Students' Needs:				
Academic Needs	All schools have resumed in person learning for both schools. Administration, staff and teachers are all present to provide instruction to all enrolled students. The curriculum continues to be taught from kindergarten through 12 th grade.			
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Social, emotional and mental needs are addressed in a variety of ways throughout the day with students interacting with staff and students. Clubs & sports provide extra curricular activities that further encourage a sense of community, team efforts, work on problem solving, working collaboratively within clubs. Recess and lunch times provides opportunity to address conflicts and work and play with one another. Interventions within the classrooms provide smaller groups that give opportunity to discuss and address different struggles and challenges in a safe environment. Specials (art, technology, P.E. and music) are valued time for students to express themselves to balance between instructional time while providing time and alternative ways to socialize and discovery of other cultures through music and art. Partnerships with parents through the parent groups provide space to discuss designed to allow parents and staff to intermingle, dialogue and share ideas and concerns. Staff and parents work together to provide community events to invites members of the community to come together to socialize and have students interact after school. Such community events are important since our school is located in a business district and not within a housing community.			
Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)	Food service continues to be provided as a self operative with the assistance of USDA Nutritional Programs. Nutritional meals are offered to both students and staff. Staff wear gloves and maintain clean areas. School is inspected twice per year by county health department.			
Staff Needs:				
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Staff engage in quarterly lunch appreciation provided by parent groups. Biweekly meetings are conducted by the principal to assist teachers in maintaining balance with the workload, changes of Covid 19 protocols and personal challenges. HR works with administration to provide space for staff to share concerns privately and provide possible services through the health insurance provider. Information is provided to staff any changes made by the city, state, federal or governing board related to the operations of the school.

 - (F) Diagnostic and screening testing.
 - (G) Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities.
 - (H) Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies.
 - (I) Coordination with State and local health officials.
 - (ii) how it will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address students' academic needs and students' and staff social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services.

(b)(i) During the period of the ARP ESSER award established in section Start Printed Page 212022001(a) of the ARP Act, an LEA must regularly, but no less frequently than every six months (taking into consideration the timing of significant changes to CDC guidance on reopening schools), review and, as appropriate, revise its plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services.
