hile the story of Moses' rise to become G-d's messenger and the leader of the Jewish people is captivating and inspiring, one might wonder why things could not have been done a bit more simply. Moses is after all a complex character, brought to the house of Pharaoh as a child and raised as an

Egypt was well received by the populace at more than one juncture in their travels from Egypt to the land of Israel. G-d needed a leader familiar with the Egyptian court who could represent the Jewish people; for this job there was only one candidate.


There was a significant religious

Egyptian prince, only to rebel against the oppression of his people, flee Egypt and settle in Midian, then be chosen by G-d despite his limited eloquence. Why couldn't G-d have simply not tapped someone in Goshen on the shoulder and said go to Pharaoh,

tell him what needs to be said, do what I tell you and the miracles will follow?

There are two keys to understanding G-d's choice of Moses, one political and the other religious.

Despite the frequent comparisons, the slavery of Jews in Egypt is different in many critical ways from slavery as practiced in the United States. The Jews in Egypt were citizens with rights of representation, as is clear from the possibility of their leaders getting an audience with Pharaoh as well as our knowledge of the political and social norms of Egypt at that time. While we were assigned labors that were harsh, and were certainly subject to corporal punishment, things were good enough that the notion of returning to



consideration as well. Much of the leadership of the Jewish people, and presumably the rank and file as well, had significant doubts about the prophecy claimed by Moses. This is clearly demonstrated after the decalogue as recorded in the book of

Deuteronomy, when Moses recounts how the heads of the tribes and the elders came to him and said, "today we have been shown that G-d can speak to a person and the person can live." As pointed out by the classical commentator Ibn Ezra, more assimilated members of the Jewish community had taken on the Egyptian belief that direct contact with the Divine is impossible, i.e. Moses cannot be talking to G-d. As for the miracles, everyone in Egypt knew that such wonders were possible because Egyptian sorcerers also performed some of them; perhaps to their mind Moses was simply the greatest sorcerer, despite his claims of divine support and guidance. This leads to the question: if a significant portion of the

uring the pandemic ridden, dreary, stayat-home winter days what would keep me busy?



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Jonathan Meister

Tt is very hard to find any silver linings in this past year of the COVID pandemic but if there is one for me it has been the opportunity to engage in what has always been one of my passions and that is reading for pleasure. While I have tended in the past few years to stick to popular fiction, particularly mysteries and thrillers, recently I have turned my attention to non-fiction and the most important of the books that I have read in just the last month has turned out to be extremely relevant to our times and particularly some of the concepts therein to the Jewish community. The book which I found so engaging and relevant is Morality by Rabbi Jonathan Sacks z"l" who passed away just recently.

One of the concepts that Rabbi Sacks expounds on to a great extent is the need to shift the world's focus and in particular the individual's focus from "I" to "We". It is a natural human tendency to focus on the self but he points out throughout his writing that humanity has always done better when they have worked together for the common good and the particular example that is most relevant to us is that the Jewish community has always done better when there is a commitment among the Jewish people to take care of each other. Studies have shown that those who are members of synagogues or commit to supporting charities have found greater personal happiness .

In the context of our Congregation, the concept of "what is in the best interests of the congregation" is not a hollow concept. We have to remember that whether it be our office staff, building staff, board of trustees and most particularly our clergy, they are doing and are charged with the obligation to do "what is in the best interest of the Congregation."

There is no doubt that we are still in the midst of very difficult times. Yet as I have said at board meetings and to many members of the Congregation with whom I am in touch on an almost daily basis as well as to our Clergy, we are doing the best that we can under the circumstances. Many people will argue that we can do more and maybe we can. However, I am asking everyone to also think about what they can do for all of us and to put aside whether it is something that is personal to them in their request or whether or not it is something that can benefit Congregation Shaarey Israel which must always be the standard.

There is no doubt that as an individual we have needs. Those needs may be for the Clergy to do something for them, for the office staff to do something for them but please bear in mind that whatever our staff and our Clergy do, it is always with the interests of all in mind. Some may want prayers or services to be run a certain way, some may want more calls or visits, or classes or zooms or board meetings or daily lectures. Yes, there might be more possible but there are many factors that have to be taken into consideration and it is not always what is for us as an individual.

As the February **Scroll** is published, it is the time of Tu B'Shvat. A time of renewal for the trees but also a time of renewal for the Congregation. There is great hope now as vaccines have become available with the hope that some new normal will return. The one normality that has remained is that we as a Congregation have managed to handle this pandemic by acting together as best we can. The hallmark of Congregation Shaarey Israel is that we abide by the concept of "We" versus I" in doing the best we can for each other. By keeping in touch with each other, by offering minyans on Monday and Thursday and Saturday morning. Board meetings continue, our staff is there for you when needed and our Rabbi and Chazzan are doing the best they can. As to our Rabbi and Chazzan I cannot thank them enough. We all need to remember that they are human beings as well with needs. Times are stressful for them as well and on top of that they have a Congregation to tend to at the same time. They are the most adept in embodying the concept of "We" versus "I" as they tend to our people and for that I want to say Thank You.

year. A whole bloody year. I cannot believe it. I blinked and a year has gone by since the world turned upside down. How do I know this? Because it all went crazy right after *Purim* last year. And now, this article is for the month in which *Purim* occurs this year. Inconceivable!

Of course, that's measured by the Jewish calendar. I count the secular calendar's begin date on March 16th. Not because it's my birthday, but because that is when I was first exposed to COVID-19 (I tested positive two weeks later), and that was the first time I broadcast a congregational *Mincha* service on Facebook Live. So, if you're counting by the secular calendar, we still have a little more than a month to go. Still, it has been an awfully long time since life was "normal."

