

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BY LAWS OF THE Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. ARTICLE VII

Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and The common doctrinal beliefs are proper doctrine. essentially as follows.

- Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- Creation and Formation.
- Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation.

Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.

Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ.

Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.

Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

- Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.
- Washing of Feet.
- Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers.
- Do not condone divorce and remarriage.
- Destruction of the Wicked
- Conditional Immortality.
- Rapture of the Man Child Class.

Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly.

A ministry supported by tithes and offerings.

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not in consistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

Weightier Matters

I'm thinking today of the heavy - duty get - in - your face - gospel preached by Jesus as recorded in Matthew 23:23. He said the weightier matters are judgment, mercy and faith.

The first apostolic sermon preached by Peter as recorded in Acts 2 was full of these principles. Stephen preached the same things (Acts 7), as did Paul (Acts 26).

And, in these last times, the last of the apostolic preachers still touch my soul with their messages on judgement, mercy and faith.

Would you think with me now of these provisions of God for us? And would you think beyond my expressions of these matters so that the Holy Ghost may make them individually beneficial to you?

Considering judgment; Did I call it a provision of God? Yes. We might think of as a consequence of our action, presided over by an Almighty God and certainly, it is that.But even judgment is a benevolent expression to us.

Beginning with Adam (Gen.3), God has meted out judgment with a purpose, God has since then ever been intervening in the affairs of the human race that there might be some of us saved.

Without the judgment of God we would have already destroyed ourselves.

Without that realization, the world resents judgment, for judgment is so all inclusive and complete.

It marks a person's past with indignation and wrath. It marks a person's present with condemnation.

And it makes a person's future to be consummation.

Is it any wonder then, that people who know only judgment despair of life itself?

Thank God we can turn our thoughts to the provision of mercy.

I like to think of mercy as love in action. God, seeing my utter and complete defeat and my utter helplessness gave me an escape from my deserved judgement. He chose to reveal himself to me, for I could never have found Him, having no idea what He was like.

The ultimate revelation of Himself to me was His Son, Jesus Christ (11 Cor.4;3-6). When He was "lifted up" He showed me love that cared enough to help me, although it meant taking my place

(Galatians 3:13).

"Amazing Grace" is truly a description of this mercy.

And just as judgement was inclusive and complete, so was mercy."Mercy there was great and grace was free, Pardon there was multiplied to me" the hymn proclaims.

For our past, mercy provides cancellation. For our present it provides restoration. And for our future, it provides preservation, even unto eternal life, after that judgment shall have utterly eliminated every harmful thing. The next great provision to us by God is faith.Faith, in one of its simpler application is belief in action. And yes, it is a provision of God. (Romans 12:3)Let no man say he cannot believe. Let no man say that he cannot act on his belief. For the truth is that man may believe what he wills.It is also true that man will ultimately act on his beliefs.And as judgement and mercy were inclusive and complete, so is faith.(1 John 5:4)Our faith in God can literally overcome the world and all that would tempt us with.Justice still calls. Judgement, Mercy and Faith. Let these weightier matters lay heavily on our minds, for our response to these will fix our future.



Tithe, Tithes, Tithing and Offerings

on my heart recently regard -ing the subject of tithing and its importance to our move -ment and churches. With that in mind I would like to share some of the thought that God has given me about this important part of our Christian walk. First, let's not confuse tithes with offering. I believe the two are separate. The tithe is for the support of pastors and those in the ministry, while the offering is for the maintenance and upkeep of the church. In Genesis 14:18-20 and 28:20-22 we find that Abraham and Jacob paid tithes of all that God had given them. We should have the same commitment unto God as these men. In Leviticus 27, verse 30, we read:"And all the tithe of the land, whether of the seed of the land, or of the fruit of the tree, is the Lord's: it is holy unto the Lord." 31) And if a man will at all redeem ought of his tithes, he shall add thereto the fifth part thereof. 32)And concerning the tithe of the herd, or of the flock, even of whatsoever passeth under the rod, the tenth shall be holy unto the Lord. 33) He shall not search whether it be good or bad, neither shall he change it: and if he change it at all, then both it and the change thereof shall be holy; it shall not be redeemed." I believe these verses are quite clear regarding the way we should give.

I have had such a burden

Numbers 18:20-21 reads, "And the Lord spake unto Aaron, Thou shalt have no inheritance in their land, neither shalt thou have any part among them; I am thy part and thine inheritance among the children of Israel.And behold, I have given the children of Levi all the tenth in Israel for an inheritance, for their service which they serve, even the service to the tabernacle of the congregation."In these verses God tells us that the tithe should go to the pastor, evangelist and gospel worker. It is my belief that the first responsibility of the church is to their pastor, and if they choose to support other works, it should be with offerings.

