



#### The Reading is from the Letter of the Holy Apostle Paul to the Galatians



Brethren, See with what large letters I have written to you with my own hand! As many as desire to make a good showing in the flesh, these would compel you to be circumcised, only that they may not suffer persecution for the cross of Christ. For not even those who are circumcised keep the law, but they desire to have you circumcised that they may boast in your flesh. But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. #### The reading is from the Gospel according to St. Luke



Then they sailed to the country of the Gadarenes, which is opposite Galilee. And when He stepped out on the land, there met Him a certain man from the city who had demons for a long time. And he wore no clothes, nor did he live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he cried out, fell down before Him, and with a loud voice said, "What have I to do with You, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg You, do not torment me!" For He had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. For it had often seized him, and he was kept under guard, bound with chains and shackles; and he broke the

bonds and was driven by the demon into the wilderness.

Jesus asked him, saying, "What is your name?"

And he said, "Legion," because many demons had entered him. And they begged Him that He would not command them to go out into the abyss.

Now a herd of many swine was feeding there on the mountain. So they begged Him that He would permit them to enter them. And He permitted them. Then the demons went out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd ran violently down the steep place into the lake and drowned.

When those who fed *them* saw what had happened, they fled and told *it* in the city and in the country. Then they went out to see what had happened, and came to Jesus, and found the man from whom the demons had departed, sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. They also who had seen *it* told them by what means he who had been demon-possessed was healed. Then the whole multitude of the surrounding region of the Gadarenes asked Him to depart from them, for they were seized with great fear. And He got into the boat and returned.

Now the man from whom the demons had departed begged Him that he might be with Him. But Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your own house, and tell what great things God has done for you." And he went his way and proclaimed throughout the whole city what great things Jesus had done for him.







## **Q&A:** WHAT IS EXORCISM?

Exorcism is the rite of prayer which expels demons from a person or physical object. The most common use of exorcism in the Church is at the reception of a catechumen, which is most often included at the beginning of the baptismal rite, and during the Great Blessing of Water which is



done on the baptismal waters and at Theophany. An exorcism may also be performed if it is believed that a person is suffering from demonic influence.


Exorcism is the practice of expelling evil spirits by means of prayer or set formulas adopted by the Christian Church from pre-Christian practices. Christ Himself and his Apostles practiced exorcism for the people possessed. (See Matthew 10:1 and foll; Luke 11:14 and foll; Acts 16:18, 19:13 and foll.). Exorcism has been practiced on persons possessed by an evil spirit all through the development of the Christian Church beginning with New Testament times. The most well-known exorcisms are those applied to Catechumens about to be baptized. Since infant Baptism was introduced in the Church, the statements denouncing Satan and accepting Christ are given by the Godfather/mother in the place of the candidate to be baptized. The Orthodox exorcisms before Baptism are four in number. Following them, and after the candidate or sponsor gives the affirmations in Christ, he is required to recite the Nicene Creed as the final seal of a successful candidacy.

It should be noted here at this point that the Orthodox exorcisms are in essence prayers for averting the influence of evil spirits rather than for expelling the devil, especially in ceremonies such as sanctifying the waters (Hagiasmos), blessing the ceremonial oil, or blessing sacred vessels. It should also be noted that the importance of exorcism in Orthodox ecclesiastical life is not as great as it is in both the Roman Catholic and Protestant Churches. In recent years certain semi-pagan exorcistic rituals have been

practiced by a number of people uncertain as to their religious belonging, including clergymen of the Roman Catholic and Protestant Churches. Assuming the role of an exorcist is a serious offense against the Church's conception of evil and of the sacramental means by which it should be warded off. Needless to say, evil in man, whether personified or not, naturally requires the help of the Church for its expulsion but, above all, requires the spiritual strength of the individual concerned.

## Prayer for protection from evil

O Lord Our God, the King of the ages, almighty and all powerful, who create and alter all things by your will alone; who changed into dew the flames of the furnace in Babylon that had been heated seven times more than usual, and preserved in safety



For you are God my strength, the powerful ruler, the Prince of Peace, the Father of the age to come. Yes, Lord, our God, spare your creature and save your servant (Name) from every injury and brought about by the evil eye, and keep him (her) safe above every ill. For your are our King and all things are possible to Thee, O Lord. Therefore, we ascribe glory to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto the ages of ages. Amen.

Today is one of two days each year when everyone has to relearn how to switch the clocks on their ovens, microwaves and cars.

At 2 a.m. today, clocks were to be set back to 1 a.m., giving everyone an extra hour today but ending daylight saving time......

