

Paul Robinson was born on January 18, 1927 in Los Angeles. After graduating from Inglewood High School, Paul joined the United States Air Corps in 1944, which later became the US Air force. Paul was stationed in Adak. Alaska and worked in the Finance Office handling payroll and other finance matters. During the war, Paul often delivered payroll with a 45-caliber pistol on his belt! Paul was promoted to Corporal and the Air force tried to keep Paul in the service but after his tour, he was ready to take on the world with all the other returning GIs.

After his service, Paul attended Cal State College where he studied chemistry and later, apprenticed for a small company, working in the electrical services area.

That did not last long, however, as he was lured away and hired by Tubular Specialties Manufacturing, Inc. (TSM). Paul worked there for 20 years designing and building many, many different machines needed in the steel manufacturing business. He retired from TSM in 1991.

Paul was an inveterate tinkerer and worked on many different projects at home, including work on medical devices such as a unique blood valve for people with varicose veins. He enjoyed gardening for many years and then developed a great interest in doing research online with his computer. He would spend hours on the internet researching medical work on stem cells for pulmonary disease.

Another of Paul's great loves, besides June, were the many German Shepherds he cared for over the years. In fact, Paul carried a tattered picture of each one of his dogs in his wallet and would gladly show you, if asked!

Two other little know facts about Paul: he was an amateur hypnotist and he had a horse named Sassy!

Paul and June joined PEP Pioneers in February, 2008, and later that same year volunteered to produce

the monthly newsletter as he had experience working on an LAPD neighborhood newsletter. In February, 2009, Paul and June were voted on the Board of Directors for PEP.

Paul gave so much to PEP, so much beyond his many years of producing the newsletter. He had such incredible drive and was a constant presence at the PEP exercise, Meet and Greet, and monthly luncheons. No matter how hard it was to breathe or how lousy he felt, Paul would always have a smile on his face - well not really. But he was always smiling under his curmudgeonly expressions!
