Sermon Sunday July 30, 2023

Genesis 29:15-28; Psalm 105:1-11,45b; Romans 8:26-39; Matthew 13:31-33,44-52.

Sisters and brothers in Christ,

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

This week we continue to go through Jesus' parables as recorded in the gospel according Matthew, chapter thirteen. Today in our Gospel reading we had five parables of the Kingdom of heaven, or the Kingdom parables as they are usually called. The parable of a mustard seed, the parable of leaven, the parable of a man who bought the field, and the parable of a merchant who bought a pearl, and the parable of a net. Today we'll focus on first four of these parables.

Let's begin with 'mustard seed' and 'leaven'. What are they about? Of course, it's easy — about the Kingdom of heaven. But, wait, what is this Kingdom of heaven? Parables won't help us to understand what Jesus is trying to tell us about this Kingdom, if we don't even know what this Kingdom is. This is important. Language can be and often is confusing. And we want to communicate our message as clearly as possible. So, what is this Kingdom of God? It is us. The Kingdom of God is all God's choses people, chosen before the creation of the world, called and gathered together under one King, Jesus Christ, the Son of God. This is the everlasting Kingdom that was prophesized already in the Old Testament times by Samuel, Daniel and others. This is the Kingdom which will surpass all kingdoms, and which will remain forever. So where is this Kingdom of God? Good question. Where his chosen people live according to the

laws of His Kingdom? Where we live having Jesus as the highest authority. How is that? When we live not using others for our benefit, but serving others with all our gifts and resources. When we turn greed into generosity, self-promotion and arrogance into humility and forgiveness. When instead of restlessness we live in peace.

Now, back to the parables. It is important to notice how Jesus begun these parables. The kingdom of heaven IS like. IS like. Not will be like, but is like. What Jesus is telling us is what His Kingdom, His reign looks like these days. And, honestly, it looks embarrassing. Would you agree? Do you see much of splendor of His so-called reign? Is His Kingdom really superior that all others? Can you see that this Kingdom in the ultimate Kingdom, that this King, Jesus Christ, is the one to whom all knees will bow? I don't know about you, but I don't see it. I can't see it. And people in Jesus' time couldn't see it either. They had been waiting for this Kingdom to be established for centuries and millennia. Now, this man, Jesus Christ, He claimed to be the promised Messiah. OK, but when are you going to establish your Kingdom? When will we receive our seats of honor in your Kingdom? When will you drive away all our enemies? When will finally our cause triumph? Jesus disciples were confused, as were many hundreds and thousands of those who witnessed miracles done by Jesus. When are you going to establish your Kingdom, so that we can see it? First two parables contain Jesus answers to our questions.

What happens when life does not work out the way we want? What do we do when we are surprised by the unexpected or devastated by the unwanted? All of us probably have experienced those moments. For some it is the breakup of a relationship. For others it may be the breakdown of physical or mental health. The unexpected may show up as the loss of a job or the failure of a business. There are all sorts of ways in which, no matter how hard we work, how good we are, or what we do, life just does not give us what we want. The problem is that life doesn't always work that way. In fact, Jesus says that is not even how the kingdom of heaven works. Sometimes real life, kingdom life, is like a net dragged through the sea. It pulls up both the good and the bad. Other times it is like a field that you see day after day. It's always there. Not much changes. It's just an ordinary field like any other field except that it is not. Deep within that ordinary dirt is unseen treasure waiting to be discovered.

Most of us have lived long enough to know that, despite our desires and hopes, we do not always get what we want. The good and the bad, the dirt and the treasure, are never far from each other. Nothing is as it seems. What you see is not always what you get. Sometimes you choose Rachel and you wake up with Leah. That's when we have to make a decision about our faith and how, or even whether, we will move forward. Can we trust that there is more happening in life than we can see or understand? Can we look at a mustard seed, the smallest of seeds, and see contained within it the greatest of shrubs, a tree in which birds' nest? Or is our faith limited to what we see here and now, what can be verified by facts and logic, to what fits our desires and expectations? That is the dilemma we are facing in our world today as we receive what we did not choose. Those are the questions many in this country must answer as they look for a job, go without healthcare, or struggle to make ends meet. That faith question is the challenge for everyone who has ever thought life was one way and discovered it was another. That's where Jacob is today.

We each have stories of family dysfunction, sorrow, loss, despair, and brokenness; stories of how things did not work out for us, sometimes through our own fault and other times simply by chance or the circumstances of life. Those stories are probably not the first place we turn to when we are looking for God. That's not generally where we expect to find God. What you see, however, is not always what you

get. God is always somehow mixed into our stories of dysfunction, brokenness, sorrow, and despair like yeast mixed in with three measures of flour. You can't see it or separate it out but it is there, working, leavening, and transforming the flour into something new and alive.

Even when we choose Rachel and we get Leah the leaven of God's life, the leaven of God's love, the leaven of God's presence, the leaven of God's healing is working within us to transform and make new our lives. The leavening power of God within us can do more than we can ask or imagine. What we see is not all we get. Hear, then, another parable. The kingdom of heaven is like a man who chose Rachel, the younger daughter, the beautiful and graceful one, to be his wife and after the wedding he awoke in the morning with Leah, the older daughter. What Jesus is telling is that when the Kingdom of heaven will be revealed in its glory, it will be such a surprise for us, for it will be much, much better, much, much greater that we could ever imagine. This is where we are heading. To the reality that exceeds all our dreams.

Sometimes we don't know what to do with the section of God's Kingdom that we've been given. Even right now, we are in flux, we don't know what the future holds for the church. But even in that unknowing, we have an advocate, the Holy Spirit that helps us in our weakness and intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words. As Paul says in today's reading from his letter to the Romans, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." It might not look like what we think it should look like, but God knows better. We must trust God. The God that uses what others think is unusable. The God that calls us to love others with reckless abandon. The God that sees in us what others cannot see. By living this way, we become of what the Kingdom of Heaven is made. Amen.
