Daisy's Got Game:

The 47th Annual Yellow Daisy Flower Show

September 7-9, 2018 is the 47th annual Yellow Daisy Standard Flower Show at Stone Mountain Park. This year is very special as the Yellow Daisy Festival will be celebrating 50 years with more than 400 artists and craftsmen from 33 states and two countries. The National Garden Club, Inc. standard flower show is presented by

garden club members in the Redbud District of The




Garden Club of Georgia, Inc. It is held in Memorial Hall on the park grounds at the same time as the Yellow Daisy Festival. Admission to the Flower Show is free with paid park admission.

The Redbud District has more than 40 garden clubs and many participate in this event every year as volunteers, have entries in the design division, or provide horticulture. This year's Show Chairman is Deanna McFarlan in the Shenandoah Rose Garden Club and co-chairman is Diane Hunter, Redbud District VII Director. Many members from Smoke Rise area garden clubs serve as chairmen and volunteers for the event. All entries are judged in a standard flower show.

Redbud District members volunteer to setup, host, clerk, classify, place and then disassemble all the horticultural exhibits. There are many aspects to the show from Design entries to Youth Entries to all the various classifications of Horticulture. Last year there were more than 700 horticulture entries and dozens of unique and charming floral designs.

The 2018 theme is "Daisy's Got Game!" Building on this theme, "Candyland" is the title for the flowering annuals category, "Mahjong" is the title for the Ferns category and "Uno" is the title for the Hosta category! Designs are divided into various classes, and each class has a game theme such as Class 9 is "Twister!" That certainly suggests an interesting interpretation using plant material!

The Horticulture can range from a perfect okra pod or tomato to a Limelight hydrangea to Autumn Fern to cacti! It is quite surprising how many hundreds of entries are submitted, classified and displayed in all those green bottles or containers.

Taste of Tucker Coming in October





City of Tucker Receives State Honor

Georgia's Department of Community Affairs (DCA) has awarded Qualified Local Government (QLG) status to the City of Tucker. In a letter dated July 24, DCA Office of Planning Director Brian Johnson congratulated the City on completing its first Comprehensive Plan, calling the feat an "impressive achievement."

Tucker, in cooperation with consulting firm The Collaborative, embarked on its Comprehensive Plan process in the fall of 2016 dubbing it, "Tucker Tomorrow." The city went through the necessary steps of gathering resident and stakeholder input, conducting public meetings and having the plan reviewed and approved by DCA and the Atlanta Regional Commission. Tucker's Mayor and City Council voted unanimously to adopt the plan in spring of 2018.

"This QLG designation is huge for us," says Tucker's Community and Economic Development Director John McHenry. "Not only does this recognize the hard work of our staff and consultants throughout the Comprehensive Plan process, but being a QLG puts Tucker in play for more state grants, which means more opportunities for continued smart growth."

Tucker became an incorporated city in 2016, following a November 2015 referendum. The City is now home to more than 35,000 people.



Stone Mountain CID Updates on Improvements and Repairs

Over the remainder of August, SMCID streets that rated among the worst conditioned in Tucker were resurfaced, with the others on the schedule by year's end.

These projects were made possible last November when voters across DeKalb County overwhelmingly supported the additional penny sales tax for road and drainage improvements, multi-modal transportation initiatives, parks and recreation needs, as well as public safety upgrades. The City of Tucker is projected to receive \$32 million over the six-year life of the Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST).

- Roadhaven Drive from E Ponce de Leon Avenue to Greer Circle
- Auger Drive from Hammermill Road to the end
- Mountain Industrial Boulevard from Lavist Road to I-285 overpass
- Lewis Road from Roadhaven Drive to Rock Mountain Boulevard
- Rock Mountain Boulevard from E Ponce de Leon Avenue to Lewis Road

There will be a City Council Meeting on September 10, and a Community Council Meeting on Wednesday, September 12, at the Tucker City Hall Annex at 7:00 p.m., respectively.



