## THE BALTIMORE TRIP

younger scouts stocked up on them, eating them throughout the day and feeding ducks. At 1:00, we all got back together at the aquarium. This was amazing, and possibly made it the best trip I've been on. For some, it was our first time going to the National Aquarium. Others, like me, had been many times. Nonetheless, it was a great experience for all of us. We saw dolphins, an octopus, turtles, birds, jellyfish, sharks and tons of exotic fish, and some local ones too! ## REMINDER – COUNCIL'S FRIENDS OF SCOUTING CAMPAIGN

Greetings, Willistown Troop 78 family – I am writing to remind you that the 2015 Chester County Council Friends of Scouting

campaign is currently underway. This drive helps to fund the many worthwhile endeavors undertaken by Troop 78's home scouting council.

We are blessed here at Willistown Troop 78 to have the amenities that allow us to conduct a strong scouting program, but other scouts in our council are far less fortunate. Some scouts could not go to summer camp without the financial support of Chester County Council. Council provides an excellent and reliable staff that runs training programs for over 3,000 scouting volunteers in Chester County. All in all, over 13,000 Cub Scouts, Webelos, Boy Scouts and Venture Scouts receive support from council and its staff. And our council is **entirely self-funded**. The annual Friends of Scouting drive provides one out of every five dollars that is needed to run Chester Council each year.

Here at Troop 78, we try to keep the costs down for our scouting program. Outside of our annual dues, which cover registration for each scout, we do not charge for our general camping activities. We offset the costs for some of our more expensive events, such as our rafting trip. We have only two troop fundraisers – both of which allow scouts to earn money to help pay for things like summer camp or our high adventure trips. In short, we do not directly solicit contributions from our scouting families. **The Friends of Scouting campaign is a notable exception.** I am asking every family involved with Troop 78 to make a donation to Friends of Scouting. Regardless of how modest your contribution may be, it will help. You can help send a needy boy to camp or to provide leadership training that in turn will benefit a scout in our council.

I know what scouting meant to me growing up in Philadelphia. It provided me with a place to learn leadership and outdoor skills, and it

instilled in me a life-long sense of responsibility. I still keep in touch with one of my scout leaders – in fact, he's *still* a scoutmaster, and if you come to the Radnor Races community service event this year (and please do – we need your help!), you can meet my friend Dave Pearce and scouts and leaders from his Philadelphia Troop 585. Please think of your contribution to Friends of Scouting as your *investment in Scouting* – you will help to make the difference in the life of a young man. And our community will be all the better for your investment.

### HISTORY OF 'ACHEKETUM LODGE'

In 1949, the newly formed VFW Post 5203 offered Troop 78 the use of one of four summer cabins remaining on their 24-acre property on Grubb Road. Shortly thereafter, a fire destroyed the troop's meeting place at the Willistown School. After inhabiting the summer cabin near Grubb Road, plans were

drawn up by the troop committee to double its size and to add a fireplace. The VFW Home Association gave the troop \$1,000 for materials to make the improvements. In 1962, a "back room" or committee room ell was added on the site of the former kitchen. This room was later remodeled in 1982 and named in honor of George Bellgrau, Troop Committee Chairman of over 30 years. Originally heated only with wood stoves and the fireplace, an oil burner was added to the cabin in the 1970s. There were never any bathrooms or running water. The cabin was named "Achetetum Lodge" in honor of long time scout and Scoutmaster G. Ernest Heegard upon his retirement from the position of scoutmaster in June of 1994.

### A New Cabin

Needing more outdoor space after the Waynesboro Woods (Veteran's Way) housing development was built in 2000-2002, the troop committee made plans to construct a new cabin on Mill Road on a 2-3 acre parcel. Deeming it too impractical to move the "Achetetum Lodge," plans were made to build a new and much larger log cabin. Funds were raised under the direction of William "Doc" Lenker DDS and ground broken in the spring of 2001. Under the leadership of a cabin building committee headed by David Dondero, the cabin was completed with the help of numerous volunteers from the troop and throughout the community and dedicated on October 5<sup>th</sup>, 2002. Speakers at the dedication included former scoutmaster from 1955 to 1994 G. Ernest Heegard, Committee Chairman David Dondero, Fundraising Chair "Doc" Lenker and outgoing Senior Patrol Leader, Brett D'Antonio. After sitting vacant for many years, the old cabin on Grubb Road was demolished by Willistown Township on September 19<sup>th</sup>, 2012, at a cost of \$8,500.
