

#### **VP Membership – Bill Demastus**

Our 2018 dues payments are continuing to come in by mail. However, there are still numerous members who have not paid. If you received the "final dues" notice sent out by email (paper copies were sent to those who had not paid and do not have email) and have not yet sent in your check, please do so today! Membership retention is as important as bringing in new members. We want you to continue to be engaged in the political process and continuing as member of the Men' Republican Club is an excellent way to do so. To repeat what my preceding Membership VPs have said for years, "The best way to get new members is to have our current membership invite like-minded conservative thinkers to a luncheon meeting and ask them to join." This has been the case since our founding in 1996. If you think about what brought you to the club, most would answer by saying, "a friend who was already a member invited me to attend a luncheon and then encouraged me to join."

We continue to have a substantial balance of over \$15,000 in the bank. This balance has increased as members paid their 2018 \$25 dues. Unfortunately, we still have a number of members who have not paid their 2018 dues by the April 1 deadline. Therefore, if you are one of those who did not make the April 1 dues payment deadline, following is what will happen:

- You are dropped from the membership database and are no longer considered an active member for the remainder of 2018.
- You will no longer receive the monthly newsletter, the April issue being the last one you will receive.
- You will no longer receive club news by email that is sent out between newsletters such as event reminders, meeting reminders, breaking news, etc.

**Pollak: Conservative Hysteria over Omnibus Is** Wrong and Self-Defeating | Breitbart

Conservatives are understandably frustrated by the \$1.3 trillion omnibus spending bill that President Donald Trump signed into law, under protest, on Friday.

The massive size of the bill makes a mockery of Republican promises since 2009 to restrain spending and return to balanced budget once they returned to power.

The large number of giveaways to Democratic Party projects and special interests is a sign that the Swamp is still alive and festering in the Trump era.

The fact that the <u>2,232-page bill</u> was jammed down legislators' throats with literally no time to read it shows how little has changed in Washington even after the Tea Party.

And the lack of real funding for the border wall — Trump's core campaign promise in 2016 — suggests that Trump is "<u>getting rolled</u>" by both parties. But the omnibus is not a disaster. In fact, Republicans scored many important wins.

One is the fact that the bill provides massive new spending for defense — "the largest year-to-year increase in base funding for the Department of Defense in 15 years," according to the bill's authors.

That funding was badly needed — and will not easily be reversed.

**<u>Military.com</u>** summarizes the highlights:

The Navy gets 14 new ships, including a carrier; the Air Force adds 56 F-35s; the Army gets 17 Apache and 11 Lakota helicopters; the Marine Corps receives 24 vertical landing F-35Bs; and the Coast Guard gets a long-needed icebreaker.

All the troops get funding for a 2.4 percent pay raise that took effect at the beginning of the year, with the possibility for more next year.

The Air Force also gets \$103 million for the wing replacement program on the A-10 Thunderbolt as a start in what Air Force Secretary Heather Wilson said earlier this week is a plan to keep the "Warthogs" flying at least to 2030.

Most conservatives — from skeptical libertarians to hawkish neoconservatives — agree that national security is the first priority of government. The new defense spending will help the U.S. military catch up to the pace of Chinese expansion, and keep other threats in check.

Yes, there will need to be budget cuts in the future. But the new commitment to defense makes it more likely that cuts will have to come from other discretionary spending, and long-overdue entitlement reforms.

In addition, the omnibus spending bill included many riders that conservatives should applaud. Some had little chance of passing any other way.

Foremost among these is the <u>Taylor Force Act</u>, which will cut off most U.S. foreign aid to the Palestinian Authority unless it stops paying stipends to terrorists and their families — which it will not do.

The importance of that law cannot be overstated. It will radically shift relations between Israelis and Palestinians in Israel's favor. It will also send a clear signal to the world that the U.S. will hold other

#### governments responsible for supporting terrorism.

Other riders included the Fix NICS Act, a <u>Trump</u> <u>administration- and National Rifle Association-</u> <u>backed</u> bill that will improve the nation's background check system for gun purchases. The bill ought to take some of the wind out of the sails of the anti-gun movement.

Another addition was a <u>fix</u> to the "grain glitch," a provision in last year's tax cut that accidentally discouraged farms from selling their produce to private buyers and favored sales to cooperatives instead.

Conservatives can also take heart from what was *not* included in the omnibus. The Trump administration held out against Democrat demands for full amnesty for 1.8 million "Dreamers" — i.e. illegal aliens brought into the country as minors.

Republicans also prevented the bill from giving massive subsidies to insurance companies on the Obamacare exchanges after President Trump ended the Obama administration's payments, which had been ruled unconstitutional by a federal court last year.

So while there are many reasons to complain about the omnibus, there are also things to celebrate. The cause of fiscal reform is not dead: now, with defense adequately funded, is the best opportunity for Trump to make good on his promise to tackle the national debt.

