

I Love to Tell the Story

[note: This is Pr. Paul's final newsletter article and, thus, represents his last words to us.]

What a summer this has been with so may fears arising over the virus and discipleship/witnessing! What am I talking about? I'm talking about my article in the MAY/JUNE newsletter, in which I suggested that pastors are apostles and the members of congregations are disciples. I showed Biblical evidence for this in Luke as 72 followers were sent out to witness, preach, and heal. In our case, we are sent out by the pastor (or worship assistant) at the conclusion of worship with the words, "Go in peace. Serve the Lord." or "Go in peace. Remember the poor," or "Go in peace. Share the God News," or "Go in peace. Christ is with you." Copies of my article are in the church office or online if you want to read it again.

The second part of the article talked about witnessing to others. Yes, I am well aware that most church members are fearful of witnessing. That's why I discussed an easy yet caring method to witness that most people can feel comfortable doing. Most of us have experienced having someone describe something terrible that is happening to them, making them feel like they are caught in the middle of a storm. What can you do in this situation? You can first show that you are listening by repeating back what you have heard them say. After they have acknowledged that you have heard them, they may say more about their troubles. This is the point at which you have an opportunity to share with them what you have encountered in your life that is similar to their situation and how your faith and trust in God helped you get through your storm to safety and peace.

Some of us are already doing this, and I want to encourage you to continue. I would add one part of this witnessing that I did not share: the invitation. Believe me, this is essential to the life of a disciple of Jesus Christ. We are called to invite others to church. If the person to whom you are speaking does not have a church home, offer to pick up his/her family and bring them to worship. If he/she says, "No, we will come by ourselves," say, "That is fine. I will meet you there (at a certain time)." It is important that you sit with these guests because it is hard for a visitor to know what to do and when in the service. This is true even if they say that they are Lutherans. Not all Lutherans worship in the same way, and no two buildings are the same. This is simply being hospitable, as we are commanded to be in the Holy Scriptures.

As you are walking with them through the halls, you can point out the restrooms, office, library, and lounge. After the service, make sure you introduce them to the people around you, and if you don't know the names of people around you, this will give you the opportunity to greet them and introduce the new family. We want to show people that ours is a hospitable church that welcomes everyone.

I hope you are taking advantage of the opportunities that God is placing in front of you to help others get through their storms to safe harbor. You can do this if you allow the light of Christ to shine in and through you. Shine, my friend. Shine brightly.

- 3. I can be anything I want, if it is being faithful to God.

This is a modern, fast-paced city that still embraces its traditional roots. Even though the city is large, there's a sense of cleanliness and order about Tokyo that makes it extremely accessible to visitors, and keeps it consistently rated by Conde Nast as one of the best cities in the world.

T apan is a country of 126 million people but only 1% of this country is Christian. In 1597, in order to stamp out foreign influence (namely from the Spanish and Portuguese), Japan executed 26 missionaries and others Japanese Christians by crucifixion (the Church commemorates this event on February 5, "The Martyrs of Japan"). The Christian witness has been stymied and suppressed over the centuries in Japan like few other places. Praise the Lord, Christians are not persecuted in Japan today, yet there are few converts in this largely secular culture. The Lutheran witness has been minute over the centuries. That has not prevented Lutherans from working hard to preach, teach and live the Gospel of Jesus Christ in Japan. There are some 30,000 Lutherans living in that country. The Japan Evangelical Lutheran Church has 23,000 members in 122 congregations. The work of the Lutherans in Japan takes stamina, courage and faith! Who ever heard of Lutherans in Japan? More than you think! Being small with very limited resources doesn't make witness and service any less important or effective. It is because the Holy Spirit is alive and working in Japan! And you are in *ministry there* as well as here at home through your stewardship! Remember that we are sowers. God does the planting and increases the growth! And the results are "a hundredfold."




[Welcome to Tokyo!]

