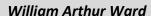

2018 had it's challenges, but it also paved the way for many new opportunities! We are excited to share with the you some of the new processes, personnel and appearances in the department.



Safe Medication Disposal

Did you know there is a new medication drop box located in the lobby of the Sunriver Police Department? You may now drop off your unused medications during our office hours at your convenience.

This box is provided to us by KidCents and The Rite Aid Foundation as part of the Safe Medication Disposal Program. Their mission is to provide law enforcement agencies in Rite Aid service areas with



medication disposal units to ensure that individuals can safely dispose of unwanted medications in an environmentally-friendly manner, while keeping them out of the hands of kids and teens.

National Testing Network (NTN)

Recruiting and testing prospective police officer candidates can be very expensive and time consuming for both the agency and the applicant. National Testing Network contracts with law enforcement agencies across the country to provide professional testing and administrative services.

For the Applicant, NTN provides a repository where they can schedule both physical and written testing in their area, and also provides information about who is currently hiring and their application process.

For the Agency, NTN provides a venue for job postings, facilitates the testing, and recruits applicants who are interested in working for their Sunriver Police Department utilized NTN for their 2018 hiring process and will be using them in the future. Policy Manual

Your police department has a new policy manual provided by **Lexipol**. Lexipol is a provider of state specific policies, verifiable policy training and policy management software for public safety organiza-

It is very challenging for agencies to keep up with legislative changes, while maintaining positive relations, and ensuring officer safety. Agency written policy manuals are very labor intensive and difficult to keep current. Because of this, policies become inadequate and outdated and can put the officers and the community they serve at risk.

Lexipol has a team of law enforcement professionals and public safety attorneys who monitor legislative changes (Oregon specific), case law and evolving best practices, and create and update policies based upon those changes. Lexipol also requires daily, scenario-based training, which apply policies to real-life situations. This is crucial, because it requires officers to review policies often.

Uniforms

With the change in leadership came the opportunity for a fresh look. The Officers embraced a traditional city uniform in dark navy blue. The Officers additionally requested moving to an external vest which has become a national trend in law enforcement. The external vest has proven health benefits by reducing lower back pain and hip issues. The vest also reduces the fatigue over a 12-hour shift. During the hot summer months, the vest



can be removed while in the office allowing for a cooling effect. The officer can quickly don the vest if needing to respond to an emergency call for service.

Bike Patrol



Sunriver Police Department's Seasonal Bike Patrol Program has proven to be a great success throughout the years. Spring, an application process is held and approximately eight bike officers are hired for the summer. Most

of the applicants are college students specializing in Criminal Justice, wanting to gain experience in the field.

Before a new bike officer is able to ride solo, they must attend a one week training course provided by Sunriver Police Department. course teaches them administrative duties, as well as how to communicate and stay safe on the pathways. Biké Officers are immersed into policies and procedures, state laws, and Sunriver Rules and Regulations.



They are taught bike and personal safety and how to perform minor repairs on bikes. All bike officers are required to be First Aid/CPR certified and are provided this class.



Sunriver Bike Patrol officers provide directions to desired locations, locate lost children, remind people of helmet and safety laws, and inform visitors of Sunriver's unique environmental rules and regulations.

The Bike Patrol Officer's most important job is to provide exceptional customer service to the residents and guests in the community of Sunriver.

Citizen Patrol

Sunriver Citizen Patrol (CP) is a volunteer 501c3 organization designed to assist Sunriver Police Department with departmental and community needs. These volunteers work hard during the year, providing vacation watch checks, filling map year, providing vacation watch checks, filling map boxes, and providing traffic control at local events, such as Pacific Crest, Kid's fishing Day, and Concerts at the Sharc, just to name a few. Some members train continually for specific emergency programs, such as Project Lifesaver and the Initial Response Team (IRT). Additionally, CP assists the police department with special events, such as Shop With a Con. Halloween Specktacular and an Shop With a Cop, Halloween Spooktacular and an annual document shredding event.

Each year, Citizen Patrol hosts an annual recognition dinner in December for it's members and the police department. At this event, the Volunteer of the Year award was presented to the CP member who gave the best overall contribution to Citizen Patrol during the past year. The 2018 winner of this award was Dennis Dishaw. Dennis is a very active member and is currently assisting with our Project Lifesaver Program.



Citizen Patrol will be rolling out their new look this year, as well. They have purchased new uniform shirts and have redesign their patch to say "Citizen Patrol" in bold lettering. They will also be driving a white pickup truck with "Citizen Patrol" magnetic signs clearly visible on each door.

Additional Programs or Services We Offer at SRPD

Project Good Neighbor

In 2016, the Sunriver Police Department started a new program called "Project Good Neighbor." We recognized that some of our owners can be vulnerable due to location, weather and proximity of family. One of the ways that Sunriver Police Officers promote safety and security within the Sunriver Community is to check in on our most vulnerable members. Sunriver Officers identify those who could benefit from an occasional visit through personal contacts or by word of mouth. Officers have been known to change smoke detector batteries, play cards, change lightbulbs, or take an owner to the store if they do not feel comfortable driving in poor weather conditions. This program has been very successful and even brings peace of mind to family members who live outside of our community, and cannot visit as much as they would like to. If you know someone who could benefit from a visit from one of our professional officers, please let us know.

