THE STORY OF THE HYMN

atrick Brennan, who wrote the words of the hymn, was born at Carrowree Park in Rescommon in 1877. At the age of 17, he enrolled in the seminary course of St Patrick's College, Carlow. He then went to St Kieran's College, Kilkenny as a volunteer for the Australian Mission. After ordination in 1902, he went to Australia where his one-priest parishes often covered an area the size of the province of Connaught. After labouring like this for many years, he felt called to religious life and entered the Redemptorists. He was professed in 1915. After a few years preaching parish missions in Ireland, he was assigned to the new mission in the Philippines. He was now 42 years old, but he bravely set to learn the difficult Visayan language. Fr Brennan returned to Ireland for a break in 1926, his only visit home. It was during this time that he wrote 'Hail Redeemer, King Divine', in honour of the feast of Christ the King which had been instituted the year before. He spent the rest of his life between the Philippines and Australia. Patrick Brennen died on May 18, 1951 and wes buried in Perth. Another of his hymns 'O Help of Christians, Mother dear' was in honour of Our Lady, Help of Christians, patroness of Australia.

THE MEANING OF THE HYMN

ach verse of the hymn places the accent on a here i different aspect of the kingship of Christ. The opening verse praises him as king, priest and lamb of sacrifice. Much of the language is biblical, drawn in particular from the Book of Revelation:

"Hall Redeemer, King divine! Priest and Lamb, the throne is thine. King, whose raign shall never cease. Prince of everlasting peace."

The chorus after each verse invites the angels, saints and nations to join in praise of Christ the King of love.

- "Angels, saints and nations sing:
- praised be Jesus Christ our King: Lord of life, earth, sky and sea,
- King of love on Calvary!"

The second verse invites Christ the King to rule over us as individuals and over all creation as the prince of peace:

- "King, whose name creation thrilis,
- rule our hearts, our minds, our wills;
- till in peace, each nation rings
- with Thy praises, King of kings."
- The third verse calls on Christ as the guide of youth:
- "King most holy, King of truth,
- guard the lowly, guide the youth.
- Christ the King of glory bright,
- be to us eternal light."

One of the reasons for the new feast of Christ the King was to set it against other ideologies of the time, especially Communism and Pascism, that tried to make an appeal to young people.

The Kingship of Christ was proclaimed by the sign Pliate affixed to the Cross, "Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews". Our hynn makes the same claim:

- "Crimson streams, O King of grace, drenched thy thorn-crowned head and face;
- floods at love's redeeming tide
- tone thy hands, thy feet, Thy side."

Jesus, the King and Good Shepherd, continues to dwall with us through his presence in the Eucharist, his gift of love to his people:

- "Eucharistic King, what love
- draws thee daily from above,
- clad in signs of bread and wine:
- feed us, lead us, keep us thine?" ...

GOD'S WORD TODAY

Today's gospel takes another look at the call to discipleship. The arrest of John the Baptist is the prompt for Jesus to begin his own mission. Mark sums up Jesus' preaching in one short verse - "the time has come, repent and believe the Gospel". To carry out his plan, Jesus needs people to work alongside him. The first four he calls are fishermen, called while they are still practising their trade.

They are also two pairs of brothers. Simon and Andrew may perhaps have been poorer people than the Zebedee boys. Peter and Andrew, the sons of Jonah, do not appear to have a boat: they fish by casting their net into the lake and then drawing it in. The Sea of Galileo was one of the major sources of wealth in Palestine. Fish were caught both for home consumption and for preserving and export. The Zebiedee family have a fishing boat, as well as hired men who work alongside the family. Following a homeless prophet would entail a major change in lifestyle for these boys, yet they follow Jesus without hesitation.
