Gentiles — as well as the Jews.

During this season it is a good time to pay special attention to missions. Our 2012 district convention approved supporting a mission project through the LCMS. We have been aiding mission efforts in Peru with financial support, usually to support the work happening in Lima. It has been my privilege to travel there to witness what is going on, support the missionaries who have come

and gone, and attend FOROs, where those who support the Peru mission gather to learn what is happening, and give support and insight.

When mission work in other countries takes place, one of the hopes is that eventually the mission workers and financial support from the United States will no longer be necessary as the church is strong enough to be on its own. Right now the work in Peru is moving in the right direction. On Oct. 23, an important step was taken when Rev. Jeancarlos Ramírez, a native of Lima, was ordained and installed as pastor of the church in La Victoria, an industrial area of Lima. Pastor Ramírez, who was surrounded by family and friends for his installation, also serves as chaplain of the Castillo Fuerte Mercy House in La Victoria.

Jeancarlos graduated from Concordia Reformer Lutheran Seminary in the Dominican Republic. His journey began in the kitchen of Castillo Fuerte. It was there he became interested in what the children were being taught, which eventually led him to go to the seminary. It did not hurt that he was also falling in love with Deaconess Caitlin, who has been serving there since 2013. The result? They are married with two children. Deaconess Caitlin is back doing her work and providing leadership in the Lima ministry.

Castillo Fuerte Mercy House reaches out to children in the neighborhood. They learn about Jesus, study Luther's Small Catechism, attend chapel services and are fed. As chaplain, Pastor

Hopefully we will be able to create more unity between the church and the afterschool program so that families attending Castillo Fuerte may also enter into the church family and benefit from the gifts God has for them.

Pastor Ramírez is not the first native of Lima to become a Lutheran pastor. One year earlier, Rev. Elvis Carrera was ordained and installed as the "first" native Lima Lutheran pastor. The majority of his ministry is at Los Olivos, with an emphasis on outreach to children.

COVID has hurt the ministry. Not all the children that were coming before COVID are back. But that has not detained the effort. A lot of time was spent reaching out and staying in touch by using technology.

Rev. Walterson Siewert is another missionary in Lima, and his is focusing on the San Borja area. He has been making progress in drawing people to worship or Bible study. It is at that location where the church's office is located, and where visitors sleep, eat and gather.

IMPACT

Jesus taught using parables. These were short stories that contained spiritual truths. One of those parables was the story of a sower and his seed. There is timeless truth in Jesus' words.

We look at this parable within the context of an average audience coming to hear the Word in a worship service in our culture today. We find four different hearers (soil types) of the Word (the seed).

"When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it. the evil one comes and snatches away what has been sown in his heart. This is what was sown along the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy, yet he has no root in himself, but endures for a while, and when tribulation or persecution arises on account of the word, immediately he falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches chokes the word, and it proves unfruitful.

As for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it. He indeed bears fruit and vields. in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty" MATT. 13:19-23

A pastor preaches the Word. The message does not change regardless of the ears and heart condition of the four kinds of hearers. It is the impact that varies.

Satan, the world and our flesh are opposed to the Word. Individually and collectively, they can diminish the impact of the Word. Life circumstances also play a part.

Using the context of this parable, only one in four hearers will prove fruitful. They gain understanding and they spread the Word to other hearers who become a part of the bountiful harvest.

Pastors can be discouraged as they focus on the impact of their ministry. They see so many whose lives remain unchanged. So few are bold messengers of the Word. They wonder, where is the bountiful harvest?

These pastors need to meditate on the words of the apostle Paul and Isaiah, who likely faced the challenges noted above.

And let us not grow weary in doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. GAL. 6:9 (ISAIAH 55:11)

Engineering majors wanted

Concordia University Wisconsin (CUW) has announced that, beginning in Fall 2024, CUW students can enroll in a Bachelor of Science program in chemical or industrial engineering. CUW's engineering programs are anchored in the liberal arts and designed to prepare engineers with a Lutheran worldview.

"Engineering has been on our radar for several years," said Dr. Leah Dvorak, CUW interim provost. "In addition to our exceptional faculty in the STEM areas and the abundance of updated labs and available workspace on Concordia's Mequon campus, a significant portion of the engineering curriculum is existing coursework, so our entry into this high-growth field is already rooted in expertise and experience."

The creation of these programs responds to a dire need for more engineers. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there are 2,000 openings for chemical engineers annually. Wisconsin has the third-highest concentration of industrial engineer jobs in the U.S., with an especially high need in counties within driving distance of CUW's Meguon campus.

"The jobs of the future are in STEM, particularly engineering," said Dr. Sarah Holtan, CUW special advisor to the president and architect of the engineering programs. "We see engineering as an investment not only in our university but also in the broader community. Our graduates will make a real impact on the state and nearby counties."
