

Responsive Reading

February 3, 2019, Joshua 6:10-20 "The Walls Came Down"

Lead: Joshua had commanded the army, "Do not give a war cry, do not raise your voices, do not say a word until the day I tell you to shout. Then shout!" So he had the ark of the LORD carried around the city, circling it once. Then the army returned to camp and spent the night there.


Cong: Joshua got up early the next morning and the priests took up the ark of the LORD. The seven priests carrying the seven trumpets went forward, marching before the ark of the LORD and blowing the trumpets. The armed men went ahead of them and the rear guard followed the ark of the LORD, while the trumpets kept sounding.

Lead: So on the second day they marched around the city once and returned to the camp. They did this for six days. On the seventh day, they got up at daybreak and marched around the city seven times in the same manner, except that on that day they circled the city seven times.

Cong: The seventh time around, when the priests sounded the trumpet blast, Joshua commanded the army, "Shout! For the LORD has given you the city! The city and all that is in it are to be devoted to the LORD. Only Rahab the prostitute and all who are with her in her house shall be spared, because she hid the spies we sent.

Lead: But keep away from the devoted things, so that you will not bring about your own destruction by taking any of them. Otherwise you will make the camp of Israel liable to destruction and bring trouble on it. All the silver and gold and the articles of bronze and iron are sacred to the LORD and must go into his treasury."

Together: When the trumpets sounded, the army shouted, and at the sound of the trumpet, when the men gave a loud shout, the wall collapsed; so everyone charged straight in, and they took the city.

Responsive Reading

February 10, 2019, Psalm 91 "Dwelling With the Most High"

Lead: Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of the LORD, "He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust." Surely he will save you from the fowler's snare and from the deadly pestilence.

Cong: He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart. You will not fear the terror of night, nor the arrow that flies by day, nor the pestilence that stalks in the darkness, nor the plague that destroys at midday.

Lead: A thousand may fall at your side, ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you. You will only observe with your eyes and see the punishment of the wicked. If you say, "The LORD is my refuge," and you make the Most High your dwelling, no harm will overtake you, no disaster will come near your tent.

Cong: For he will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways; they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone.

Lead: You will tread on the lion and the cobra; you will trample the great lion and the serpent. "Because he loves me," says the LORD, "I will rescue him; I will protect him, for he acknowledges my name.

Together: He will call on me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble, I will deliver him and honor him. With long life I will satisfy him and show him my salvation."

Responsive Reading

February 17, 2019, Matthew 6:25-34 "Don't Worry about Tomorrow"

Lead: "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them.

Cong: Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life "And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin.

Lead: Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith?

Cong: So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them.

Lead: But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

Together: Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.

Responsive Reading

February 24, 2019, James 1:2-12, "Blessed Is the One Who Perseveres"

Lead: Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything.

Cong: If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you.

Lead: But when you ask, you must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind.

Cong: That person should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. Such a person is double-minded and unstable in all they do. Believers in humble circumstances ought to take pride in their high position.

Lead: But the rich should take pride in their humiliation - since they will pass away like a wild flower. For the sun rises with scorching heat and withers the plant; its blossom falls and its beauty is destroyed. In the same way, the rich will fade away even while they go about their business.

Together: Blessed is the one who perseveres under trial because, having stood the test, that person will receive the crown of life that the Lord has promised to those who love him.

Psalm 68.31 states that "Ethiopia will hasten to stretch out its hands to God." Zephaniah 3:9-10 says that "from beyond the rivers of Ethiopia, my suppliants, my scattered ones, shall bring my offering." The Bible in Exodus 12:37-38 says that when Moses led the Israelites "the children of Israel journeyed ... about six hundred thousand on foot that were men, beside children. And a mixed multitude went up also with them." The Egyptians were themselves a mixed breed, for in their own paintings they portrayed themselves as being reddish brown, yellow, and black. From examination of predynastic Egyptian skulls, it has been estimated that at least one third of the Egyptian population was clearly black. The Egyptians are descended from Noah's middle son, Ham. Egypt was called the "land of Ham" according to Psalm 105:23. His name in Hebrew is Cham which means both "black" and "Egypt." The oldest son of Ham is Cush which is even today used as a Hebrew expression meaning a Black African.

There are many more evidences of African people in the Old Testament. The descendants of Ham, son of Noah, were Cush (Ethiopia) the Sudan, Mizraim (Egypt), Phut (Libya) and Canaan (Palestine/Israel). The Phoenicians were descendants of Canaan, the son of Ham. Cush is the term that the Greeks would later transpose as "Aithiops" or Ethiopia, meaning literally "burnt face people." Nimrod was the son of Cush and grandson of Ham. Moses himself was an African-Asiatic and he married an Ethiopian woman according to Numbers 12:1-10. The Queen of Sheba was a Black African. Acts 8 identifies her as Candace, queen of the Ethiopians or Nubians. There are also many other examples in the New Testament that we could cite if we had the space. So even though Black History Month focuses on our American experience, we must look back to the earliest record of mankind, the Bible, to learn about our history and heritage as Black people.

From your Health and Wellness Ministry

A healthy heart is the foundation for cardiovascular fitness.

- Achieving heart healthy milestones at early stages of life will help keep your heart fit.
- From at least the years of 30's to 60's and beyond, it is important to know your family history of cardiovascular diseases.
- This history can include heart attacks, hypertension, strokes, and even diabetes which damage blood vessels.
- Become familiar with your "numbers" such as blood pressure, blood sugar, and cholesterol levels.

Determine routine screenings with your doctor to obtain and become familiar with this data.

Research has shown that the number one thing that people are concerned about when it comes to a healthy heart is diet.

Some simple guidelines are:

- Eat a diet rich in vegetables, fruits, whole grains and fiber. Fiber helps lower blood cholesterol.
- Eat plant based or moderate amounts of animal protein sources.
- Limit saturated fat, trans-fats, and cholesterol. It is recommended that only 30% of daily calories should come from fat.
- Limit salt intake.
- Eat moderate size portions.

Besides eating a healthy diet, risk factors for heart disease can be kept at a minimum by the following:

- Get adequate restful sleep.
- Stop or don't smoke.
- Keep alcohol to a minimum or abstain.
- Avoid a sedentary lifestyle by including stress reducing exercise each day.