Deuteronomy 12:5-6 reads,"But unto the place which the Lord your God shall choose out of all of your tribes to put his name there, even unto his habitation shall ye seek, and thither thou shalt come. And thither ye shall bring your burnt offerings, and your sacrifices, and your tithes, and heave offerings of your hand, and your vows, and your freewill offerings, and the firstlings of your herds and of your flocks."God tells us where to bring or pay our tithes, so it is up to us to be obedient unto Him and His will. I feel that if we do what He tells us concerning our tithe and offering we would see a great positive difference in our lives both spiritually and materially.I believe we will feel better about our selves and want to do more for the Lord when we are obedient and fulfill our responsibilities to Him in all phases of our lives.

In 11 Chronicles 31;4-6 we read: "Moreover he commanded the people that dwelt in Jerusalem to give the portion to the priests and the Levites, that they might be encouraged of the Lord. And as soon as the commandment came abroad, the children of Israel brought in abundance the firstfruits of corn, wine, oil, and honey, and of all the increase of the field; and the tithe of all things brought they in abundantly. And concerning the children of Israel and Judah, that dwelt in the cities of Judah, they also brought in the tithe of oxen and sheep and the tithe of holy things which were consecrated unto the Lord their God, and laid them by heaps." If I understand these verses correctly, part of the reason for giving was to encourage the priests and Levites in their work for the Lord. It is my belief that when ministers and pastors are supported they are encouraged in their ministry. They are not always worrying about how they will meet their financial obligations. I also feel that when people give their tithes and offerings they will be encouraged in their churches.

Nehemiah 13;10-12 reads;" and I perceived that the portions of the Levites had not been given them; for the Levites and the singers that did the work, were fled everyone to his field. Then contended I with the rulers, and said, Why is the house of God forsaken? And I gathered them together, and set them in their place. Then brought all Judah the tithe of the corn and the new wine and the oil into the treasuries." It seems that the pastors and workers had not been supported, so they had to go into the fields to work which closely parallels the way it is today when churches do not faithfully support their ministers. We must remember that our pastors and workers have obligations the same as everyone else. A lack of adequate support could be the reason that some of our churches have closed and had to be sold. It breaks my heart when I think of any church closing because of lack of interest and support. I believe God's plan will work for us if we let Him have His way. We need to support our pastors and churches faithfully in order for the work of God to move forward.

In Malachi 3;6-11 we read; "For I am the Lord, I change not; therefore ye sons of Jacob are not consumed. Even from the days of your fathers ye are gone away from mine ordinances, and have not kept them, Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the Lord of hosts. But ye said, Wherein shall we return? Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed me. But ye say, Wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse; for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation.Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of host, if I will not open to you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room to receive it." It would seem

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that God wants his people to try His way, and if they will he will bless them. Many people believe that if they pay their tithes they won't have enough to pay their bills. However if we do not pay our tithes we have robbed God and I feel that this will keep us from entering Heaven. This is how important I feel paying our tithes is to us. We may say we believe the Bible, but if we fail to give God what belongs to Him, then we do not really believe all of the Bible.(11). "And I will rebuke the devourer for your sakes, and he shall not destroy the fruits of your ground; neither shall your vine cast forth her fruit before the time in the field, saith the Lord of hosts". This tells us if we honor God with our tithes, He will bless. Some people will never know what God can do because they do not obey his commandments concerning tithes. They may say they have tried paying tithes and nothing has happened, so why bother? It is really quite simple to understand. We give our tithes because it is the Word of God, and it is just the right thing to do.



Do I give to my Church as the Lord has given to me?


Now, I believe that if all our people, movement- wide, would do what we know the Word tells our churches would do better. Pastors and ministers would be encouraged which would encourage the people to work harder to build up the church. I also feel that this would even help our Bible College to grow if we all do what we know to do.

In Proverbs 3: 5-6, 9-10 we read;"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart, and lean not to thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths. Honour the Lord with thy substance and with the firstfruits of all thine increase; So shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine."The writer in Proverbs tells us to trust in the Lord with all our heart and to acknowledge Him in all our ways. When we are able to do this, it is much easier to give our substance and with the firstfruits of our increase. It shouldn't be a task to pay our tithes but an honor.

God has placed this part of His plan in our hands, It is then up to us to decide to do what is right and give of our tithe and offering or be guilty of robbing God.

