"Thy Word Is A Lamp"

The seventeenth chapter of St. John records one of the last prayers of Jesus on earth. I ask myself the question, if I were to pray a final prayer in this life, for what would I pray? I am sure I would remember my family, petitioning God on their behalf for their spiritual welfare, and for their physical well-being. I am sure I would, among other things, pray a final prayer for myself.

There were some things for which Christ did not pray. In verse 9 of John 17, Christ says: "I pray not for the world." Then in verse 15 he says: "I pray not that thou shouldst take them out of the world." Things of greater importance gripped His soul in this parting hour. From the earliest part of His ministry Christ performed deeds of mercy, power, and wisdom, and these deeds characterize Him whereever He went. But in this particular prayer, just a few hours before He would undergo the agony of Gethsemane, and the indescribable humiliation and suffering of Calvary, He cries out His scul's deepest and most anxious desires. Let us look at these things.

Christ prays particularly for this main petition: first of all, He prays for Himself. In so doing He qualifies His approach to the Heavenly Father, and states the grounds upon which He will ask With His eyes His petitions. lifted toward Heaven, He is aware the hour has come that God has given Him power over all flesh, and that He has finished the work He was given to do. He further states He has manifested the Father's name, and given to His disciples the words God gave unto Him. Last but not least, He says He has kept His own, and none have been lost except the son of perdition.

The second part of His prayer is for His disciples. He asked the Father to keep them and sanctify them, that they may share His presence, behold His Glory, and experience the Fath-

er's love.

The third consideration for His prayer, in fact the entire theme of this petition is for the unity of the body of Christ-"that they may be one." It would seem that nothing in that hour was of greater importance or more needful than unity amongst the saints of God. Christ gives a compelling reason for such a prayer: "That the world may believe that thou has sent Me." His hope for the unredeemed world is based upon the unity of the Church. Satan knows the Church of Jesus Christ cannot be defeated when it is in one accord. He also knows the world will be reached, the sick will be healed, and souls in darkness will be delivered when true saints are united. Consequently, satan would rather destroy unity of the Church than anything else; his plans and efforts are dedicated to that end. The events that followed this prayer of Jesus should convince us that unity is the most important accomplishment in the field of Church re-The Church went lationship. through a great crisis at Calvary, then it rose to one of its highest Spiritual attainments with the outpouring of the Holv Spirit on the day of Pentecost! Notice that there in the upper room everything Christ prayed for prevailed: they were all in one accord.

Paul wrote to the Ephesian brethren: "I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called, with all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love; endeavoring to KEEP THE UNITY OF THE SPIRIT in the bond of peace.—Till we all come in the UNITY OF THE FAITH."

Ephesians 4: 1-3, 13.

To work out life's problems, we need to add love, subtract hate, multiply good, and divide truth and error.

Yes, even little boys and girls can talk to Jesus. Prayer is like a beautiful garden. It is full of pathways, that boys and girls can explore. 
