We are excited that your child was involved in the Academic Learning Center's after-school tutoring program. It is our goal to assist children, through the school and teachers, toward improving their academic performance. ALC was established in 1996 in the First Missionary Baptist Church in the Logan Community in Concord. At that point ALC was able to tutor about 25 students after school. In 2001, we partnered with the Cabarrus County and Kannapolis City School Systems, and United Way, to develop the current model for delivering tutoring services. This school year, ALC is partnering with 11 elementary schools to provide tutoring on site at each of these schools, serving approximately 500 students.

ALC Students strive for higher attendance and are more confident in their ability to participate in regular classroom lessons.

The Academic Learning Center is a creative extension of the classroom that focuses on reinforcement and review of the Common Core Standards that students are currently engaged in during the school day. The link between the child's classroom and the Academic Learning Center after school program is unique and successful. This model has shown that children in the program have better grades and conduct in school, strive for higher attendance and develop more confidence in their ability to learn.
