Discussion Questions (10%): For 10 of our class meetings (a little less than once per week), prepare at least two questions (20 total for the semester) you have about the material. Questions will be used as the basis for our discussion of the readings. These questions must be submitted to the appropriate discussion board on Canvas by the beginning of class. I will accept no more than two questions per week (one of each kind), thus you must be proactive and not wait until the end of the semester to submit all 20 questions.

The first question should focus on fact or understanding. I refer to these as "content questions." Questions of this type might be:

- o "I don't understand _____"
- o "What is meant by _____"?
- "Can someone explain the background of _____ to me"?

The second question should focus on the application or extension of a concept or theory. I refer to these as "philosophical or deeper meaning questions." Questions of this type might be:

- "Who is included or excluded from this perspective on ____ and what difference does that make"?
- "How does the concept of _____ alter our understanding of social construction"?
- "What examples of this concept do we see in the world around us"?
