Avian Migration and Artificial Light at Night: Ongoing research at NMSU

Presented by Dylan Osterhaus and Kelley Boland

During their extreme biannual journeys, nocturnally migrating birds are exposed to a variety of natural and anthropogenic threats and stressors. These include novel predators, adverse weather conditions, altered and degraded habitat, human infrastructure, and artificial light at night. As birds are migrating, lights on the ground may interfere with the avian navigational sense and lead to deviation from the typical migratory flight. These deviations can cause the loss of important energy reserves, prolonged migratory journeys, and in some cases, mortality. Our research focuses on analyzing the interaction between nocturnally migrating birds and artificial light across White Sands Missile Range. Using the acoustic analysis of nocturnal migration, next-generation weather radar data, and mortality surveys, we hope to shed some "light" on this important issue.

March 25, 2023 Percha Dam State Park Bird Walk

BIRDATHON 2022 UPDATE

Congratulations to all on a good Birdathon again this year. We especially thank our sponsors and counters without whom the Birdathon would not be possible. We appreciate your participation and support for our conservation and education endeavors. Thanks, too, for our hard-working members who handle the details, especially Jane Fowler who handles the mailings.

This year presented some challenges. We had to dodge rainstorms and poor lighting because of the cloud cover. Some of the counters did well. The fall migration seemed to be light, but we had early winter migrants.

Our net receipts totaled \$5,643. The money will go to chapter operations, Rio Bosque Wetlands Park, Audubon Texas, and Second Chance Wildlife Rescue. Species seen by at least one counter were tallied. A total of 145 species were seen, compared to 122 last year.

The highest number of species seen by an individual or party were again John Kiseda, John Groves, Joe Cancellare, and Richard Hermosillo with 114. The most money was raised by Joe Cancellare. The unusual birds seen this year were the Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Common Raven, Blue-headed Vireo, Juniper Titmouse, Northern Parula, Bronzed Cowbird, White-throated Sparrow, and Lewis's Woodpecker. It took until late December, but Rio Bosque's wetland cells were eventually fully flooded. Now



they are about to go dry again.

Water deliveries to the park from the adjacent Roberto Bustamante Wastewater Treatment Plant will likely end in early February. We will rely on wells to keep some water in the former bend of the Rio Grande that winds through the park and will anxiously await the return of water from the Bustamante Plant later in the spring. Want to see one of the park's resident Western Screech-Owls? Join us for the late afternoon-to-sunset birding tour on March 5.
