RECIPE CORNER

Yorkshire WI Recipe Book

This recipe comes from Birdsall WI. Unfortunately there is nothing on the NFWI website, or on Facebook, so I cannot say if they are still running or not. I thought seeing as the fruits have been collected in and you may have made some jams, maybe this recipe will be appropriate.

Raspberry Buns

Ingredients:

6 oz Plain flour

6 oz Ground rice

4 oz Butter

4 oz Sugar

1 Tsp Baking Powder 1 Egg and a little milk

Raspberry Jam

Method:

Sift flour and ground rice and rub in the fat. Add sugar and baking powder. Add the yolk of the egg and enough milk to make a stiff paste. Divide into small balls, hollow each in the centre and insert a little raspberry jam. Brush with the egg white, flatten a little and bake in a fairly hot oven until golden brown. The quantity makes about 20 buns.

Please remember the weights etc are from recipes prior to 1983.
