Growing up, you may have heard that we celebrate Independence Day on July 4 because that's the day the Founding Fathers signed the Declaration of Independence, but that's not technically true! Although the Declaration was adopted on July 4, 1776, it wasn't signed by most people until a month later.

On July 2, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of declaring independence from Great Britain. The Declaration of Independence was officially adopted two days later, marked by the ringing of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall in Philadelphia.

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

July 27, 1953	With the signing of the Korean armistice at Panmunjom, Chinese aid to Vietnam, such as
	trucks, artillery and anti aircraft guns, increases.
July 2, 1961	Hanoi captures 3 members of Lansdale's U.S. trained First Observation Group when
	their U.S. C-47 aircraft is shot down. The First Observation Group is the clandestine
	warfare unit ordered by President Kennedy in May 1961. The group expanded to 805 men.
	Their activities were focused on the Viet Cong but shifted to operations against North
	Vietnam.
July 1, 1962	A team of 30 Australian military advisers arrives in Vietnam to join with American
	advisory teams training South Vietnamese military forces.
July 23, 1964	At a news conference in Paris, President Charles de Gaulle proposes that the U.S., France,
	the Soviet Union and Communist China negotiate an end to the hostilities in Vietnam and
	Laos by agreeing to leave the Indo-Chinese peninsula, guaranteeing its neutrality and
	independence and providing economic and technical aid.
July 15, 1965	New Zealand deploys a field artillery battery to Vietnam for combat operations in support
	of the Australian forces in III Corps.
July 30, 1965	It is reported that 29 nations now give some kind of aid to South Vietnam; this aid runs the
	gamut from material and funds to personnel.
July 4, 1966	U.S. Marines and ARVN troops conduct Operation Macon, a security operation to protect
	the An Hoa industrial complex in Quang Nam Province, I Corps.

Indiana Veterans Home New Visitation Instructions

Visitation is back at IVH! Below are requirements for in-room visits.

- Must be screened at the Pyle Switchboard for any signs or symptoms of illness.
- Complete the Visitor Screening Tool.
- Complete the Visitor Log to include your contact information in case we need to reach you for any reason.
- Bring proof of your vaccinations; we will make a copy of this and attach it to your Visitor Screening Tool.
- Leave the Pyle building and walk to the building where your loved one resides.
- You can go directly to their room and visit. You will also be required to wear a surgical mask when in any common area, but you may take your mask off in their room during your visit.
- After you visit, report back to Pyle Switchboard to checkout. It is very important that you do this.
- If you are not vaccinated, you will be able to continue to schedule your visits online and have your visits supervised in the Mitchell Dining Room.
