regular

to my office. The Governor signed into law several major pieces of legislation that will impact many of us. The comprehensive energy procurement legislation will expand our energy portfolio to include more renewable The economic stimulus bill will promote greater business innovation in the state. Equal pay establishes a fair method to ensure that all persons regardless of gender are able to be compensated fairly for the same work. Transportation Network Companies, such as Uber

and Lyft, will be subject to state oversight and regulation. These laws were signed in August and will take months before they are implemented. I will provide a greater summary of each of these laws in the coming months, starting with the energy procurement legislation below.

Massachusetts is the largest consumer of electrical power in New England. We consume justunder 50% of all electricity that is generated or transported into New England. The Massachusetts population has grown at a rate of 3.8% over the last five years, and continues to increase. Pilgrim Nuclear Power Plant is planned to shut down in 2019, which represents approximately 8% of all Massachusetts generated electricity. At least two other Massachusetts electrical generators, one located in the northeast and the other in the southeast are contemplating shutting down sometime after 2020. Siting and developing a new natural gas facility that generates electricity in Massachusetts is extremely difficult.

Chapter 188 of the Acts of 2016 establishes are gulatory process where the Department of Public Utilities provides oversight for Massachusetts utility companies' purchase of 1,200 megawatts of hydroelectric power and 1,600 megawatts of wind generated electrical power. There is a competitive bidding process based on who has the lowest rate and who has the highest commitment to delivery to determine which hydroelectric and wind generator companies will provide power to the Commonwealth. There is a proposal to construct large scale windmills on Block Island off the cost of

Rhode Island, which if completed will be the first large offshore wind generation facility in the United States. If our timing is correct, new renewable electrical power will be available when other Massachusetts electrical generators shutdown. The legislation also regulates Property Accessed Clean Energy (PACE) programs and allows them to provide loans to property owners to make clean energy improvements. This same program was successfully implemented in California. law makes greater investment in our existing small hydroelectric facilities. It explores and fosters the development of new fuel cells as well aswaste to energy and anaerobic electric generation technologies. The Department of Energy Resources is required to establish policies to encourage the development of electrical energy storage technology. Currently, over \$800 million a year, funded by your electric bills, is spent on energy efficiency programs. We are leading the nation on energy efficiency programs, and this new legislation will increase our momentum in promoting renewable power sources.

Federal, State and County elections are this year. The primary date is Thursday, September 8th. This election cycle will be the first time Massachusetts will implement early voting. I met with the City Clerk, Nicole Crispo, to discuss the implementation process. Once the plan is finalized, the dates, times and locations will be made available to the public. The last day to register to vote for the November 8th election is on October 19th. 



MANETCurrently, health practitioners are paid to screen for blood pressure, cholesterol, or other risk factors individually. In testing a new approach, practitioners participating in the Million Hearts® Cardiovascular Disease Risk Reduction Model's intervention group will use a data-driven, widely accepted predictive modeling approach to generate personalized risk scores and develop specific plans in partnership with patients to reduce the risk of having a heart attack or stroke. Accepted applicants were randomly assigned to either the intervention or control group in accordance with the model's randomized control design.

"Our health care system historically often emphasized acute care over preventive care," said Dr. Patrick Conway, CMS Acting Principal Deputy Administrator and Chief Medical Officer. "This initiative will enhance patient-centered care and give practitioners the resources to invest the time and staff to address and manage patients who are at high risk for heart attacks and strokes."