Japan Lutheran Theological Seminary

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hen one thinks of a Lutheran seminary, he/ she usually thinks of Trinity in Columbus or Luther in St. Paul, or perhaps even in Germany or Tanzania. But did you know that there is a Lutheran seminary in Tokyo, Japan? It was established in 1909 by a predecessor body of the ELCA and is still in relationship to us. One of the ways we continue that support and cooperation with the Japan Lutheran Theological Seminary is through providing educators [missionaries] from the ELCA to teach at the Seminary as well as the Japan Lutheran College. Currently we have two pastors teaching at the Seminary and College. Rev. Dr. James Sack and his wife, Carol Manfred Sack, work with music-based pastoral care. Also teaching at ILTS and ILC is Dr. Andrew L. Wilson and his wife, Sarah Hinlicky Wilson serve as pastor to the English-language congregation at Tokyo Lutheran Church. The ELCA Global Mission division also supports pastors, missionaries and several young adults [Young Adults in Global Mission] teaching English. Half-way around the world we are contributing to a ministry in Christ in a land that is only 1% Christian! This is what Stewardship is all about!

Lutherans in Southeast Asia

Did you know that there is a Lutheran Church in Papua New Guinea?//After 13 years of harsh work, the first baptism in PNG was in 1899. Today the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Papua New Guinea has 1.2 million members, 16% of the total population of the country.

- Did you know that there are more Lutherans in Indonesia than in the U.S. [ELCA]? The world's largest Muslim country also is one of the world's largest Lutheran countries. In the 1820's, Protestants brought the gospel to the Batak people without success. It wasn't until 1861 that German missionaries began baptizing the Batak. Today Protestants make up the second largest religious body in Indonesia. The Batak Christian Protestant Church [a member of the Lutheran World Federation] has 6 million members, the largest Lutheran Church in Asia.
- Are there Lutherans in China? While it is impossible to know, we do know that, according to the government, there are 38 million Protestants (2018) and 10-12 million Catholics. There are probably tens of millions more unaccounted for, making China one of the world's largest Christian countries!

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Good grief, it is August. The summer is slipping by in all the family gatherings and friend gatherings and open church and shopping for the heck of it. Isn't it wonderful? Not too long ago, Med Mutual sent Paul (not me!) a flyer about shedding pandemic pounds with "mini-habits." Mini-habits are small behaviors that you do every single day. They are intentionally simple, so you can do them even on your worst day. On days when you have more energy or motivation, you can do bonus reps.

Here are some mini habits to get you started.

- \Rightarrow Eat one extra serving of fruit or vegetables.
- \Rightarrow Swap out one unhealthy snack for a healthy one.
- \Rightarrow Swap out one sugary beverage for a glass of water.
- \Rightarrow Prepare one healthy meal at home.
- \Rightarrow Stretch one body part.
- \Rightarrow Get up from your chair and sit back down.
- March in place for one minute. \Rightarrow
- \Rightarrow Dance for one song.

I think you get the idea. Now add to the list and go for it. (The source for all this is "Mini Habits for Weight Loss" by Stephen Guise."



I must also remind you of the reading challenge. Read and make notes on the papers on the library table of two books you choose from your church library. One, a book on becoming a better Christian and one, a book of your choice. The glass jar will hold your papers.

My reading hasn't stopped; I merely got started on several books at once. I have begun Eleanor and Roosevelt by Joseph P. Lash, which is just short of 1000 pages. It is slow work, especially in that a Roosevelt marries a Roosevelt, so her family and his family all have the same last names and some of the same first names. So, I am taking my time with it.

I am slowly reading How Can I Help? – Stories and Reflections on Service by Ram Dass and Paul Gorman. My oldest step-son Adam wanted me to read this. (I love that instinct in him!) The text provides stories of others and how they serve that we can draw ideas from others when we are needed to help.

I am also working with Jim Henson's "The Storyteller" by Anthony Minghella. It is based on Henson's I borrowed from the church library Great Short Stories of the World, a fun book when you have ten And, of course, our church book club just finished discussing The Keeper of Lost Things by Ruth

television series, nine traditional European folk and fairy tales. And the illustrations are delightful. minutes to sit and read. Some stories I have read, some I have never heard of – good reading. Hogan, the novel one of the new genre known as magical realism. Always a touch of magic or the
