- We will have an ice cream social after registration on Wednesday and evening snacks on Thursday and Friday.

The Movie "The Great Escape" By Tom Nielsen

Club members met on January 18th at the Powerland Museum to enjoy the movie "The Great Escape." The 1963 movie is based on historical events of an escape of 76 Allied POWs from a German Camp, Stalag Luft III, during World War II. Some interesting facts:

The cast included numerous veterans. Among them, Donald Pleasance, was an RAF radio operator. His bomber was shot down in August 1944 and he was a POW in a German camp. When he made some suggestions during filming of the movie to the director, he was politely asked to keep his opinions to himself. Until the director learned he had been a POW, and then requested his technical advice.

The actor that played the German commandant, Hannes Messemer, served in the German army and was in a Russian POW camp.


Steve McQueen did a lot of the motorcycle riding in the film, including several scenes portraying German riders. For example, when McQueen's character strings a wire across the road to flip a German motorcyclist, McQueen performed that stunt wearing a German uniform. During the motorcycle chase scenes, he would often outrun the actors following him and had to slow down. Members of the cast often took the motorcycles to the local town (it was filmed in Bavaria). McQueen (and others) was caught and briefly jailed for speeding through a speed trap. The famous 60foot jump over the barbed wire fence was performed by Bud Ekins. The motorcycle scenes were not based on historical events, but were added at McQueen's suggestion.

2020 One Motorcycle Show *By Tom Nielsen*

This years One Motorcycle Show (One Show) was held at Veterans Memorial Coliseum on February 7, 8, and 9th. One of the many sponsors was Indian Motorcycle. Because 2020 was the 100th Anniversary of the Indian Scout, Thor Drake asked Jennifer if she could round-up some old Scouts for display. In meetings preparing for the One Show, Thor also said this year they would dedicate a room to vintage and antique motorcycles. We could invite as many as we could get, and as for Scouts, any condition, the more patina the better. So Jen and I started polling AMCA and other vintage bike club members to get bikes and especially Scouts. We were able to get nine Scouts and well over 40 antique bikes. A total of 265 motorcycles were registered, not counting racing bikes and vendor bikes



On the Wednesday before the show, we met with the production team, who were new to the One Show - they turned out to be the best ever. The leaders of the production team reviewed logistics, staffing, security, first aid, and other details. We did a tour of the coliseum to view the main bike display in the exhibit hall and layout for the concourse. The exhibit hall was





Exhibit Hall at Memorial Coliseum empty with bike platforms getting ready for the One Show.

empty, except for volunteers moving bike platforms and setting up booths.

The room for the vintage bikes was about 50 feet by 35 feet. It had square carpet tiles, which made a handy grid to help us layout spaces for the bikes. Jen and I placed blue painter tape to designate walkways and numbered bike locations in the room. We assigned slots in the vintage room to emphasize the Scouts and Indian bikes, as well as accommodate tables for the NW Vintage Car and Motorcycle Museum, Vahan Dinihanian's 1918 Indian, as well as OTC, and OVM clubs/members.

Jen had been assembling the master list of bike entrants for months. It was maintained on a shared drive and she and Thor went back and forth adding and refining the list. We also had a separate list of vintage bikes. The day prior to the show, we had copies of the list printed on 11x17 paper of the 6-1/2 pages of bikes. We also prepared a checklist for the stations at builder check-in, spare bike tags,

signs for OTC bikes, etc. This year we had six volunteers to escort bikes from the check-in table to either the vintage room, the exhibit hall, or the main concourse. Two other volunteers helped direct builders with unloading and parking. For check-in, we had four folks that had builders complete a waiver, verify contact and bike information, complete a tag for the bike, assign a number, provide wrist bands, and hand out SWAG bags and oil diapers (as needed for incontinent bikes).

This being the first year at the coliseum there were some teething pains. Unloading and

staging and parking were sometimes a challenge for builders. But overall, I think it was a resounding success. The unofficial attendee count was 60,000 people. The coliseum courts/ice arena was cleared out and loads and loads of dirt were brought in for the flat track races. It was fantastic to be able to watch the races from the arena and be able to see the entire track. The bands were in a separate room, which meant that the noise was more muted than in previous years (at previous One Shows, the music was so load you could not carry on a conversation). Now you could easily talk in the main exhibit hall and vintage room.

Without a doubt, this was my favorite One Show.
