Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time Lk 18:1-8

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Truth has an obstinate tendency to just not go away! Deepest within our Christian faith is the conviction that good overcomes evil, and truth triumphs over deception. At His trial in front of Pilate, Jesus said, "For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth" (John 18:37). Pilate just wanted Jesus to go away, but the Truth-Jesus remained. Through persecution and even death, Jesus testified to truth. Jesus did speak less in his torture and execution, than He had in earlier public teachings. But at this later stage of His truth-telling through torture and execution, Jesus let His noble and graceful actions under fire testify to His Eternal Truth. And , the glorious resurrection of Jesus vindicated and proved His 'persistent truth'! Jesus is 'The Way, the Truth and the Life' (john 14:6). Truth and goodness do overcome lies and sin. Good begets life eternally. Jesus' Word of teaching and the Witness of His life triumph over everything that tries tearing it down, or smearing it. Justice endures. Jesus told his followers at the Last Supper in John 16:33 "These things I have spoken to you, so that in Me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world." And glory be to God that He shares that abiding truth with us and plants the eternal in us by teaching us and giving His life to us. 1 John 2:14 says, "the Word of God abides in you, and you have overcome the evil one {through it}." So today's gospel shows a holy and innocent widow woman turn a corrupt judge around to render a good and just verdict. Despite himself, and through her insistence on good being served, she brings the judge to rule justly at least once. She is not only long-suffering and patient to see her case finally and fairly heard, but she leads a 'dirty' judge to at least one time, know what the purity of justice looks like in his court. What kept bringing that poor widow back to court every day again and again requesting justice from his court? It is her conviction/faith in the power of goodness. Her strong and active faith overcomes the sinful motives and lazy inaction of the judge. Maybe a 'naysayer' would suggest that she simply wears him down (like a squeaky wheel getting greased), but that completely overlooks her motivation for good that strengthened her to keep going back every-day-('I get knocked down, but get back up again...'). Eventually, even the bad judge sees something of 1) the light of truth's eternity or 2) reasonable conformity to a public standard, or 3) at least the simple good of order. Something in her faithful witness tips his balance back toward good. Whatever it might have been in his own heart, he does come to see the virtue and excellence of her patient and daily witness to justice. People of faith call it belief in a Good God, that we have a universal creator and personal redeemer embodied incarnate in witness of Christ Jesus (Christian Faith!)

Once when Jesus was tempted to strike back in counter attack, when maligned by the Pharisees accusing Him of 'demonic possession', He simply reminded his detractors that good overcomes evil. Jesus indicated that evil partly does this to itself, undermining itself through its disorder and deception. He said, "Every kingdom divided against itself, will be laid waste, and house will fall against house" (Luke 11:17). Jesus is advocating wisely advocating a prudent and non-aggressive witness to truth (much like in His teaching 'those who live by the sword, die by the sword' (Matthew 26:52). Jesus points out that evil's chaotic nature undoes itself. Yes, there is an honor among thieves only so long as they are not taking from each other. But inevitably, greed overcomes them and they steal from one another and then helter-skelter, they all downwardly crash and burn. The law of the jungle as the musician Axle Rose sings it, is "Welcome to the jungle, you can have anything you like, but you better not take it from me." So evil inevitably collapses in on itself, since only selfishness and sin rules. I remember how many times as a child I was told by mother or father, 'Now tell the truth up front. It is easier that way and final. You don't have to work so hard, fearfully keeping straight your different lies." Telling the truth means you don't have to 'keep together' your story, because the Truth holds on its own.

I love the wonderful poem of Ceslaw Milosz (catholic poet-born in Lithuania), titled "You who Wronged". He lived under brutally unjust Communist rule in Poland. Some lines of this poem are inscribed on the monument honoring some of the protesting Solidarity workers who were murdered by the government in Gdansk, Poland. Its call for perseverance and faithful truth-keeping reminds me of the strong widow woman that Jesus celebrates in his parable today. Ceslaw Milosz offers this great line of warning to tyrants about the eternal persistence of truth. He writes, "Do not feel safe. The poet remembers. You can kill one, but another is born. The words are written down, the deed, the date." The gospel widow would tell us, "Keep at it. Justice prevails! If it's good, it overcomes. Patience always precedes justice."
