Here's what I'm thinking...

It has been cold, cloud covered, and windy for days, but green evidence of the long-awaited spring is everywhere. Bethene and Karen are planting flowers with confidence, the strawberries are blooming and Jim is already harvesting rhubarb. It is 38 degrees this morning but the sun is finally visible and the sky is a clear blue. I think we are going to be okay—warmth is on its way. Sometimes having the big picture perspective helps us to have the faith to keep moving forward, keep planting, even through difficult times. I have been thinking about this lately in terms of the life of the church, both locally and the larger historical picture of the Church of the Brethren. The church goes through seasons as well and sometimes we wonder what is next for us. As I prepare to offer a class that will focus on the story of the Church of the Brethren in general and the Wabash in particular, I am aware that there are seasons of growth and confidence and seasons of uncertainty. The interesting thing is I am not sure how that growth and strength is related to faithfulness. Sometimes faithfulness is exactly what has taken us into a season of uncertainty. It is at those times that when we need the big picture perspective to keep planting seeds of love and hope even through our uncertainty.

So here's what I'm thinking...We are now moving into a season in our life as a congregation that feels like Spring. With the welcoming of ten new folks into our fellowship, there is a sense of planting new seeds. We have been experiencing the energy and gifts that this new life brings and we celebrate their presence with us. We want to welcome and nurture these new relationships.

On May 21st at 9:30am, we will begin an adult class in which we will share the story of the Church of the Brethren both denominationally and locally here in Wabash. We will explore the history, the theology, the foundational ordinances, and the current struggles that are part of each of those stories. We are focusing on this now as an orientation for those new to our congregation and denomination, but we are hoping that many others will join us for a rich time of getting to know each other and sharing in conversation about where we have been and how we will move forward together. We are planning for four or five sessions, but we may decide to extend it if there is interest. Please consider joining us!! (There may be coffee and pastry—whatever it takes.)