...... HANDS OF TIME

Time is on no one's mind more than for the owners of two local clock shops, Thumm's Family-Owned Bike & Clock Shop in Warren and Big Ben's Clock

Shop in Austintown.

Both businesses have been staples in their communities for years — Thumm's has been selling bikes for 114 years and clocks for 35 years, and Big Ben's has been in business for 43 years.......

......Big Ben's sells grandfather clocks, which Ben Mischey said he buys directly from the factory, although he now has only two suppliers, when in the past he had a dozen. His company, and Thumm's, sell cuckoo clocks as well, all from the Black Forest in Germany........

......Mischey, who is proudly 89 1/2, began his clock shop after an early retirement from Youngstown Welding. Taking apart and fixing clocks was first a hobby, but now clock retail and repair is the business.

.........."We have people who buy for price and people who buy for quality," Mischey said. "If you buy for price, it will be out on the curb in five years. If you buy for quality, a clock can be a piece that will last and can get passed down for generations."

Tuesday, November 11, 2022 is Veterans Day! On this day we remember all those who have served our great nation – the men and women who put themselves in harm's way to defend our way of life and the values we hold dear, along with the freedom which guarantees that life and those values. We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to those killed in the line of duty, those suffering from the effects of their time of service during war and otherwise and, of course, all those who have retired from active duty. The extent of such gratitude cannot be measured. The sacrifices made by our veterans and their families are freedom's foundation. Without the efforts of all the soldiers, airmen, sailors, marines, coast guardsmen, and their families, we would have little comprehension of what that freedom means.

The observance of Veterans Day, November 11, began almost a century ago. In the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, the Allied Nations and Germany declared an armistice—a temporary cessation of hostilities—in World War I. Commemorated as Armistice Day the next year, November 11 became a legal federal holiday in the United States in 1938. After World War II and the Korean War, Armistice Day became Veterans Day, a holiday dedicated to U.S. veterans of all wars.

As we mark this year's Veterans Day and prepare for the observance of Thanksgiving Day, is the perfect time for our parish communities to engage in ministry with active troops and the families left behind. Here are some ideas:

#### Reach out to soldiers

• Honor deploying troops, praying for safety and for peace. Include deployed soldiers on the weekly prayer list. Municipal offices of our cities and towns maintain the list of deployed soldiers and veterans of the community.

- Send birthday cards and personal letters of encouragement.
- Invite children to write thank-you notes and draw pictures for troops, especially at special times such as Veterans Day. This is a good class project.
- Assemble and send care or special treat packages.

#### Reach out to families of veterans and active duty soldiers

- Identify the military families in your community.
- Are there any wounded veterans? Offer their families assistance with yard work, errands, childcare, respite care and transportation to appointments.
- Start a "veterans only" fellowship. Reservists and veterans, especially in areas remote from military bases, often find it difficult to find others with whom to speak about their military experiences. Those who have experienced combat are especially in need of fellowship with other combat vets. Begin with the veterans of any war who are in your community.
- Holidays can be especially difficult for military families who move often and usually live far from extended family. Invite them to share an activity or meal with your family. Give them good community info like where to get the freshest real Nativity/Christmas tree or the best deal on decorations; what parades, concerts and festivals



are held annually; and especially inform about religious services and memorials being offered in the community. Ask what additional support they need through the holidays while their loved one is deployed.

• Invite military family members to participate in community-outreach projects with other members of the parish family.


### Always pray for military members and their extended families.

On this Veterans Day 2022, the Council of Bishops, clergy and laity of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA, express profound gratitude to Ukrainian-American veterans and all those veterans whose service in the armed forces preserved the foundation of freedom, justice and equality, upon which this country was built and remains anchored.

As the nation pauses on November 11 to observe Veterans Day, let us all give thanks for our 25 million military veterans, thanking God for their sacrifice, dedication and service to country. Let us pray for those who struggle with disabilities and pain, whether physical, emotional or spiritual, asking God to bring powerful healing and renewal.

Finally, on this Veterans Day weekend and beyond, let us actually say: "Thank you for your service!" to all the veterans we know and do the same with any uniformed active-duty members of the Armed Forces, wherever we may meet them – like in an airport. Today's active-duty personnel will be the veterans of the future and our kind gestures may be the one memory that warms their hearts during difficult times.

But unexpectedly, he saw that the poor began ... feed each other! The evil king could not predict that people would be capable of such an act! The love of simple people prevailed against the wicked ruler and shamed him.

We can save our soul for Eternity only when we are thinking not about our own egoism, but about how to help other people that God sent us!
