Tom actually now is getting his grand kids started in Muzzle Loading. I remember attending the Wyoming State 4-H contest in Douglas about 6-7 years ago and watching the kids shoot these big guns that make a lot of noise along with the smell of black powder. What a cool thing to watch. Yes, I know it is a man thing.⁽²⁾ Anyway, Lyle and Tom kept bugging us to head out to Brewster's Ranch and try Muzzle Loading. We finally made the trip and haven't looked back. We have learned a lot about Muzzle loading and still have a lot to learn.

<u>crawford@uwyo.edu</u> As members of the WSMLA we need to encourage the local extension office staff, 4-H youth and leaders to attend our club shoots and the WSMLA state contests. Wouldn't it be great to see 50-60 youth at our State Shoot in Riverton.

I am still jealous of the buffalo powder horn that my son, Charlie, won a few years back, it was made by Dave Lehto. The awards given to our youth in the WSMLA can be used over a life time and not just hung on the wall to collect dust. The 4-H program will accept anyone willing to help, volunteer or become a leader. To become a leader in 4-H you do have to register at the local county Extension office. All youth organizations today do run adults through some sort of screening process. Do not let this discourage you. The 4-H program and other youth programs in Wyoming desperately need adult leaders and volunteers. Warren Crawford can answer any questions anyone has on the 4-H program.

One minor thing I have learned as a parent, is that it is quite boring standing around and watching the kids have all the fun. It is much more fun to get involved. I have probably learned more than the kids I have helped over the years in fly fishing or shooting programs. The WSMLA and the 4-H program allow this to happen. The WSMLA has become kind of a father-son activity for us. Even my daughter, Julie, has learned to shoot a muzzleloader and competes in the Washakie County 4-H program. Now if I can get the Mrs. involved it will truly become a family activity as it has become for other families.

We are looking forward to seeing everyone at the Wyoming State Shoot, May 25th -28th in Riverton.

<u>The ever challenging WSMLA Winter Challenge Shoot, 2007 edition:</u> <u>By Phil Nissen</u>

Did I say challenging? Excuse me, but I meant to say exasperating! Hosted by the Deer Creek Muzzle Loaders, we excitedly looked forward to this our twentieth anniversary winter challenge shoot. We never know what kind of weather ol' man winter will have on his trade blanket during President's Weekend. Some have been downright balmy; almost shirtsleeve weather, and others like last year had to be postponed for the first time ever because the temperatures were well below zero! Usually it's a mixed bag, but one thing we can all just about count on is some wind.

Thursday morning, Delbert and I rolled into the Arnold Ranch to set up three tents and do some repair to the 200 yard backboards. Jim Miller was helping Trish celebrate a belated Valentine's Day so didn't show up until almost noon, but he had a smile on his face. Delbert and I had already set up my wall tent in preparation of Jim and my intended campout, and after splicing together enough galvanized pipe to make a distillery, we also set up Delbert's wall tent for use as a "warm up" tent. The gigantic new club tent, it too steel framed went up in the air slicker than a forgotten ramrod, and the couple inches of snow from the day before had all but melted away. The sun felt dandy as we enjoyed some liquid malted refreshment.

Just before dusk, Bryan Youngberg and Vern Fauss drove in with their combined forty feet of wall tent they set up in copulating fashion. The boys laid out their camp gear inside and told us they would be out the next day; Vern in the morning and Bryan after putting in another day manning the hospital's computer help desk. Bryan Connelly showed up right at dark to put a little spit and polish on the hooters, but in the dark forgot two of them. Jim and I visited with Bryan while I gathered up some grub for dinner and by the light of the North Star, turned in for the night.

The wind blew about like normal most of the night, periodically gusting up and flapping the canvas against our heads inside the tent. Between that and the handful of unusually slow moving trains I don't think either of us slept real soundly. At daybreak, I put the coffee pot on the stove and went to inspect Bryan's newly cleaned hooters. It seemed like the wind was picking up quite a bit. The skies looked threatening as well, but I didn't have time to play meteorologist as I had a mission to accomplish. Once inside the hooter, I became immediately aware of how much wind was blowing through the cracks....and dirt....and snow! The old biffy really got to rockin' and rollin' and it wasn't because of me, so it was a mission quickly completed and as I blew out of the door, it was evident a catastrophe was in the making. I have never seen wind that strong anywhere at any time....ever! It was literally a gale force wind that was driving snow and dirt horizontally out of the Northeast.

