This time I just made appointments for the both of us. Since the last time I drove and ran over some curbing Charlemagne has done the driving out of fear, especially now that there are "roundabouts" I often like to ignore (I don't really ignore

So it took two weeks for the appointments, then another two weeks to get those little "gold nuggets" (they are not inexpensive) and now another two weeks to try them out.

You guessed it, I'm the one "tuning in" my hearing aide and actually hearing the dishwasher and washing machine. I also hear the television which I now realize really was way too loud. It's no wonder our daughter-in-law leaves early in the morning - she's probably running a numbers racket or pool as to how loud we've got the television on that day.

Charlemagne, meanwhile, will not put those hearing aids in unless I threaten him - which he



DONATE YOUR TREE NUTS TO LINN COUNTY CONSERVATION

Linn County's forests sustained significant damage from the 2020 derecho, with over 70% of the tree canopy lost in some areas. The Linn County Conservation Department (LCCD) is encouraging you to collect and share your oak acorns and hickory nuts so that they can be planted. The plan is to use them to renew the forests in Wanatee Park and Morgan Creek Park public woodlands. The LCCD is requesting acorns from the following species: Red Oak, Black Oak, White Oak, Burr Oak, Chinkapin Oak and Swamp White Oak as well as Shagbark Hickory nuts. If you can help, the nuts and acorns can be dropped off at the Wanatee Park Maintenance Shop at 4351 Wanatee Lane Cedar Rapids (just south of the campground) between 7 am and 7 pm between now and October 15th . Signs will indicate the proper dropoff location. Thank You.

Heartfelt Gratitude

I am not sure where to begin because there is so much to be thankful for. The generosity was so overwhelming and unexpected.

There is the physical heart transplant I received, and I can barely fathom the processes involving the donor, all the doctors and all the nurses. The thoughts and obligations of it all will be with me in constant consideration for the rest of my life.

And then there is the emotional heart we received from family, friends, neighbors, coworkers, our community with food, cards, phone calls, money, favors and from people that we never met; it has been beyond comprehension. We may never be able to thank everyone adequately but please know we appreciate and love all of those who touched us.

I know you were all supporting me while I was in the hospital but I had the easy part in this whole ordeal: for the first month, I was barely even aware of what was going on, there were times when my room was full of the top cardiologists at the UIHC, all I had to do is follow what they told me and if I ever needed anything all I had to do was press a button and a nurse would come in with a smile.

It was Angela, Celeste and Giselle that had the hard part: they had to make the life and death decisions, they had to go in several times to say good bye, they were the ones to hold my hand when I didn't even know they were there, they had to travel each of the101 days all while maintaining things at home. The support that came from family and friends made their lives so much easier and reduced the stress and frustration that permeated all aspects the hospitalization, travel, and everyday life at home that carried on despite other events.

Having such a wide and deep network of support is what got us through 101 days. Knowing that this network was looking after my family is what got me out of the hospital into rehab, back home and on the road to recovery.

We are eternally grateful for all that has been done for us and I pledge the remains of my days to living my life in appreciation of these gifts I have received.

Did You Know?....

"To be Pre-1932 or not to be Pre-1932, that is the question". With a tip of the hat to Shakespeare, that really IS the question around the Amana Colonies. Every homeowner should know what the zoning is for their parcel of land. If your home or structure was built prior to 1932, then it would be designated to be in a HP (Historic Preservation) District. Typical zoning categories would be HP-R (Residential) or HP-C (Commercial). Houses or structures built after 1932 do not carry a HP designation.

The best way to become familiar with this (and check your parcel) is to go to www.aclud.org and click on the "Zoning Maps" link.
