

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FINGERPRINTS BANANA LEAF

AF colored impres-

sions, similar to removed dust prints.

*On May 22, 1998, a Honolulu police officer was sent to investigate a residential burglary. During the investigation the officer established the point of entry had been a ground level patio window. Adjacent to the patio window, wooden jalousies had been removed; adjacent to the wooden jalousies were two pieces of a banana leaf. The pieces of the banana leaf were consistent with a banana tree in the back yard. Inspection of the two pieces of the banana leaf revealed visible fingerprints present on the white powder-covered underside.

Due to the delicate nature of the revealed impressions, the Honolulu Police Department's Scientific Investigation Section was called to assist. The responding Evidence Specialist secured the two pieces of the banana leaf with tape inside a box to restrict their movement and brought them back to the laboratory for photographing. Friction ridge contact had removed the normal white powder, known as wax "bloom" which coats the bottom of the leaf, and had yielded green-

The revealed fingerprints were photographed using and MP-4 camera system, 4X5 Kodak Ektapan ASA 100 black and white sheet film, oblique lighting and a Tiffen #25 red filter. The photographed prints were then searched by the Honolulu Police Department's Identification Section through AFIS and a suspect was identified. Ironically, had the suspect not touched the banana leaf, it is highly improbable that an identification would have been made. The removed jalousies were of the untreated textured wooden type subject to the weather, and unlikely to yield prints of use.[]

I am sure whom ever is appointed at the business meeting in October will do just as good if not better.


I want to thank all of those who helped me by sending in articles for publication.[]


