

The great Constitutions of the Council cannot be separated one from the other, and it is not an accident that this single huge effort at reflection by the Ecumenical Council — which is the highest expression of synodality in the Church and whose richness I, together with all of you, am called to be the custodian --began with reflection on the Liturgy. Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

1st Sunday Advent Year A Matt 24:37-44

Do you think we are living in the end times? I have been asked that more in the past couple of years, than I have ever before as I have served as a priest in ministry. My usual response is, "I don't know, and don't have any secret knowledge from God indicating that these are the 'last days' but shouldn't we all live every day as if it's our last?" I understand that is how Jesus always answered such questions when people were trying to predict the end of the world. What if today was the end? Should I be spending a lot of time trying to figure out the 'last day'? Or should I better be getting to the business that needs doing now, and live it while I still can. In today's gospel Jesus says twice, "You just won't know when, until it comes upon you!" For example, in Matthew 24:42, He says, "you do not know on which day your Lord will come" and in Matthew 24:44, He adds "at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come." Jesus that everything was business as usual (food, farm, marriage and commerce) until the flooding rains started and washed everything away. So, Jesus cautions us to prudence and vigilance, and that we should be prepared up front. Consider that each day may be our last day and have everything in the best order possible, just in case.

Hearing about Noah's time, a question I have always puzzled over, is whether Noah's neighbors were the slightest bit curious as to his incredible building project? Might they have wanted to discuss with Noah, his construction project? I figure that at least a few investor/ speculators might have been curious to see Noah's work as a prospective investment, and maybe ask him if they could 'get in' with his venture at the ground level (it would be easier then, than when the project gets afloat later!) I've always assumed that Noah's massive work had to have raised some alarm bells with neighbors. Maybe even if they were just concerned about his mental health, they might have come around and talked with him about what he was on his mind motivating him to build so large. It seems probable that his work would have led at least some others to consider their own 'lifeboat' plans or some back-up contingency to carry them through any possible bad turn of events. But, the times must have been so chaotic and sinfully self-centered that the mob didn't care or even notice at all. Perhaps since Noah's good example of virtue and moral living were being ignored by others, then he was also easily discredited and written off by the crowds. Until maybe the third week of rains! But too late!

Another puzzle to pray about: What do we make of the two men and two women, only of which in each pair makes it through the end times? Matthew 24:40-41 tells us that "Two men will be out in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left. Two women will be grinding at the mill; one will be taken, and one will be left." On one level it humbles us to realize, there is presumptive no easy slide to escaping tribulation. But, prepare and work to be the one that escapes such ruin. I find the point of this 'one taken & one not' scenario to be that preparation for the END, is an internal matter. Both pairs of people are going about their daily work, yet only one in each pair is spared. So, escaping is not wrapped up in a specific external task or job. You may in the field, or you may be in the kitchen, the end will hit everywhere simultaneously. But one's internal preparedness is what matters. No matter the physical work I am involved in, I need my heart and soul to be open/ready to hear God's eternal call, whenever it may come. That someone working right alongside me will not make it, teaches me that my mind and heart need to be in the right place, not just my body in the right place. So readiness for the great end to come is not a matter of stockpiling earthly materials (the doomsday prepping industry) or some specific physical action, but it is more a matter of keeping an attentive spirit and a soul ready to flexibly adapt and move when the call comes in (for us to go out). I am not sure what Billy Joel meant by a 'New York State of Mind' since I've never been there, but I do know that Jesus is saving that we all need a 'heavenly state of soul' to make it there. Or similarly m, the Boy Scout Oath promises an overall readiness for all things, when they commit "To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight. Attention! Peace, Fr Brian


