Experiencing Joy and Life

.....<u>With Pastor Eric</u>

"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." John 10:10b "I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete." John 15:11 "By this everyone will know that you are my

disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:35

There is no greater joy then watching people inject life into another person. I have experienced this joy time and time again and the fringe benefit is that I receive life as well. Let me share some examples with you of when I have experienced this "life giving" recently.



When our confirmation class took a trip to Chicago last month, we visited a ministry site called "The Children's Place." Three separate branches of this ministry exist throughout the city and each caters to low income families with at least one parent with a chronic illness. We went to the early development program site for children which receive children from all over the city. The day we arrived it was hot and humid so the staff decided that it was "water fun day" outside. We adapted to the schedule and .played water games, planted flowers and read with the children. You could see the eyes of these children light up, especially the boys. They played around as only boys can. One of the teachers pulled me aside and said, "You could feel the joy in these young boys because they are around women and girls for most of their young

lives. The only males they know are most police and doctors. Many boys have fathers who are either too sick or are absent from their lives." I believe that God brought light and life into both our youth and the children of Chicago. Another example of injecting life into a person came from Vacation Bible School this year. I found great joy in the smiles of over 70 youth this June. The Riverside staff did a wonderful job bringing the proclamation of release to so many young lives. Of course, I am always impressed when churches come together for anything that puts Christ's agenda first and there is life in that alone. However, I spoke with a young person who was sad one morning because he felt excluded. We sat together and talked about how hard it can be to feel pushed aside. What he was really feeling had nothing to do with VBS but everything to do with new family dynamics. Just listening to him made him feel better and then some friends came to get him and encouraged him to play with them. I saw the life come into that young child and at least for the moment a sense of peace and renewed self. What ties these experiences together? I would say that opportunity to serve one another with the mind and heart of Jesus. These experiences are not without challenges and when God brings them to our attention they are "treasures in heaven." Our confirmation students will share some of their experiences in Chicago at the service on July 17 along with some pictures from the trip. I hope that you will celebrate with us as those who help to make such opportunities possible.

Let us pray. Gracious God, who brings life out of death in our Lord Jesus, thank you for bringing life into our experiences and showing us your heart and mind for service and love for our neighbor. May we support life and seek to inject life what we say and do in the name of Jesus. Amen.

PALESTINE WOMEN OF ELCA

Monday, July 11, 2:00 p.m. Bible Study.

In the July/August issue of the Gather magazine we continue a 3 session Bible study The Heart of the Matter-Conflict, Forgiveness and Reconciliation by Angela Shannon. Session 2 is *Seeking God*. The scope of this Bible study is broad. We are dealing with expansive topics such as love, forgiveness and reconciliation in light of the fact that we are earthen vessels or clay jars. In community we learn practical ways to live out our baptismal covenant to "live among God's people."

Seeking God in conflict

For many of us, seeking God is not a new idea. We seek God each week in worship, in our Bible study circles, when we pray or in our own private devotional rituals. But how often do we seek God in conflict? We might pray to God for help to end a rough patch in our relationships, but do we seek God to help us learn from the conflict? In this session, we are encouraged to think about how conflict can be a place where we find God.

A job for "Anybody" The following cautionary tale teaches us in yet another way that we are to communicate, listen to each other and seek ways to engage one another. There was an important job to be done and Everybody was sure Somebody would do it. Anybody could have done it, but Nobody did it. Somebody got angry, because it was Everybody's job. Everybody thought Anybody could do it, but Nobody realized Everybody wouldn't do it. So Everybody blamed Somebody when Nobody did what Anybody could have done. We are the Anybodies who are the peacemakers. So what's a body to do? Here are some ideas:

- Develop a habit of praying for your congregation along with the pastor(s) and the ministries of the church. Prayer affords us an opportunity to listen for the inner stirrings, or as some would say, "the voice of God."
- Reread the "Practical tips for clay jars" from last month's study (available online under Women of ELCA website). Ruminate on them. The best time to study reconciliation is when you are not in the middle of conflict.
- Accept that disagreement and conflict are a part of the human condition. They vary in intensity. They are not sinful in and of themselves. We can choose to respond in love. We respond in love by setting appropriate boundaries and regarding each other respectfully. In the parable of the sheep and the goats, the question is asked, "When did we see you, Lord?" When communicating with people in situations of conflict, prayer becomes, "Help me to see you, Lord." As you find common ground, the only absolutes are "God is love."

The theme for the July/August 2016 Gather magazine is THE **HEART OF THE MATTER.** Conflict is an opportunity to engage in the ministry of reconciliation and to become new creations in the process.

You can help by donating one or all of the items listed below. **Guidelines:** Please give new items only. Do not donate items with any religious symbols; decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.

- □ Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or collegeruled paper approximately 8" X 10½"; no looseleaf paper
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One pencil sharpener
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- □ Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- □ Five black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- □ One 2½" eraser
- One sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks) – bags are available in the choir/confirmation room or Oriett has a pattern you can sew your own.

Finding Help and Hope

Bernie's daughter-in-law walked into her house and set her new baby on the living room sofa. She told Bernie the baby was "a mistake" and that she couldn't parent him. She never returned. At age 50, Bernie became a mom to her 2-month-old grandson, Bryce. Bernie's son the baby's biological father—had medical and mental health issues that left him unable to care for the child.

When Bryce was young, he was diagnosed with ADHD, ODD (Oppositional Defiant Disorder), fetal drug and alcohol syndrome, mental retardation, and partial bipolar disorder. As he grew older, Bryce began to develop anger issues. Bernie knew he was struggling, so she reached out to LSI.

Soon, Bryce began receiving regular home visits from a Behavioral Health Intervention Services worker, who coached Bryce on anger management. Bryce also began seeing an LSI therapist.

Today, Bryce is 15 years old. He attends special education classes, and is doing wonderfully. When he is upset, he reaches out to his LSI therapist for help. Bryce still struggles with anger, but Bernie and his LSI support team work together to meet Bryce where he is.

"I want to thank each and every one of our workers from LSI," Bernie says. "They are doing marvelous work with him."

And thanks to LSI donors, Bryce receives the help, hope, and support he needs.
