The walking group adapted to ever changing rules, the jigsaw swap group was born and we squeezed in a summer, socially distanced picnic in the grounds of a



#### RECIPE CORNER

This recipe was sent in by Janine Lishman-Peat of Thurlstone & Millhouse Green WI

#### **Kedgeree Inspired Fishcakes with Low Fat Coleslaw**

#### Serves 2

#### For the Fishcakes

1 sweet potato (mine weighed 270g) baked in the microwave until soft, about 5 mins, take out of the skin and mash

- 2 fillets smoked mackerel flaked
- 2 hard boiled eggs chopped

half a bunch spring onions - chopped

- 2 tsp curry powder
- 4 tblsp rolled oats
- a little oil

#### For the Coleslaw

half a bunch spring onions

80g grated carrot

80g finely sliced white cabbage

juice and grated rind half a lemon

1 tsp Dijon or wholegrain mustard

80g natural Greek yoghurt

#### Method

Mix all the fishcake ingredients except the oats together. Form into 4 fishcakes and coat in the oats. Fry on both sides in a very little oil.

Put the coleslaw vegetables into a bowl. In another bowl mix together the lemon, mustard and yoghurt. Add salt and pepper if you like. Stir the dressing and the vegetables together and serve with the hot fishcakes.