How the Roads of Smoke Rise Got Their Name

"Recently there was a lot of interest on the Nextdoor.com Smoke Rise site about where Hugh Howell Road got its name. After going to the library to research this and not finding much, I finally went to Wikipedia. Here is some information you might enjoy."

The early settlers of DeKalb tended to be farmers, mainly Scots, Irish and English families. They grew corn, cleared their own land, built sawmills and grist mills and rarely owned slaves. Their names are still found on local maps, attached to roads which wind through former fields: Rosser and McCurdy. These yeoman families gave DeKalb its first justices of the peace, doctors and ministers, as well as its soldiers in the Civil War. Armies of the North and South swept through this area in the summer of 1864 during the days of the Battle of Atlanta, fighting over the railroad lines going to the city.



After the war, the area was farmed again and the primary crop tended to be cotton. Extensive terracing on slopes in the neighborhood show where farmers a hundred years ago struggled to grow cotton on the hilly terrain. The town of Tucker began to grow where farm roads crossed the new Seaboard line. The village of Stone Mountain clustered around the extensive quarrying operations there. There are few traces in Smoke Rise of these late 19th century developments, though anecdote suggests that a blacksmith's shop once stood on Silver Hill Road, near a one-room schoolhouse. The oldest home in the neighborhood, barely visible from Silver Hill, is a cottage built for the school marm. Silver Hill, one of the oldest roads in the neighborhood, makes its first appearance on a 1915 map of DeKalb County. It was a dirt road then and remained so until the late 1960s.

Cotton farming became even more of an uphill struggle with the onset of the cotton boll weevil. During the Depression, farmers left their fields for opportunities elsewhere. Several of the farms which were in the area were purchased in the late 1930s by an Atlanta attorney named Hugh Howell. The tract of land he assembled near Stone Mountain seems to have been intended for hunting and entertaining purposes. He built a country house with access to the road that would become the Stone Mountain Freeway.

The road that bears his name was a later addition, a dirt track which connected Lawrenceville Highway and the village by the mountain. Hugh Howell Road was previously known as Rosser Road and according to a 1948 map, carried State Road number 141.


The Smoke Rise name was coined by developer Bill Probst, who is responsible for many of the first homes built in the next phase of development, Smoke Rise, during the 1960s. Neighborhoods began to form up and down Hugh Howell as land changed hands. The McCurdy family's farm and hunting fields became the Forest, for example; the family name remained on the road which led through the property.

DeKalb Implements New Crime-Fighting Technology

With Nationwide Communications Network Dedicated to Public Safety

The DeKalb County Office of Public Safety is one of the first large law enforcement jurisdictions in Georgia to join FirstNet – the nation-wide public safety broadband network that gives first responders a reliable and highly secure connection to important information.

The network is being built by AT&T in public-private partnership with the First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet), which was established by Congress. The Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012 created FirstNet as an independent authority within the National

Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) to provide emergency responders the first nationwide, high-speed, broadband network dedicated to public safety.

The FirstNet network is transforming the way our public safety personnel communicate and share information. As a subscriber to FirstNet, DeKalb Public



Safety agencies will use the system to share data and critical information such as: criminal records, police database information, and visuals. Dispatch will be able to send high-definition video, photos, and maps to responders - rather than just sharing an address. While in route, ambulances will be able to transmit high volume, real-time patient information. Plans, perimeters, and other data can be transmitted in real time. In short, members of the public will receive more efficient lifesaving services.

DeKalb County first responders will also be able to maintain communications, even when the network is congested, by using the Public Safety Broadband Network (PSBN) dedicated to public safety officials. FirstNet will complement DeKalb County's recent technology upgrades such as the new E911 software system, which went live in April. Provided by TriTech Software Systems, the \$8.8 million computer-aided dispatch system has improved how the county's 911 center dispatches police, fire rescue, emergency medical services, Marshal's Office and the Sheriff's Department.