I have not written this to offend anyone, but to help us see that tithing is God's Word. It is not an option. It is a commandment of God. If we haven't been giving our tithes, let us start now and see if we begin to feel better about our relationship with God. God will then honor our giving.

It is my desire that what I've shared with you will touch your heart.It is God's Word, This belief is one of the doctrinal teachings of the Apostolic Faith Movement. Ministers and pastors depend on the churches and people of the movement for their support. May God richly bless in your obedience.

In 1915, Grace, her two little sisters and their parents moved by train to Oklahoma and settled in the small town of Speermore. Gracie attended the Union Center Rural School.

On January 1, 1933 at Laverne, Grace and Floyd Forest LaMunyon were united in marriage and together they ministered in all 50 states, including Alaska and Hawaii. They shared a happy life together and Grace often said "Floyd is my everything and just being his wife is all the fulfillment in life I need." Grace was a talented musician. In the fall of 1992, after the death of her beloved Floyd on May 5, 1992, Grace moved to Ellinwood, Kansas to be near her sister-in-law and husband, Florene and Carl Alder, who lovingly and tenderly cared for her until her death.

She was also preceded in death by her parents, two sisters, Bonnie and Bessie Pigg, one brother, Clarence Pigg, a half brother, Archie Pigg, one brother-in-law, Dennis LaMunyon and sisters-in-law, Denzil and June LaMunyon.

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AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL

One hundred three years ago, on a lovely clear summer day, a party of teachers stepped off the train on the summit of Pikes Peak in Colorado. As the vast, eye-filling panorama unfolded before them, one of the group was moved by sudden inspiration.

Katharine Lee Bates, popular professor of English at Wellesly, found words floating through her mind and arranging themselves into the opening words of "America the Beautiful". The great expanse left her too stirred to say much to her friends, but her poetic gift did not fail her in her need.

She had just come from Chicago, the "white city" of the Columbian Exposition; she still remembered the "amber waves of grain" seen during the long train ride across the prairie; and she included all these in this new set of verses. The lines were set down in her notebook that night when she returned to her hotel at Colorado Springs. In 1904 she revised the words.


Probably none of her colleagues dreamed that another contribution had been made to the nation's library of noble, patriotic songs. They were quite unaware that their quiet companion had written something that would rank beside "America" and "The Star Spangled Banner".But that is the way great songs and poems are often produced. They seldom come from those who carry their hearts on their sleeves.

There was never any question about Miss Bate's patriotism. She waited two years before she consented to the publication of "America The Beautiful". The poem was sent to The Congregationalist and it appeared on July 4, 1985. In 1904, after she had rewritten the lines, "trying" as she explained, "to make the phraseology more simple and direct," the new version was published in the Boston Evening Transcript.

For forty years, Miss Bates taught English literature at Wellesley, and she made the subject so appealing that her department became the most popular at the college. She was plain, nearsighted, heavy, and awkward; yet from her first day at the school, she made her presence known and beloved.

Her charm and infectious good nature grew into a legend. Her students never forgot the gay sparkle in her eyes or how her face would fairly pucker up in smiles.Wellesley's poet and professor was such a vitally alive person that many famous people came to call on her.Celebrated poets from across the sea were glad to knock at her door - John Masefield, William Butler, Yeats, and Sir. Rabindranath Tagore, India's noted figure in modern literature.

When 1925 brought retirement with the rank of professor emeritus, Miss Bates hoped that, with added leisure and no more classroom duties, she would be able to give more time to poetry. But in those last months she was sadly hampered. She had a heart condition, which grew steadily worse. She died on March 28, 1929.



She was gone - but was she? For a long time afterward, scores of gray-haired alumnae cherished memories of their former teacher. And no one can forget her noblest verses.

"America the Beautiful" sounded a new note - a message for the present and the future. The spirit of braggadocio is gone - and gone, too, is the mood of the earlier song writers who boasted of their country, "right or wrong".

About this hymn, Gamaliel Bradford, a Wellesley neighbor of the author, wrote:"It expresses the highest and deepest emotion of patriotism, not in any spirit of militant aggression and world conquering imperialism, but with a profound gratitude and affection for the country, the government, and the traditions that have made us what we are".

Here in these inspiring stanzas, the nations valiant pioneers are impressively memorialized. So, too. are the heroes "who more than self their country loved" and the patriots who dreamed of cities "undimmed by human tears".But the hymns climax comes in the nobler mission the author invoked:

God shed His grace on thee,

And crown thy good with brotherhood.

So sing all good and true Americans, remembering that Katharine Lee Bates aspired to the highest ideal of patriotism.
