SHARING MY FAITH - SPREADING THE GOOD NEWS WE ARE AMBASSADORS FOR CHRIST THE AMSPS

The gift of Faith is one of God's most beautiful gifts. Even stripped of its religious meaning, it has the effect of transforming life and situations from bad to the very best, hopeless to hopeful. This is the gift that every Christian, every Catholic, is endowed with, for his or her own sake and for the sake of the Kingdom of God. It's important that we reap the fruits of Faith for ourselves, but beyond that, we should never be satisfied with the idea of what Faith can offer us.

Thus, we must take it to the next level: what fruits can my Faith bear? One of the greatest gifts we can offer to God is to contribute, in our own capacity, to the building of the Kingdom of God. We do this beginning from our family to our parish, and to the Universal Church. In all, we do this to help bring others to Faith the same way we were brought to Faith by the efforts of others.

We hear of lay Catholics and other Christians, often professionals and even youth, who decide to spend some weeks or months in a mission outside their country (comfort zones) working among the poorest of the poor, spreading the Good News by doing what they know best . Many of us silently applaud their efforts and wish we could do the same.

One beautiful and encouraging thing about us Catholics is that we are always invested in the universal mandate of Christ to preach the gospel to the whole world, baptizing everyone in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit (Mt. 28:19). Indeed, more than other Christian denominations, we are the most missionary minded. How else do you explain the fact that two priests from far away Nigeria, trained with monies from outside Nigeria, are here in Yonkers, very well accepted and at home, teaming up with parishioners from diverse backgrounds who have known them for a few months - together we're all spreading the Good News and actively building the Kingdom of God here in this tiny corner of the globe.

Since this missionary mandate is very central to the mission of the Church and to our Faith as individuals, each of us must consciously and continually be missionaries in our own unique way. Beautifully, the Church has hundreds of ways to channel our efforts toward the same goal of building the Kingdom. Fr. Daniel and I, and other priest members of the Missionaries of St. Paul chose to respond by answering God's call to be priests and work among God's people. Here at St. Bart's someone could wish to go off and spend a week or month in a poor mission anywhere around the globe, for example where the MSPs work. But that might be farfetched. Another could wish to become a priest or nun or brother. That too is even more farfetched. Of course, we must not forget or minimize the importance of our contributions toward the Church's missionary works. But since a missionary group (MSP), works here among us, they provide a clear opportunity to understand and participate in our missionary mandate.

The lay Associate Missionaries of St. Paul (AMSP), choose to exercise this mandate in their own unique way; by praying for the work of the missions, by supporting them financially, or by simply being more conscious of this aspect of our Faith and helping others to do so, too.

This coming Saturday, the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul, at our 5 p.m. Mass, about 16 members will officially become AMSP members in a brief ceremony that will be officiated by Very Rev. Fr. Ilesami Osasona, the coordinator of the Promotions Office in Houston, and the Vice Regional Superior of MSP in the US. Please, come join us in the celebration or at the reception that follows.

Beyond this celebration, I want to invite each of us to think about our Faith as a gift, how we cherish, appreciate, and nurture it, and how we respond to the call to bear fruits and bring the Good News to others near and far! This is the purpose of this long reflection to constantly remind us of our Christian duty to evangelize directly or indirectly, far and near and anywhere in between.

May the Lord Jesus and Our Lady of the Missions help us as we carry out this mission. Amen.

41ST ANNIVERSARY OF ROE vs. WADE

As we celebrate the 41st anniversary of the Supreme Court ruling on Abortion (the Roe v Wade case) this Wednesday, January 22nd, we think of the adverse effects the practice of abortion is having on us as individuals and as a society.



Reproduced below is a discussion

of one of the issues included in the U.S. Catholic Bishops' Political Responsibility Statement:

"Human life is a gift from God which all of us are called to protect, nurture, and sustain. The right to life, the most basic of all human rights, must be protected by law. Abortion has become the fundamental human rights issue of our day because it is the deliberate destruction of a human being before birth.

The United States, avowedly a defender of the weak, has one of the highest legal abortion rates and the most extreme abortion policy of any industrialized Western nation in the world. There are now more than 1.5 million abortions every year in the United States, over 4,400 a day, with well over 95 percent performed for economic or social reasons. Thousands of unborn children are killed each year in the final months of pregnancy.

We support policies and laws that encourage childbirth over abortion, and urge government and the private sector to provide programs that assist pregnant women and their children, especially those who are poor. We support efforts to prohibit domestic and foreign abortion funding, as well as efforts to protect states from having to fund abortions contrary to their own laws. We reject the 1973 Supreme Court abortion decisions which deny legal protection to unborn children, and we support efforts to prohibit or restrict abortion legislatively and to provide constitutional protection for unborn human life. Laws and policies on medical research, health care, and related issues must respect and protect human life from the moment of conception."