Conservatives should not be distracted by the <u>gloating</u> of Democrats like House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), or the <u>trolling</u> of Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY). They know that declaring victory is a good way to separate Trump from his base.

The fact is that Trump crushed them in the last budget negotiation, when they foolishly shut down the government to protect illegal aliens. And this time, Trump achieved long-sought Republican priorities, even if they came at an admittedly heavy price.

Rather than despair — would the cause really be served by handing Congress back to Democrats? conservatives should prepare for the next fight, which will be backed by a presidential veto.

## Hudson Hosts House VA Committee at Fayetteville Field Hearing

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. – On Friday, March 23, U.S. Representative Richard Hudson (NC, District-08), representing Cumberland (Ft. Bragg), Moore, Hoke, Montgomery, Carrabus, Rowan and Stanley Counties, hosted the Committee on Veterans' Affairs to conduct an open oversight field hearing entitled, "<u>Partnering, Payment and Provider Access: VA</u> <u>Community Care in North Carolina.</u>"

Rep. Hudson was joined by Chairman Phil Roe, M.D. (TN-01), Rep. Neal Dunn, M.D. (FL-02), and Rep. Robert Pittenger (NC-09) for the hearing at Fayetteville Technical Community College. Roe and Dunn each praised Hudson and Pittenger for their efforts to help local veterans. And the two local congressmen said they were committed to improving access to VA care.

Several veterans service organizations from across North Carolina attended the hearing. Afterward, Hudson and Pittenger encouraged veterans and organizations to reach out to their offices with issues or suggestions to improve care for veterans. "Veterans all have a voice," Hudson said. "This is a good opportunity for us to have our voices heard."

During the hearing, Rep. Hudson and the Committee heard from caregivers, veterans, representatives from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), and community health providers and discussed strategies to improve the VA's care in the community programs – including the Choice program – to facilitate access to timely, quality care for veterans in North Carolina, both inside the VA health care system and in the community. As part of that conversation, the Committee assessed actions that may be needed to strengthen VA's community partnerships, create successful working relationships with community providers, and streamline prompt payment and access to information.

"This bureaucracy is not going to get fixed unless Congress makes it get fixed, and we're working really hard on doing that," said US Rep. Richard Hudson. Hudson and Chairman Phil Roe said they're taking the concerns back to Washington to urge lawmakers to get to work on these important issues.

New post on RESOLVE Tariffs 101 By Harold Mendelson

It seems a lot of so called knowledgeable people are upset with President Donald Trump's imported steel and aluminum tariffs. The general viewpoint is the tariffs will start a trade war and the U.S. economy will collapse.

Is it true the tariffs will destroy our economy? Well it is true that businesses generally hate tariffs, because they drive up the cost of imported materials used to make their products. If that is so, why would President Trump want to upset the economy?

If you look at the tariffs he has imposed, you will see there's is a vagueness to his tariffs. Mexico and Canada are exempt for the time being. Why? President Trump wants to renegotiate NAFTA. NAFTA was the brainchild of then-President Clinton. It was designed to build up free trade between the U.S. and its North American neighbors. In the past 20 years, what has it accomplished? It certainly expanded trade between the nations of North America. It also allowed American companies to move manufacturing jobs off shore, where lower labor costs reduced manufacturing costs and raised net profits. The areas around Detroit and the rest of the rust belt states were turned into ahost towns. Auto plants and steel mills shut down. Supporting industries such as logistic companies shut down as well. You can't make steel with the coke made from coal. NAFTA was a treaty that was much more beneficial to countries outside the U.S. So what can be done to fix the disadvantages of NAFTA so the American economy isn't hurt by the treaty? One way is to renegotiate NAFTA. Up to this point Mexico and Canada have been slow to agree to reopen the talks. After all, both nations realize any changes made to NAFTA will hurt their their economies. So President Trump is using the tariff as a bargaining chip. The same holds true for the rest of our international trading partners, including China. Most of the treaties the U.S. has entered into since NAFTA have put the U.S. at a disadvantage. President Trump has said these treaties were bad for the U.S. and pledges to renegotiate those treaties.

As for China, it has done it's best to promote its economy at the expense of other nations' economies. It manipulated its currency; it has been dumping steel and aluminum on the world markets for years. Ratan Tata, an Indian billionaire who made his money in the steel and aluminum industries as well as the auto industry, a number years ago reopened steel plants in the UK. Late last year he announced he was shutting down his UK operations because of the artificially low prices of steel exported from China. President Trump instituted these tariffs to equalize the prices of steel and aluminum coming from China and others nations that have been dumping their exports on the world market. He has publicly announced the tariffs will be ended when these imbalances are eliminated, and when product dumping ends and NAFTA is renegotiated.

Why impose tariffs and risk upsetting the world recovery? Because it puts the U.S. in a position of strength and influence. At long last.