The advent of the vaccine gives me hope that there is a light at the end of the tunnel and perhaps this long nightmare is finally reaching its end. Too much has been lost, too many people have lost their lives, too much time has been spent indoors, and too many relationships have suffered. The pandemic is hopefully going to end soon, and I wish to be able celebrate that with you in the near future. But, life will never be the same.

Make no mistake, a new normal will be found. People will go to work (although, perhaps more will work from home now), children will be born, *Bar and Bat Mitzvahs* and weddings will be celebrated, and the flow of life will return. I don't think that this pandemic will be easily forgotten though.

Back when this whole thing started, I had many discussions regarding what meaning we might be able to draw from all of this. It always struck me as significant that the primary cost to humanity, beyond the obvious cost in health and human lives, was the loss of our togetherness. When we needed our friends and family the most, we have been unable to be with them. I have seen weddings celebrated with barely a *Minyan*. Funerals are devoid of supporting attendees and families have had to bear the burden of sitting shiva without the comfort of visitors designed to ease their grief. The scars from these disastrous experiences may last their entire lives.

Social distancing has been forced

upon us for almost 11 solar months now and we will be marking a Jewish year when

Purim comes in a few short weeks. After all this time in the darkness, have we learned anything that we can take with us?

The *Talmud* (*Berachot 60b*) states: "A person should accustom themselves to say, 'All that the merciful one does, he does for good." The *Talmud* then proceeds to tell a famous story about Rabbi Akiva. He was traveling and arrived in a town but no one offered him hospitality (an almost unheard of thing in those days). So he camped in the field with his candle, his rooster, and his donkey. A wind blew out the candle, a fox ate his rooster and a lion killed his donkey. After each occurrence, Rabbi Akiva told himself that all that G-d does is for the best. The next morning, he awoke to find that the town had been attacked by an invading army and everyone had been captured. He repeated his axiom again, "All that G-d does is for the best."

The hardest part is to try and find good when it seems like the world is burning around you. How can one find anything good in a pandemic that has caused so much death and destruction?

One of the lessons our Rabbis teach us from the destruction of the first and second Temples, is that G-d was merciful in his punishment of his people. Whereas he could have utterly destroyed us, he vented the bulk of his anger on a building and, while it has been exceedingly unpleasant, it could have been much worse. The fact, as I have repeatedly stated, is that the Jewish people have outlived all those who wanted to destroy us. It is easy to complain about how G-d has treated his people but, in the end, we are still here when all of our old enemies are in the dust and no new enemy has succeeded in their attempts to destroy us.

Even in this pandemic, I see his kindness. The vaccine that is now being distributed is the result not just of six months of hectic efforts by pharmaceutical companies, but the result of many research efforts that have been going on for years. G-d prepared the world for this pandemic by putting the basis for the vaccine in motion long before the pandemic itself was unleashed on the world. As the *Talmud* tells us (*Megilla 13b*), "G-d does not punish Israel unless he has first

created the remedy." With the rest of the world, however, he first strikes and then creates the remedy. G-d guided researchers years ago in directions that allowed them to come up with vaccines for COVID-19 in record time. If they had been forced to work from scratch, I shudder to think where we might be.

Of course, there are still many questions and nothing is assured. We have to see how quickly the two vaccines used in the United States can be distributed, and their efficacy finally established in the real world. Still, hope is its own powerful medicine and, for the first time in a long time, I have hope that, as my father used to say in Yiddish, "*Mir zeining shoyn nenter vi veiter*," we are closer rather than further from the end.

It is with some pride I note that the Jewish people have had a significant role in the development of these vaccines. Pfizer's CEO is a Greek Jew and the son of holocaust survivors. Moderna's Chief Medical Officer is an Israeli Jew.

I do not know why *Hashem* does what he does. Last time I looked, I did not know of anyone with G-d's office or home telephone number so I doubt that anyone not in need of psychopharmacological intervention has spoken directly with him to find out. Still, I know he has a reason and that encourages me to try and glean what meaning I can from this. You can do the same. You do not have to come to the same conclusions I have over the past year, the meaning for you may be different than it is for me. I just think it would be a mistake for us to try to put the last year in a box and shove it somewhere dark and out of sight.

A great writer once said that the only way to deal with fear is to confront it and kick it in the teeth. I think the same is true with the last year. We need to confront it and do what we can to find a perspective. For me, finding meaning in it helps.

The theme of Purim is "V'nahafoch Hu," it turned over. The day of Purim was originally designated as a day for our destruction. Instead, Hashem turned it into a day of celebration. May our times of trouble come to a swift end, may our lives turn from one of worry to one of surety and confidence, and may our sorrows give way to light of Joy for us all.

Jewish people did not believe Moses was getting his instructions from G-d, why would they follow him? Perhaps because they knew that Moses had the military experience and familiarity with the desert terrain that would allow him to lead the people from indentured servants to independent landowners, a dramatic jump in personal status in the Ancient Near East. Had G-d chosen some righteous person from the land of Goshen who had no such experience one wonders if that person could ever have gotten the masses to follow him.

The notion that G-d's religious project requires secular training and preparation can be seen again in modern times through the miracle of the State of Israel. As we declare in our Shabbat prayers every week that the State of Israel is the flowering of our ultimate redemption, we do well to remember that the State of Israel was not founded by righteous persons observant of G-d's commandments, but rather mostly by pioneers who were overwhelmingly rebelling against traditional religion and as such had educated themselves and prepared themselves to build a modern yet secular nation-state.

It is this partnership between the religious and secular that is the strength of Israel and the very basis of Modern Orthodox Judaism. Our path forward will not be blazed by separatism and rejection of the modern world, but rather in the hybrid of religious and secular, through tolerance and openness, and through the pairing of the will of G-d and the actions of men and nations. In this spirit let us move forward towards healing our nation, our world and our Jewish people.
