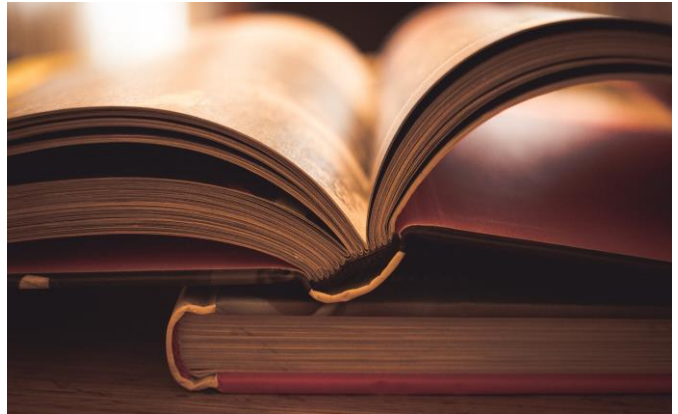


RJ: The Best of...

To be fair, there seems to be more emphasis on authors and stories prior to 1970, so I might need to supplement this with a "contemporary" version at some point. Also, especially on Goodreads, there was more emphasis on novels as opposed to short stories or novellas, and nobody differentiated between horror and supernatural, so we're just going to call them *creepy stories*.