Miller was rushing around leaning at a 45 degree angle into the wind trying to restrain what looked like the sail of a schooner but what was in reality, Bryan's tent. The canvas was whipping about and the whole front half of the tent was in tatters. Jim was trying to strap it down with a long dog leash so I pitched in trying to anchor Vern's tent so the same fate didn't meet it. No sooner would I nail a stake into the ground again but that it would be pulled up by the billowed sail of a tent. I glanced over at my tent and it was apparent it wasn't going to be upright very much longer either. I ran over and drove its stakes back in the ground and snugged the ropes, but it was becoming a lost cause.

The power had gone out in Glenrock so it wasn't until Delbert got cold that he left his house to come out to the range. After all, we had planned to begin shooting that day. Instead Delbert found himself going back and forth between the two internally framed tents shoring them up. I decided to take my tent down while it was in one piece and within an hour had it packed up and put back in my truck. So much for the much anticipated three day campout. Vern rolled in towards mid morning, called Bryan at the help desk and told him his floppy drive had crashed.

Before heading home to put everything away, Verlin, Herb, and Donnie Danner rolled in and signed up. However, not even these iron men broke a rifle out of the case. About dusk, Magic and Rita rolled in pulling his aluminum Hilton and the wind had reportedly even become quite calm. Damn.

Saturday morning dawned bright and sunny and for the first two relays or so, the wind was quite tolerable. Unfortunately I didn't roll in and make it out to the firing line until about the third relay and the wind had picked up a lot. At 200 yards, the shooters were holding as much as three to four feet to the left – Deer Creek Windage we call it. Bryan Youngberg had nailed what would stand as the high score of 36 on the first relay but hard as I looked, no bullet holes marked my target. Drat – another zero on the infamous 200 yard big bull. I could take some comfort by the end of the shoot in knowing that I wasn't alone.

DCML Prez Dave Hein cooked up a huge pot of delicious goulash for everybody and there were plenty of tasty accompaniments all of us brought to go with the main dish. I looked around the place. We had a bunch of people out there fighting the wind but having a high old time as usual. What a great bunch of people the WSMLA has. Our final tally was just over sixty shooters.

Sunday was just as windy but nevertheless, Judy Lawrence scored a 48 on one of her hundred yard targets! Most of the men, myself included, quit our whining about the shooting conditions and realized we had just had our fannies kicked by one of the best. Shawn Dunn also showed that scoring a perfect 50 on the traveling trophy is possible even in 35 mph winds. Bryan "Trailer Trash" Youngberg didn't seem to be bothered by the sudden lack of a trade tent and brought out a nifty covered trailer and set up shop and still had time to post the men's high aggregate score. For the second year in a row, Ginger Bauman had the women's high aggregate score as did Ned Dunn for the seniors. Nice shooting everyone. Somewhere in this newsletter you should find the team scores. Thank you to everyone who came out and helped make our 20th anniversary winter challenge shoot a great success.

COPPER LADY'S VITTLES

Winter cooking is especially trying, or rather challenging at times. But the heat of the fire warms the cook as well cooking as the food. Stew is nearly a meal in one dish, although bread or fresh vegetables can add variety to the menu.

Deer Stew – The Old-Fashioned Dutch Oven Cookbook, by Don Holm.

Neck meat and other lean parts make good stew. Be sure they are without hair or fat. To increase tastiness, some folks like to marinade venison in wine or mile vinegar the day before cooking.

Cut meat into small pieces and dredge in flour. Brown in a hot Dutch oven in melted suet and remove. Saute a slice onion and minced clove of garlic for several minutes. Return meat to the pot with enough boiling water to form a thick stew.

Season with salt, pepper, thyme, parsley, and diced celery. Simmer for one to two hours, depending on the amount of meat, then add cut potatoes and several small onions and cook a half hour longer.

Make gravy from the juices to serve over meat and vegetables.

A bread which would go well would be **Old Bachelor Biscuits** from Home of the Range, A Culinary History of the American West, by Cathy Luchetti

Quart flour
 tsp cream of tartar
 Tbsp soda
 Enough milk to bring flour to consistency of bread dough.

Mix flour and cream of tartar well together; dissolve soda in the milk, and pour into the flour. Bake immediately in well-greased Dutch oven. Water may be substituted for the milk, adding a spoon of lard for richness.


At about this time, Saint Peter leaned over to the Lord while looking down from the heavens and exclaimed, "You're not going to let him get away with this, are you?"

The Lord smiled and replied, "Who's he going to tell?"






