TREASURER'S REPORT

REUNION RECAP: The Reunion was a great success and everyone had a good time and we were busy most of the time! The registrations brought in \$17,740 and other collections for Buses and Raffles brought in another \$3635 for a grand total of \$21,364. We paid out a total of \$20,473 in preparation and conducting the Reunion. The remaining \$800+ will be put into the upcoming Reunion in Norfolk.

Major item with the cost in parenthesis are Opry (\$4310), Coaches (\$2500), Sheraton for the Banquet and other items (\$4457), The lunch at Margaritaville was (\$2117), Lunch at the DFAC at Ft Campbell was (\$433). Additionally the Pizza was (\$400), and we spent (\$1400) on the Hospitality. Finally we spent over (\$1750) for the handouts and administration

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items such as name tags, printing and miscellaneous items. All in all we spent most of the funds we received as it should be. We also will be returning over (\$1500) in refunds for those who notified they could not make the reunion.

Lieutenant General (Lt. Gen.) Jeffrey W. Talley is the senior leader for the United States Army Reserve, a single component and command of the United States Army. His first active duty leadership position was with 1st Platoon,

Company A, 39th EN BN (CBT) at Ft Devens. Sworn in as the 32nd Chief of Army Reserve (CAR) on 9 June 2012, he also assumed duties as the 7th Commanding General of United States Army Reserve Command. As CAR, he is the principal staff adviser to the Secretary of the Army and the Army Chief of Staff on all Army Reserve Affairs. He develops Army Reserve budgets, training programs and policy decisions; manages the Army Reserve troop program units, individual mobilization augmentees, and the active guard/reserve program; and serves as the appropriation director of all Army Reserve funds. He also commands all Army Reserve troop program units worldwide, with total end strength of 205,000 Soldiers and 12,600 civilians. and an operating budget of over \$9 billion dollars.

Lt. Gen. Talley graduated from Louisiana State University in 1981 with a Regular Army commission in the Corps of Engineers. During more than 31 years of active and reserve service, he has commanded units at every echelon, from platoon to division-level, with duty in Korea, Kuwait, Iraq, and the United States. In February 2003, he mobilized and deployed in support of OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM/OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM as Chief of Operations, 416th Engineer Command, Coalition Joint Forces Land Component Command. Upon return from theater, he served in the Pentagon as a strategic planner in the Deputy Directorate for the War on Terrorism, Strategic Plans & Policy Directorate (J-5), Joint Chiefs of Staff. In January 2008, he mobilized again, deploying in support of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM where he was the Commander, 926th Engineer Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Multi-National Division-Baghdad and the Baghdad Provincial Engineer. From June 2009 to April 2012 he served as Commanding General, 84th Training Command at Ft. Knox, KY where he was responsible for assessing the readiness of Army Reserve units through Combat Training Center-like exercises. He also served on the Secretary of Defense's Reserve Forces Policy Board from 2009 to 2012.

Prior to his return to active military service, Lt. Gen. Talley was President & CEO and Co-Founder & Lead Investor of Environmental Technology Solutions (ETS Partners); and also, an Adjunct Professor at The Johns Hopkins University. Other civilian experiences include leadership positions at Southern Methodist University, University of Notre Dame, Malcolm Pirnie, Inc., and the Corps of Engineers. He has over 31 years of experience in multiple academic, design, consulting, and military positions involving hundreds of environmental and business projects throughout the United States and abroad.

Lt. Gen. Talley holds a Ph.D. in Civil and Environmental Engineering from Carnegie Mellon University and an Executive M.B.A. from the University of Oxford in England. He also holds multiple master's degrees in strategic studies, environmental engineering and science, liberal arts

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(history and philosophy), and religious studies. He is a graduate of the Army War College. He is also a registered Professional Engineer, a Board Certified Environmental Engineer in Environmental Sustainability, and a Diplomate, Water Resources Engineer.

Lt. Gen. Talley and his wife, Linda, have four grown children: Christopher, Joshua, Matthew, and Ashley; and a Labrador named Baxter. Their youngest son, Army 1st Lieutenant Matthew Talley, is a combat veteran.

Lt. Gen. Talley's awards and decorations include the Army Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit Medal, three Bronze Star Medals, the USACE Silver De Fleury Medal, four Meritorious Service Medals, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, two Army Commendation Medals, four Army Achievement Medals, Parachutist and Air Assault Badges, Ranger Tab, and the Army Staff, Joint Staff and Office of the Secretary of Defense Identification Badges.

Now is the time to mark your calendar for next year's 39th Reunion. We will be headquartered at the Sheraton Inn Downtown. We have blocked 60 rooms to get things started and early reservations are highly encouraged. Remember, a reservation does not cost anything until you arrive and you can cancel up to 6:00 pm the day prior to arrival so there are no risks. If you are considering attending, please make the hotel reservation NOW. The reservation number is 800-325-3535. Be sure to reference the 39th Engineer Battalion Reunion to get the discounted rate of \$99, which is good for 3 days prior and 3 days following our reunion for those who like to make it a longer visit. Included in this rate is free valet parking, which is a savings of at least \$22 per night. Once you have made your reservation please let me know via email or phone to assure that we have you in our block or rooms. If we need more rooms, it is necessary to know early so we can increase our block. Reservations must be made by September 1, 2015 or the balance of the rooms are returned to the hotel inventory and our rate is no longer protected.

This year should prove to be a very economical gathering as the events are both close to the hotel and very reasonably priced and we will not need to charter any motor coaches unless we add an optional event outside of the downtown area.

Reunion 2015 – Norfolk VA – Sheraton Inn Downtown Oct. 1-5, 2015

Next year we are going to hold our reunion on the east coast and have selected The Norfolk Virginia Downtown Sheraton Inn as our HQ. Our rate is again held at \$99 per night - a very good rate for the area. Included in the package is FREE valet parking, normally a \$15-20 per day fee. All rooms are Harbor facing rooms giving every attendee a great view. All of our activities will be within walking or hotel shuttle distances so we will not need to charter a coach or need to drive anywhere. We have a block of 60 rooms set aside for us but if we fill those early we will be able to increase the block so we can all be together for the entire reunion.
