

BY LAWS OF THE Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. ARTICLE VII

Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and The common doctrinal beliefs are proper doctrine. essentially as follows.

- Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- Creation and Formation.
- Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation.
- Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.
- Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ.
- Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.
- Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.
- Washing of Feet.
- Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers.
- Do not condone divorce and remarriage.
- Destruction of the Wicked
- Conditional Immortality.
- Rapture of the Man Child Class.
- Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly.
- A ministry supported by tithes and offerings.

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not in consistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world.

And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols?for ye are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you, And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty." II Corinthians 6:14-18.

"Love not the things of the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever. Little children, it is the last time; and as ye have heard that antichrist shall come, even now are there many antichrists: whereby we know that it is the last time... But the annointing which ye have received of him abideth in you and ye need not that any man teach you; but as the same annointing teacheth you of all things, and is truth, and is no lie, and even as it hath taught you, ye shall abide in him. And now, little children abide in him; that when he shall appear, we may have confidence, and not be ashamed before him at his coming. If ye know that he is righteous, ye know that every one that doeth righteousness is born of him." 1 John 2;15-18, 27-29.

It all began with "Gone With the Wind". One little word that shouldn't have been said. Then the next time maybe it was two words. After awhile it was another and another and another. Then it was one "little" immoral act. And then a few more. On and on it went until it has reached the point where nothing is taboo.

As we become immune by the constant barrage of these things, we have been so conditioned that they are no longer sin, they are the norm for the world we live in today. The young people of this generation think that swearing, immorality and violence are just a part of every day life.

God hasn't changed. Sin is still sin. These things are wrong. We are the ones who have changed and it's not a change for the better. We are so used to all of the things that go on in the world that they no longer shock us. We have become so desensitized to sin and because of it we let all these things in our homes through the television, movies, music and computers.

Many of our older generation of Apostolics believed that we should not go to movies and that we should not have a television in our homes. I have found through my life experiences that they were right and I totally agree with them.

When I look at my own children I see the adverse effect TV, movies and music have on them. This was especially true of my daughter Christina. Movies like "Romeo and Juliet" romanticize "dying for love". The music of today is full of hopelessness, anger, violence and suicide. There is no doubt in my mind that the seeds planted in her mind convinced her that suicide was an acceptable way out of her problems.

I thought I knew my daughter and knew everything she was doing, but I didn't. A lot of things go on without parents' knowledge. We have to be aware of what our children are watching, listening to and reading, even to the point that we have to snoop a little to know. Know your children -- who they are, what they are doing, who their friends are.

We won't know what our children are doing if we have our own noses glued to the television. TV is a time stealer. It steals the time we can spend with our family, teaching our children the ways of the Lord or just having fun with them. More importantly it steals time we can spend in fellowship with the Lord in prayer and His Word. How many of us can stare at the TV for several hours a day, but always be too tired to read His Word?


TV and computor games are addictive. People today expect to be entertained all the time. Children get "bored" if they can't watch TV or play the games. Just as with other things that are addictive (alcohol, drugs and tobacco) we have to totally remove them from our homes to be free. I'm not talking about throwing out your computer, but I am talking about removing the games that are nothing but killing. We also need to be aware of what our children are doing on the internet.

If you are a person who can watch just Christian shows that's fine. But what are your children watching when you are not around? And if you are tempted to watch "just a little" secular TV, before you know it you will be watching "a lot". It would be better to watch none.

And guys who are sports fans who justify it saying, "I just watch sports" - think about who the major advertisers and supporters of these programs are - the beer companies. Are these the kinds of ads you want filling your children's minds? And do you want your son growing up thinking it's acceptable to watch some of the "cheerleaders" of these games (remember the scripture at the beginning in 1 John 2:16 that talks about the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes?) or to hear the foul language and see the fights that occur in sporting events. What Would Jesus Do? I believe He would turn it off or get rid of it!

On the subject of movies, have you ever thought about where the money goes when you pay to see or rent a movie? It goes to Hollywood. It goes to support the lifestyles of people who mock and despise the things of God. Is this being a good "steward" of our Father's money?

Note: God's "clock" in this lesson is based on the lunar calendar and not Gregorian Calendar, developed first in 1582 by Pope Gregory VIII. (Genesis 7:11 and Genesis 8:3-4)

5 Reasons why I believe Jesus is Coming Soon!

I. The Times of the Gentiles

The "Times of the Gentiles", the 2000 year Church Age which began at the day of Pentecost, will soon be fulfilled.

