I love to ask questions all the time, but especially whenever I talk to our youth (FFY or schools). It seems the youngest children often fall into a pattern of answering 'Jesus' to every question asked. Yes, it is true that Jesus is the answer to everything. But sometimes I may be looking for a more specifically-detailed answer. But I always add, "Yes, the answer 'Jesus' works-He gets you through-God is behind everything! But tell me then how Jesus will work this out or has worked it out already." Similarly, the answer to many questions in Jesus' time could've been to simply answer with the Jewish 'Shema' Prayer. This prayer, the 'Shema', was a simple statement of the first commandment 'The Lord our God is Lord alone-Love & Serve Him with your everything!' (Deuteronomy 6:4-9) This was the first belief taught to young Jewish children about their faith, much like we Christians start with the statement 'Jesus is Lord' (1 Cor 12:3; Phil 2:11). The 'Shema' (Hebrew word for 'Listen') is repeated at the beginning of nearly every prayer (much like we begin praying with the sign of the cross!), and it is repeated multiple times throughout the day (much like we pray the 'Lord's Prayer at least three times a day!) It is the 'stand-by' prayer that oriented any other words to follow - that God is all in all. So, this question and answer period between Jesus and the scribe in today's gospel would be no surprise to anyone listening in on their discussion. UNTIL, Jesus appends a second command to it! Recall that the scribe asked for the FIRST command (one). Jesus dutifully answered with the 'Shema', and then proceeded to add 'the Second one is like it...' (Mark 12:31), which included loving one's neighbor. What Jesus was after here was confronting the 'false righteousness' of the Pharisees who would claim to have 'loved God' with all their being -that they went to the Temple, offered sacrifice & lit their candles. These acts made them feel 'justified before God' even though they continued to mistreat/exploit their brothers & sisters. Jesus said it this way in Matthew 23:23 "You hypocrites. You pay tithes of mint, dill and cummin, but have neglected the weightier things of the law: judgment and mercy and fidelity." So Jesus appends a second 'first' command in His answer to emphasize that a person cannot properly Love/Honor God without respecting equally what God has also created in His own image-our human neighbor. So we show our reverence to God by also respecting what He has created, our fellow human beings. Jesus is saying that love of God and love of neighbor are two sides of the same coin! My worship of God should benefit and help my brother or sister, whether it be through making me a more compassionate human being toward others or even directly helping them by motivating me to serve their human needs. I love my neighbor because I recognize the dignity due to them because they came from God's own hand, just like me! A good measure of properly observing love of God and love of Neighbor is to ask ourselves about every word we utter and every action we take: Is this word I speak honoring God, and does my action respect my neighbor? I like how Jesus will later explain the unity of these two commands by telling the parable of the sheep and goats where Jesus outright identifies our words and actions toward our neighbor as being directed all the same at God Himself. The king in the parable says to his servants, "Whatever you did (or didn't do) to the least of my brothers and sisters, you did (or didn't do) to me!" (Matthew 25:40, 45)

A line that really grabs me from this exchange between the scribe and Jesus is when Jesus comments to the scribe, "You are not far from the kingdom of God" (Mk 12:34). Wow! I understand this much like we talk about 'getting to heaven'. Are we there? Jesus is saying about the insightful scribe, 'With such a spiritual outlook as yours, you are almost to the kingdom!" What provoked such a glowing commendation from Jesus? The scribe had said that truly loving God & Neighbor, was worth more than all 'burnt offerings and sacrifice' (Mark 12:33). Much like the letter of James saying, "Religion that is pure and undefiled before God and the Father is this: to care for orphans and widows in their affliction and keep oneself unstained by the world" (James 1:27). The comment about 'burnt offering & sacrifices' was the scribe's way of saying that all of the Old Testament Temple Laws & Economy of buying & sacrificing animals did not offer any glory to the 'Living God'. It also did not in any way, serve anybody's neighbor! However, Jesus claimed that truly loving/serving neighbors by recognizing the image of God within them, was a way of respecting God. Now that's it! Such action truly offered both God glory and helped neighbors in need! That is the Kingdom! Peace, Fr Brin
