January 12, 2020 The Baptism of the Lord Mt 3:13-17

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Happy Baptism of the Lord! The season of Christmas continues until today! As I like to say, Christmas contains too much to celebrate all in one day. We have to have a whole season to absorb fully the meaning of the Incarnation of God in Jesus the Emmanuel, 'God-with-us'. In some Catholic cultures, Christmas decorations are still prominent until February 2, the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple (also called Candlemas-one more celebration of Jesus, the true light of the world). But the US Bishops' Conference finds the Baptism of the Lord, to be a good time to transition back to the ordinary calendar of Sunday celebrations. I think this makes Christmas not too short and not too long, as Goldilocks might say it. Considering that some years Lent can begin as early as February 5, a space of some ordinary time creates a good cushion between these two major seasons marking the great events of Jesus' life (his birth and death). Our secular calendar might benefit too, from such a wider spacing, as people usually feel 'holiday fatigued' with Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years' all bunched up at the end of the year. And don't forget this time of year's special consults with accountants and the added 'fun' of gathering of receipts, closing files, tax record reporting, and inventorying stock in businesses. We celebrate that, right? April 15 is a holiday for some! But back to our church calendar, I'll close by simply pointing out that Ash Wednesday is only 44 days away (February 26)!

What is the significance of celebrating Jesus' baptism at the end of the Christmas season? I find this is the church's way of saying that far from being an end, we are just beginning to know the depth of our salvation. Baptism marks only the beginning of our work as messengers to spread the good news that Christ came for the peace of all people. Much as Mary, Joseph, Zechariah, Elizabeth, John Baptist, the shepherds, the wise men, Simeon, Anna and who knows who else, all heard great news and immediately shared it with other people, we are called to do the same messagebearing work. We are right in there with them as new evangelists to tell the world (on the mountains, over the hills and ev-reeeeee-where!) that Jesus' way reveals our human fulfillment, and an all new way of relating to others in the world. So while we shelve and put away in closets our decoration boxes, we keep our faith and its practice on full display. Baptism is not a finish line, it is just the start. Baptism is an inauguration day, a commissioning and sending out day. For Jesus, His Baptism by John was one more 'reveal party' of His identity as the Son of God. Some people see a public announcement of Jesus as the Savior-Son of God at other places prior to His Baptism. They point out the public witness of His mission as an infant presented (postcircumcision) in the Temple (Luke 2:21-22), or his later more public presentation with the Temple Teachers (Luke 2:46-His bar mitzvah?), or even His dramatic first preaching at Nazareth's synagogue found in Luke 4:16. Regardless of which is a 'first revelation', I find them all to show further dimensions of Jesus' saving mission to all people, in all places. So how about our first presentation to God as a child of His seeking recognition as one of His own? No doubt, our life in Christ began at our baptism! Baptism publicly acknowledges our belonging to God as a daughter or son in the faith community of the church. Baptism declares us to be God's children, part of God's family. And at our baptism we were greeted at the doors of the Church and welcomed with the gift of a sign of our membership in Christ's people, the cross (+) of Jesus marked on our foreheads. Each time we trace that sign upon our bodies, we are reaffirming our baptism in Christ, and thanking God for claiming us as family!

Today's gospel reading from Matthew about Jesus' baptism reminds us of the importance of tradition, practicing and passing on to others the benefits of sacred rituals meant to foster faith and inspire devotion. Prayer rituals form within us, the virtues of reverence and respect. When Jesus humbly approaches John for the ritual of baptism, the natural question is 'Who should baptize whom?' John is echoing his meek mother who said the same when the Virgin Mary visited Elizabeth's home in Luke 1:43 "How does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?" So John asks Jesus in a similar spirit, "Who am I to baptize you, you are the Lord?" Yet, as our humble Servant-Savior, Jesus sets the example for his disciples by himself undergoing the baptism ritual. In Matthew 3:15, Jesus says "Allow it now, for it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." I hear Jesus saying, "Uphold this venerable tradition-ritual." So Jesus submits to baptism as an example for us. Jesus doesn't only continue a worthy tradition, but He adds greater meaning to it, making it the means of our being united to Him. Jesus doesn't ask his followers to do anything that He Himself did not submit to first. Like His devotion to 'serving others' ('I came to serve not be served' Matt 20:28) or forgiving enemies ('Father forgive them they know not what they do' Luke 23:34), Jesus goes ahead of us, setting the example to follow. Bringing the fire and Holy Spirit to the water baptism of John, Jesus sanctified the act of being baptized into Him. The early Christian Saint, Ignatius of Antioch wrote a Letter to Ephesians in about 110 AD, saying that 'Jesus' was baptized so that by His passion, He might purify the water" (chap. 18). St Ignatius is saying that Jesus submitted Himself to baptism for us. The water did not 'sanctify' him. Rather, He sanctified the water.