DeKalb began migrating to the FirstNet broadband network platform in January 2018 with the DeKalb County Police Department becoming the first police department in Georgia to subscribe to FirstNet. The county completed full implementation in July 2018 and is also working with its 12 municipalities on adopting FirstNet countywide.

The DeKalb County Office of Public Safety is staffed by approximately 1,600 employees consisting of six departments: DeKalb County Police Department, DeKalb County Fire Rescue, DeKalb County Animal Services and Enforcement, DeKalb 911 Emergency Communications Center, DeKalb Emergency Management Agency and the DeKalb County Medical Examiner's Office.

Why Am I Being Drug Tested?

I wrote last month about the new "opioid epidemic" in the United States. Opioids are prescription drugs that are considered controlled substances--controlled, because not just anyone can prescribe them. Substances in this category have a high potential for addiction. Examples of controlled prescription drugs are: narcotic pain medications like codeine, oxycodone (the most common drug abused in the United States), morphine, methadone and fentanyl, which is 50-100 times stronger than morphine and 30-50 times stronger than heroin. Opioids aren't the only prescription drugs that are controlled. Amphetamines and stimulants like Ritalin, Adderall and Dexedrine, are also controlled substances, as are benzodiazepine medicines for anxiety--like Valium and Ativan.

How serious is the opioid crisis? Beginning in 1999, the rates of abuse of prescription drugs began to dramatically rise. By 2015, the United States Drug Enforcement Agency stated that prescription pain medication overdoses had reached "epidemic proportions." The agency further stated that the number of people reporting abuse of controlled prescription drugs was "more than those reporting abuse of cocaine, heroin, methamphetamine, MDMA, and PCP combined." This was an astounding statement! Astounding because we usually think illegal drugs are mainly responsible for overdose and abuse.

Obviously, there is a place for controlled prescription drugs. Opioids in particular, are the best drugs we have to control pain. Cancer pain, burns, broken bones and post-surgical pain are examples of conditions that may require opioid use.

Some reasons we have a crisis:

- 1) Overprescribing of opioids began in the mid-2000's, as doctors were encouraged to consider pain as the "fifth vital sign."
- 2) Left-over pain medications that were kept, or "shared" with family and friends. Fifty percent of adults misusing controlled prescription drugs got them, or stole them, from friends or family. Ninety percent of opioid abusing teens obtained their drugs this way.
- 3) Pill mills, drug trafficking.
- 4) New uses for medications previously available only in the hospital, making them more available to use and misuse.

In 2017, several states began to enact legislation to help fight this serious problem. By April of that year, all states in the U.S. --including Georgia-had enacted some sort of Prescription Drug Monitoring Program.

Georgia's Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) includes a Data Bank. This means that every time your doctor prescribes certain controlled substances, he or she must check your name and prescribing data with the Georgia PDMP Data Base to see where you are obtaining your medications. Pharmacies are also required to enter your prescribing information into the data bank each time you obtain a prescription for scheduled drugs. This means your name will show up in the data bank with information about which pharmacy dispensed the medication, the doctor(s) who prescribed the medicine, and date it was obtained.

On July 1, 2018, The Georgia PDMP became fully functional. Doctors must comply with regulations or have their licenses reviewed. If you are prescribed opioids or other controlled substances long-term, your doctor's office is required to review your prescription information in the data bank every 90 days.

Exceptions to the 90-day surveillance are:

- -Short term prescriptions: If the prescription is for less than a three-day supply, or was given following outpatient surgery or a short term problem, your doctor will not need to screen you every 90 days.
- If you are terminally ill or a cancer patient and require longterm pain medications.
- -Patients who are hospitalized or in a hospice or nursing home situation and are having their medication administered to them in a controlled setting.

