SAVING OUR BUILT HERITAGE

In 2003, in accordance with Wisconsin state statute, Washburn adopted its own preservation ordinance to safeguard against premature demolition of buildings with cultural, historic, or architectural importance. To support WHA's mission to preserve the historic buildings of the Washburn area, the Building and Sites Committee will initiate nomination of Washburn City Hall and St. Louis Church as Local Historic Sites.

In 1937, after adding a brownstone addition, the 1893 brick library building became today's Washburn City Hall. Construction of St. Louis Catholic Church began in 1891 and continued for about 20 years. A monumental brownstone Romanesque Revival cathedral, well suited for the period, was envisioned. But the population dwindled and that project faltered. A large interior renovation project in 1984 resulted in its present configuration.

There are three levels of historic designation for buildings: national, state, and local. The committee will prepare papers to recognize these two important buildings that contribute to our local cultural heritage and architectural history.



Keepers of the Kiosk!

Did you know that it takes a whole lot of hard-working people to build a kiosk? Ours has been greeting residents and visitors alike from the corner of Bayfield Street and Third Avenue West since September 2020. But the WHA committee members who worked to get it there began their job in September 2018! As that original committee finished their tasks, the ball was passed to a smaller Panel Committee who create the window displays. These women began their work in June 2020 and continue to this

day. New panels are rotated in and out periodically and these changes are posted in the Washburn Chamber Blast. To learn which elementary school was used as a hospital during the 1918 Spanish Flu pandemic, check out the Washburn Schools panel on the kiosk today.

Panel Committee members are Patra Holter, Lynn Adams, Sharon Stewart, and Ginny Pedersen. They will be featured in the February 1st presentation of the Tony Woiak Winter History Festival. Mark your calendars for "A Kiosk Doesn't Happen Overnight."

F E B 1 5 The First CCC Camp in Wisconsin

In less than 30 days of taking office, President Franklin Roosevelt pushed through Congress the most popular New Deal recovery program of the great depression, the Emergency Recovery Work Act, the authorization for the Civilian Conservation Corps. On May 4, 1933, the men of Company 640 marched from the Omaha station on 1st Ave. E. in Washburn 17 miles to the former homestead of Ora and Lizzie Brinks in the barrens to begin their 6-month enlistment in the CCC. **PETE MANN's** program will explore the presence of the CCC in Bayfield County and the establishment of Camp Brinks.

Their determination, commitment, guidance and support have played an important role in bringing this treasured building back to its intended use. Ken's legacy to our community lives on. BUILDINGS AND SITES COMMITTEE 2022 ACTIVITIES

This new WHA committee is excited about the projects it will be undertaking this year. The Committee's purpose is advocating the significance of historic buildings and sites in our community by increasing awareness and encouraging improvements.

Given this purpose, the primary activities will include:

Facade Grants: The announcement of the availability of grants funds was sent to business owners in December 2021 with a February 1 deadline to submit applications. The grant funds are for repair, refurbishing or enhancements to the exterior of commercial buildings in Washburn. It is anticipated that grant awards will be made March 1.

Designation of Additional Historic Buildings: The newsletter contains a separate article regarding this initiative.

Preservation Month: In 2022, the Washburn Public Library will be featured. A variety of activities are being planned to occur at the library throughout May, in addition to tours of other historic buildings and sites in the community.

The Buildings and Sites Committee welcomes additional ideas and suggestions from WHA members and the Washburn community regarding our treasured historic buildings and sites.

Houghton Depot Nears Completion

The members of the Bayview History Committee would like to extend a sincere thank you to all the individuals who have contributed volunteer hours, donations, grants and contractual work to make this project a reality. The Houghton Depot stands as a testament to the Washburn Heritage Association's purpose "...to protect, preserve, interpret, and increase awareness of the architectural and cultural history of the City of Washburn and its contiguous townships." Over the past two years, grants from Ron and Kay Maassen, the Washburn Community Education Foundation, the Apostle Islands Historic Preservation Conservancy, several large anonymous gifts, donations of all sizes from local donors and folks around the USA, gifts of items from the period when the train was active, and support from the Town of Bayview have made this dream of saving the last remaining train depot on the Bayfield Peninsula a reality.

This winter the committee continues its work by designing signage and education materials that will be installed before spring field trips of 4th grade students from Washburn, Madeline Island, Bayfield and South Shore schools. Programs are also being developed to deliver to the general public.

Members of the committee are interviewing some of the older members from the Town of Bayview who remember the days when the train was active. Other are searching for any information on the days between 1880 and 1970 when the train was actively carrying passengers and goods between Ashland to Bayfield while making additional stops at Barksdale, Washburn, Houghton Village, Pike, Salmo and PureAir.

Please come to a celebration of completion to be held in the Spring of 2022.
