NAVY WEEK PROGRAM SETS SAIL FOR RICHMOND

The U.S. Navy is preparing to bring a Navy Week to Richmond, VA during the week of May 16-22, as the fifth Navy Week of the 2022 Calendar year.

If health conditions permit, the Navy will conduct education and community outreach throughout Richmond and the surrounding communities.

Richmond Navy Week will bring between 50 and 75 Sailors from across the nation to volunteer throughout the community and discuss why the Navy matters to Richmond. This is the first Navy Week held in Richmond (see page 4 for more information on Navy Week in Richmond).

HISTORY OF THE NAVY RESERVE

The history of the Navy Reserve is a proud legacy forged by dedicated men and women who, when duty called, were willing to leave their homes, put civilian careers on hold, and serve in defense of our Nation.

At the beginning of World War I, a young Assistant Secretary of the Navy, Franklin D. Roosevelt, anticipated the need for a federal maritime reserve force and began to urge Congress to enact legislation to accomplish this goal. On 3 March 1915, the United States Naval Reserve was officially established, and by the war's end, over 250,000 Reserve Sailors were serving. During World War II, 84% of the 3.4 million Sailors serving on active duty came from the Navy Reserve — including five future U.S. Presidents.

From Korea to Vietnam, the Gulf War to Iraq and Afghanistan, and humanitarian missions like Katrina and Haiti, Reserve Sailors have continued to answer our nation's call, providing strategic depth and critical expertise to

Richmond Navy Week will feature in-person demonstrations, performances, and engagements throughout the week that will include:

- Senior Navy Leaders Flag officer and senior civilian Navy leaders with ties to Richmond and the surrounding area.
- Namesake Sailors Sailors serving on USS Virginia (SSN 774), nuclear powered attack submarine and the lead ship of her class.
- United States Fleet Forces Band -Performances and masterclasses with Navy Musicians.
- Naval History and Heritage Command Educational presentations and lesson plans about the deep ties between Colorado and the Navy.
- USS Constitution Demonstrations about the oldest commissioned ship in the Navy.
- Navy Expeditionary Combat Command Educational STEM presentations and fitness demonstrations by technicians, medics, and divers.
- U.S. Navy SEALs and Special Warfare Combat Craft Crew–Demonstrations and Static displays.
- U.S. Naval Meteorology and Oceanography Command Educational presentation on the importance of atmospheric and oceanographic science and the overall value of STEM education to the Navy.

Every Sailor selected to participate in Richmond Navy Week, except those with an approved waiver for health or religious reasons, will be fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Furthermore, the Navy Office of Community Outreach will work closely with community partners in Richmond and follow guidance from public health officials.

Navy Weeks are the service's signature outreach program, designed to allow the citizens of Richmond to learn about the Navy, its people, and its importance to national security and prosperity. The Navy Office of Community Outreach (NAVCO) coordinates Navy Weeks. "We are very excited to bring Navy Week to Richmond," said NAVCO's director, CDR John Fage. "Navy Weeks give us the opportunity to help connect Americans to their Navy. We are looking forward to safely and responsibly building those connections in the Richmond area and showing everyone why their Navy is so important."

Since 2005, the Navy Week program has served as the Navy's flagship outreach effort to regions without a significant Navy presence, with over 250 Navy Weeks held in more than 80 different U.S. markets.

RICHMOND WOMEN'S COUNCIL OF THE NAVY LEAGUE OF THE UNITED STATES

The Navy League of the United States was founded in 1902 with the encouragement of President Theodore Roosevelt. The Navy League is a civilian organization dedicated to the education of citizens and the support of the men and women of the sea services and their families.

The Navy League completed the organization of a branch in Richmond on July 14, 1915. At this time, we know very little of this branch, but will continue to research. If anyone reading this knows anything about this branch, we would be thrilled to hear from you.

In 1942, as the United States prepared for full entry into World War II, League President Shelden Clark of New York City called for the formation of the Women's Councils as a war measure. The Richmond, VA community responded with the formation of the "Richmond Women's Council of the Navy League of the United States". The Councils chief activity was the establishment of a Club for navy servicemen and their families, located at Fifth and Cary Streets. Available records include: Chiefly financial records and scattered correspondence documenting the management of the Council's Navy Club facility in Richmond. Included are accounts, bank books, canceled checks, charter, constitution and by-laws, membership records, ration books, registers of sailors who visited the Club (including British servicemen), reports, tax forms, etc.

With the war over in 1945, and Navy League Club was no longer needed, the Richmond Women's Council closed up shop. On January 21, 1958, the Richmond Council of the Navy clubs were League of the United States, with twenty-two members received its charter from National.

Greetings from **USCGC NORTHLAND!**

NORTHLAND returned to homeport in Portsmouth, VA on February 3rd following a two-month patrol in the Windward Pass, enforcing U.S. laws and ensuring maritime safety in the region between the island nations of Haiti and Cuba. Shortly after NORTHLAND's return, the ship began a major maintenance period in conjunction with outside contractors to revitalize ship systems and ensure that the cutter will be able to support Coast Guard missions for years to come.

Throughout the month of February, **NORTHLAND's** crew remained extremely busy carrying out the unit's inport training regimen. In order to train newly reported crewmembers and re-

main proficient across all Coast Guard and Department of Homeland Security mission areas, it is vital that the crew conducts a multitude of training periodically throughout the year. During this in-port period, NORTHLAND's training teams oversaw crewmembers as they trained in marksmanship at the small arms range, interdiction and pursuit tactics on the cutter's small boats, navigational techniques on the bridge, and casualty combatant techniques during damage control drills. Throughout this training period, all crew displayed tremendous dedication to their individual crafts as they guaranteed the ship's readiness to perform these missions downrange and remain a viable asset in enforcing U.S. law.

While work onboard the ship continued in full swing as the month of March arrived, **NORTHLAND** crewmembers took time to give back to our local community. The cutter's Leadership Diversity Advisory Committee (LDAC) sponsored a volunteer event for the Fisher House onboard Naval Medical Center Portsmouth. The Fisher House is an on base facility that offers no-cost housing amenities to family members and loved ones of the

patients receiving care at the medical center. This service provides a "home away from home" that works to greatly reduce the financial and emotional strain placed on service members and veterans while they recuperate. NORTHLAND's crewmembers spent their volunteer time doing yard work such as power washing, weed whacking, and landscaping. Additionally, crewmembers washed down windows and shutters, cleaned light fixtures in the interior of the house, and made minor repairs to the outdoor gazebo. The day was an outstanding opportunity for crewmembers to give back to our community and honor those service members who have gone before us.

Finally, **NORTHLAND** was honored to have the Richmond Council onboard as we presented the cutter's Sailor of the Year Award to EM1 Antoinette Frazer on the 17th of March. As April approaches, the crew continues to make preparations for **NORTHLAND's** next deployment. As always, thank you for the support! Until next time, Fair Winds and Following Seas!