If you are being prescribed scheduled drugs on a long-term basis, you will probably be asked by your doctor to provide a urine drug screen every 90 days before you can receive a new prescription for the drug. This information is entered into your chart and is protected by federal health care information privacy laws.

Be a part of the solution instead of the problem by properly disposing of unused controlled prescription meds. Do not hold on to or hoard these drugs. They may be stolen and diverted for sale on the street or consumption by someone you know. If you are taking these meds long term, ask your doctor if there are alternatives. Your life will be much easier if you do not have to be drug tested every ninety days.

Yellow Daisy Favorites

It is time for the Yellow Daisy Festival at Stone Mountain Park. A favorite food stop at the park is the GFWC Stone Mountain Woman's Club homemade desserts tent. Your Smoke Rise neighbors, who are members, have been baking for the four-day event. Here are some of the requested favorites. Come on by, say "hi" and buy a dessert.

Strawberry Cake

*1 box White Cake Mix (18.25 oz. is needed)

1 3-oz. package strawberry Jell-O

4 eggs

½ cup oil

2/3 cup water

½ cup frozen strawberries - measured after thawing

Beat four minutes on high. Bake at 360° for 30 minutes. Cake makes three thin layers. Recipe is doubled for a large Yellow Daisy cake. (Can bake in two 9-inch layers)

Frosting

½ cup frozen strawberries, drained

1 stick margarine

1 box powdered sugar — More sugar may be needed for a thicker frosting

*Extender for smaller cake mixes—needed for some older recipes

1 ½ cups flour 1 cup sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon baking soda

Mix. Add 2 oz. of this to a 16.5 oz. cake mix to make an old 18.5 oz. cake mix. Keep in airtight container. Use as needed.

Heavenly Hash Cake

2 sticks butter 4 eggs
2 cups sugar 2 teaspoons vanilla
1 ½ cup self-rising flour 4 Tablespoons cocoa

1 ½ cup chopped pecans

Do not use mixer. Melt butter. Beat eggs and add sugar and oil. Add melted butter and vanilla. Mix flour, cocoa and nuts. Add to the egg mixture. Bake at 350° for 35 minutes.

Frosting

1 package miniature marshmallows

4 Tablespoons cocoa

1 box powdered sugar

1 stick butter

1/4 to 1/2 cup milk as needed for spreading consistency

Remove cake from oven and immediately cover top with marshmallows. Blend remaining ingredients and spread over marshmallows.

Good and Easy Cake

2 eggs beaten

2 cups all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon soda

2 cups sugar

1-teaspoon vanilla

1 20-oz. can crushed pineapple, undrained

Mix all ingredients with a spoon. Pour into a sprayed 9 X 13 pan. Bake at 350° for 40-45 minutes. Spread topping over cake while warm.

Topping

1 5-oz. can evaporated milk

1 stick butter

1 cup sugar

1 cup chopped pecans

1 ½ cups coconut

1-teaspoon vanilla

In saucepan, mix milk, butter and sugar. Cook about five minutes, stirring constantly. Stir in nuts and coconut. Spread over warm cake.

Carrot Cake

2 cups sugar 1 ½ cups oil

4 eggs 2 cups all purpose flour 2 teaspoons soda 1 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons cinnamon 3 cups carrots, grated finely

Combine sugar and oil. Add eggs one at a time. Sift together dry ingredients. Sift into sugar mixture. Mix well and add grated carrots. Bake in three 9-inch layer pans at 350° for 35 minutes.

Frosting

1 8-oz. package cream cheese

2 sticks butter

1 box powdered sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla

½ to 1 cup nuts (optional)

Cream softened butter and cheese. Slowly add sugar. Blend well. Add vanilla and nuts. Add cream if needed for spreading consistency (sparingly). Put quite a bit between layers.

Other favorites are chocolate chip, oatmeal raisin and peanut butter cookies. Coconut pies and caramel cakes sell well. Anything chocolate seems to be a hit!
