God and Politics

Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save.
- Psalm 146:3



No one will be surprised when I say we have just lived through an intensely political season. We have seen an impeachment, hard fought campaigns, an election with a disputed result, the takeover of the capitol, and another impeachment. Both presidential candidates made auspicious promises regarding what they would accomplish and dire warnings of the evil their opponents would bring. Whew! Maybe it's time to step out of the fray and remember where our trust really belongs.

The author of Psalm 146 makes a dire warning against having faith in any earthly ruler. They are all mere mortals and their plans will eventually come to nothing. Instead, we are urged to rely on the Lord for our help and to place our hope in God. Unlike princes and presidents who come with great fanfare, only to leave office and fade into history, God, who created the universe, rules eternally. (verses 3-6)

In marked contrast to the platforms of our politicians, God supports the oppressed, feeds the hungry, releases prisoners, heals the blind, and helps the helpless. God cares for foreigners, orphans, and widows, although they have no political power. (verses 7-9)


Psalm 146 is not an expression of the random thoughts of an overly idealistic poet. It summarizes the way of God found throughout scripture. It echoes the vision of the prophet Isaiah (Isaiah 61:1) and defines the mission which Jesus claimed as his own. (Luke 4:18-19) This is the agenda which Christians are called to support and the measure by which God judges the rulers of nations.

As citizens in a democracy, we are called to exercise discernment regarding the promises and actions of our elected leaders. Our efforts to identify the truest response to God's agenda may lead us to support different politicians and parties. That is understandable. We are all human. Knowing that demands that we humbly accept the possibility that the political conclusions we reach may not be in accord with the way of God.

If we recall the wisdom of Psalm 146, we will temper our expectations of the presidents we favored. We will remember that even the greatest of them are fallible mortals, subject to error, selfish ambition, and moral compromise.

In the same way, we will calm our anxieties when someone we did not vote for is elected. Even when they pursue policies we believe to be wrong, we know that God remains the ruler above all rulers. "The Lord reigns forever. Praise the Lord!" (verse 10)





SHALOM FOOD PANTRY MARCH MISSION

According to Wikipedia, **Shalom** (**Hebrew**: מיל ש **shalom**; also spelled as **sholom**, **sholem**, **sholoim**, **shulem**) is a **Hebrew** word meaning peace, harmony, wholeness, completeness, prosperity, welfare and tranquility and can be used idiomatically to mean both hello and goodbye. As it does in **English**, it can refer to either **peace** between two entities (especially between man and God or between two countries), or to the wellbeing, welfare or safety of an individual or a group of individuals.

Scripture teaches us that the true nature of God is to heal the broken spirit and repair the broken life. He is revealed as the One who is able to satisfy our hunger and our thirst. According to John 6 1-15, the disciples didn't quite fully understand this. As the multitude pressed them for food, they didn't quite know how to respond. They had only five loaves of bread and two fish among them. "But what is that among so many?

What the disciples have is obviously not enough to feed the large crowd. It is hardly enough to feed just a few hungry people. But, and this may be a lesson for us, in the hands of Jesus, what little they have to offer is multiplied. The loaves and the fish miraculously satisfy the multitude.

What if the disciples had said to one another: "What we have is so little; it is pitifully small. Should we even bother to give Jesus the five loaves we have and the two fish?" But what appears to them to be so small is, in the hands of Jesus, enough to feed the great crowd, according to our story. We are not told how this happens. It is enough to know the lesson it teaches; that the little we think we have can be, in God's hands, enough, and more than enough, to do marvelous things. Or, to put it another way, our modest faith, our fragile hope, our tender love, incomplete and as imperfect as it may be is more than we might ever possibly imagine, if we entrust who we are and what we have to God.

We may be tempted to think that, in comparison to the needs of the world around us, the faith we have to share is so modest, so insignificant, and so small, that it is are hardly worth offering to anyone. But what appears so small to us may, by the grace of God, be great to others. (Trost, 2021)¹

At St. John's, we fully believe in and carry out that message in our Shalom Food Pantry. We come together to meet hunger related issues within our community. Without the faithful support of our congregation we would not be able to take the small gifts given to us and have them multiplied into abundance by God.