A. Jerusalem trodden down until the "times of the Gentiles", is fulfilled.

B."Be not ignorant"...one day with the Lord is 1000 years".

C. Thousand years as yesterday. As a "watch" in the night.

D. At midnight there was a cry made, behold the bridegroom cometh. End of second watch or 2000 years.

(Note: God created all there is in 6 days of 1,000 years each, and rested on the 7th day for 1,000 years. A second 1,000 year rest day is coming, which is the Millenial Reign of Christ. The 5th day began at Pentecost, the 6th day 1,000 years later. The 7th day is about to dawn.

E. "It shall come to pass in the last days, I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh". (The last days began on the Day of Pentecost. When you see the term "last days" think of it as the last 2000 years before the millenium).

F. God hath in these last days spoken unto us by His Son.

G. After two days (2000 years) will he revive us in the **third day** (millennial reign) he will raise us up.

Eugene Kimball Cornell

Nov. 25, 1910 - Sept. 17, 1999

Eugene Kimball Cornell passed from this life after a lengthy illness Friday, Sept. 17, 1999, at 4:30 A.M. at the Grace Living Center in Woodward, OK where he resided for the past year.

Mr. Cornell was born to William and Elizabeth (Bushnell) Cornell on Nov. 25, 1910, in Leslieville, Alberta, Canada. The family lived in Canada a short time before returning to the states and homesteading 3 1/2 miles west of Laverne, OK. At the time the Cornell family made Laverne their home, the streets were all dirt with only a post office, bank, the Lake Agency, 2 wheat elevators, a grocery store and an auto garage.

During a revival conducted by the Reverends Jack Barker and Johnny Modrick, Gene found the truth of the gospel for which he had been searching. He gave his life to the Lord and continued working at the Laverne Tribune until he felt the call to the ministry. The late Floyd LaMunyon traveled with him as a song leader when he began his ministry. They traveled for about three years until he and Stella Yeakel were united in marriage, October 30, 1932, in the home of Rev. And Mrs. Jack Barker. After helping the Rev. Johnny Modrick in a revival, they began their own ministry in Arlington, KS., where they conducted a 6 week revival. Over 50 people were saved and then followed the Lord in deeper blessings. 40 people were baptized in water.

During the next few years they conducted revivals in Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Arkansas and Kansas. Following a revival conducted in the Orchard Community in the west part of Wichita, a church was built which remains today. They continued there until after the birth of their daughter, Yvonna. Later two sons were born to this union, the late William Eugene Cornell and Jack Dean Cornell.

During his first pastorate at Galena, Kansas, Mr. Cornell assisted the late Robert Parham in the publishing of the Apostolic Paper which was published with an old press back of the Parham home.

During a 60 plus years of ministry Rev. and Mrs. Cornell pastored churches in Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas and Nebraska. They were also in Southern California for a short time. After retiring due to the ill health of his wife Stella, he drove back and forth to Amarillo and Woodard to help both churches until they obtained pastors. In the late 60's he taught Theology at the Apostolic Faith Bible College.

Bro. Cornell still had a burning desire to attend church long after he was unable to do so. He never lost his love for God and the work of the Lord.

His children, Jack and Yvonna, feel that the rich heritage of faith and love for God was ingrained in them from birth through the faithfulness of their parents. It is a priceless treasure which they will always treasure. Though money was often tight during pastorates of small churches where money was nil, God was faithful to provide and their faith was deepened as God supplied the needs of the home.

Bro. Cornell's children and grandchildren cherish the memories they have of outstanding sermons delivered by their father and grandfather under the anointing of the Holy Spirit. He always made the way to God so plain that people responded to God's call. How blessed they all felt to sit under his ministry.

Bro. Cornell was preceded in death by his parents, his wife Stella, a son Bill... three brothers Emmett, Walter and Ellis and his only sister Elizabeth.

Survivors include: A daughter, Yvonna Whiteley and husband Howard of Baxter Springs, KS.; their two children; Lachelle and Sam Yoder of Nokesville, VA., Lynn and Ute Whiteley, Ryan, Renee and Rebekah of Bristow, VA. A son; Jack Cornell and wife Kathryn of Woodward, OK., their two children: Tonya and Tony Weston, Chris, Shelby and Ty od Enid, OK. Kevin and Tena Cornell, Joshua, Jonathan and Rebekah of Springfield, MO. 