Vacation Watch Checks

One of the many community policing "extras" that the Sunriver Police Department provides is to check on your house when you are on vacation. For a limited duration of 60 days or less, Sunriver officers and Citizen Patrol members will provide a perimeter check of your house. If damage or suspicious activity is detected at your home we will do what we can to minimize the issue and notify you or a designee immediately. Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver's program has been enhanced. The Sunriver Police Department has provided additional training to the PLS search team. They've created a brochure to be given to potential clients and their caregivers, and they are creating a public awareness campaign that will be rolled out in 2019."

For those of you who may not know, Project LifeSavers's mission is to use state of the art technology in assisting those who care for victims of Alzheimer's', Dementia, Autism, Down Syndrome and other cognitive conditions that cause wandering. With this technology, the wanderer can be found in minutes instead of hours. This reduces stress on the caregiver and helps reduce the cost of public funds spent searching for the missing persons.

Radar Trailer

Speeding is the most common traffic violation committed on Sunriver roadways. When a driver fails to obey speed laws they put themselves and others at risk. Sunriver Police Officers aim to educate the public about the importance of obeying speed limits with the use of a radar trailer. Radar trailers provide drivers with instant feedback on how fast they are going and how fast they should be going. Radar speed signs have shown to be an effective tool in creating real angoing change in driver behave ating real, ongoing change in driver behavior. Because the Radar Trailer is mobile, Sunriver Police Officers are able to place it in Sunriver where a potential issue has been identified.

During the summer months, bike officers place the radar trailer at various locations in Sunriver each day. you know of a particularly troublesome area, we honor requests so give us a call.



Bicycle Registration

By registering your bicycle with Sunriver Police Department you significantly increase the odds of your bicycle being returned back to. SRPD offers free bike registration to Sunriver homeowners. It's as easy as filling out a form and receiving a durable asset tag to place on your bike. Most bikes that go missing in Sunriver have been abandoned or misplaced, not stolen. Therefore, the asset tag is not removed and can be traced back to the owner if found.

Special Event Parking Permits

Did you know...There is no roadside parking in

Surriver without a Special Event Parking Permit. If you are having an event at your house and need special permission for extra roadside parking, don't hesitate to call our office and request a permit. It's free and your permit will be honored for the duration of your event. Signs will be placed roadside so other residents will know you have been approved.

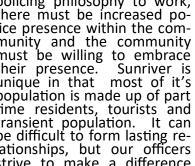

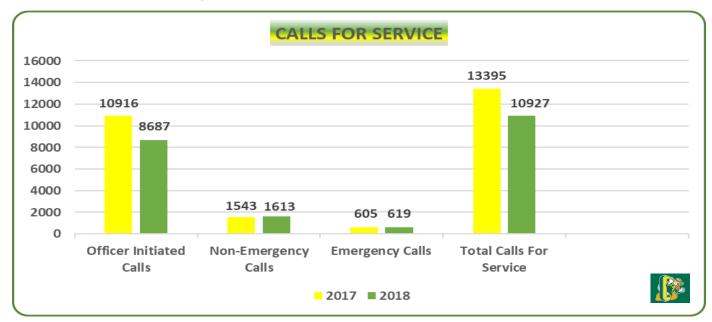

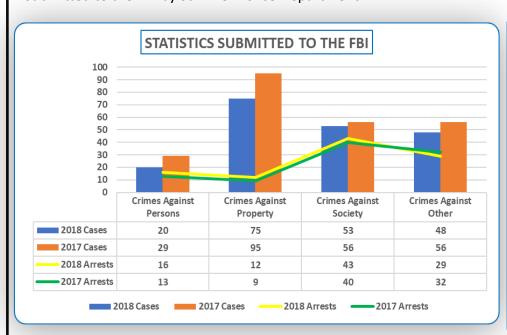
The Oregon Accreditation Alliance exists to improve the quality of law enforcement agencies in the State of Oregon and ultimately the quality of services provided to the citizens of this state. The Oregon Accreditation Alliance was formed in April 2001.

Statistics

There are three types of Calls for Service; calls received via the 9-1-1 line, calls received via the Deschutes County Dispatch non–emergency line and calls that an officer initiates, such as a traffic stop or an incident they happen upon. There was a slight upward trend non-emergency and emergency calls coming into the CAD center from 2017 to 2018, but Officer Initiated and Total Calls for Service were down.



The FBI began collecting crime statistics from law enforcement agencies across America in 1930. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) was implemented to capture details on a single incident, as well as separate offenses within an incident. NIBRS is broken up into three categories, Crimes Against Person, Crimes Against Property and Crimes Against Society. Crimes Against Other is a category specific to Oregon and is not reported to the FBI. The following chart shows a 2017-2018 comparison of crimes submitted to the FBI by Sunriver Police Department.
