

And in response, they went away one by one, beginning with the elders. So he was left alone with the woman before him. Then Jesus straightened up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" She replied, "No one, sir." Then Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin any more."



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches.

5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Lent Year C John 8:1-11

Is Jesus 'finger-painting' in today's gospel? He is definitely not 'finger-pointing'! He is drawing on the ground. Now don't we all want to know the kind of picture he is drawing or what he is writing on the ground? He doesn't say, and no one is talking from the scene. So we just don't know! Maybe that is the idea! It is a normal reaction to suspiciously inquire when we are in the presence of someone (maybe a supervisor) and they are eagerly scribbling away on a pad of paper. We might ask, "What did I do? Is he writing me up? Do I want him to quote later on what I just said?" That would serve well this particular crowd around Jesus, because His greatest concern here is to confront and expose this mock courtroom drama. The mob has unjustly 'set-up' a woman. I imagine Jesus thinks, "Something is missing here". A fair hearing on adultery can't be conducted with only one defendant (last time I checked, adultery requires two persons- by definition there must be a partner in this crime!) So Jesus realizes that either the village bosses are setting her up to cover over their own past adulterous sins by eliminating her through stoning (maybe she was a one-time consort to them). Or maybe they are doing the dirty work of a local boss by taking out a 'threat' because the woman is now expecting a child with him (2 birds tragically aborted with one stone). Yet, whatever it turns out to be, Jesus wrote something on the ground that bothers the crowd enough for them all to walk away. His gesture certainly challenged them to review their own sin lists. Some people suggest that Jesus was writing names on the ground, or writing sins that they were guilty of on the ground. Or maybe even more convicting in their hearts, Jesus was putting the two together by drawing lines connecting names and sins! When Jesus authorizes that whoever is without sin can be the first to throw a stone, they all reconsider and slowly slip away. I bet that first person to walk off was the bravest- the first one to admit their own sinfulness, which includes the mob sin of 'bullying & trolling' committed right then! I suppose that the first person to walk away may have felt like they could have gotten a rock in their back at any minute. But, with Jesus on the scene, there will be no rocks thrown today.

I love how we see with Jesus in the gospels that there is always something peacefully disarming about His presence. His act of stooping down buys some time for the hyped –up crowd to de-escalate their stoked fury. Yet, there always seems to be something pacifying about Jesus' encounters with others. Consider His interaction with what must have been his 'forcibly arresting' soldier in the garden who provoked a sword strike back from one of Jesus' apostles, that sliced off his ear. Jesus takes a moment to cool inflamed nerves, and for wisdom to prevail. He says in Luke 22:51 "Stop, no more of this!" And then He adds, "Have you come out as against a robber, with swords and clubs? Day after day I was with you in the temple area, and you did not seize me; but this is your hour, the time for the power of darkness" (Luke 22:52-53) Jesus wants them to size up the situation for themselves, asking "Do you know what is going on here?-You arresting violently an innocent pacifist!" (He prevents an inevitably worsening bloody melee in the garden!) Jesus even goes on to touch the soldier's ear and heals him. That Jesus took a moment to touch the man who was unjustly seizing him. I can't imagine the deep and lasting impression that made upon him (perhaps he converts to Christ!) Yet, throughout Jesus' ministry he presents to people a consistently 'peaceful' sanctuary in His visits with them. I can think of the many tormented 'demon-possessed' individuals that sought peace from Him. Mark's gospel describes in detail the hellish symptoms (terrible convulsions, shrieks, and other self-injurious behavior) one boy suffers who no one could help before being brought to Jesus. Jesus wonderfully calms him, bringing peace to his soul that he could even sleep amid the crowd (Mark 9:18-27). Jesus brings us peace, like nothing the world can give (John 14:27).

Of course with this scene of Jesus' complete absolution of sin and call for such non-judgmental mercy, He is not giving total license to sin. Jesus also tells her, "Go and sin no more" (John 8:11). Having encountered the Mercy of God Himself, I trust that she afterward lives an exemplary moral life. She lives every day overwhelmed by the gratuitous mercy of God, freely offering such unconditional compassion toward others, loving them chastely out of sin. She may have even initiated a peer-to-peer mentoring program to help other women who may have found themselves in similarly abusive or exploitative relationships. In such a way, she would be letting the sins of her past be redeemed even further by such fruitful advocacy work for others. She would be following Christ, and announcing 'salvation in His name' to other abused women, helping lift them from lives in society's shadows (not only saving the exploited women but also dismantling the 'good ole boys' club by rescuing these poor girls out of their grasp). Yet, it is Jesus and Jesus alone who can bring such 'pacifying presence' to our world's suffering. He lifts us out of sin to receive new life with Him!
