It's the time of year again for the seed and nursery catalogs to be coming. Flowering shrubs and trees which produce the most nectar should be selected by beekeepers. Did you ever think how big a patch of flowers there would be if all the flowers on a big tree were spread upon the ground? The honey plants meetings are a good place to ask about nectar and pollen producing plants and trees.

Have you noticed the buck brush? They are as full as can be with red berries. The bees worked the blossoms very well, which might account for this crop of berries.

#### HAPPY NEW YEAR ::

Let's look at the old year. What happened? Most colonies were in good condition last spring. By the time the clover started to bloom the bees were ready to fill the supers. Then the rain and chilly weather started and the bees prepared to swarm. The big swarms that came out sure emptied the hives, which never recovered enough to produce any surplus. The hives that never swarmed gathered a fair crop of honey.

The autumn was good to us with lots of golden rod and aster blooming and the weather just right for the bees to fill their hives for winter. Now I believe some bees are more likely to swarm than others. It might help to take some brood and young bees from these hives that are bad about swarming and place them above the parent colony with a double screen between. Put a new queen with them, leave an entrance for the upper part. The old bees will go out and go back to the old colony on the bottom. The new queen is more likely to be accepted by the young bees. Feed them and when they have built to strength, remove the old part to a new location. The new part that is left will have all the work force and the new queen, and will not be so apt to swarm. These new queens should be started in April. This would use some of the extra hive bodies you have in the garage. Empty hives never bring in any profit. Louis Hollenbeck uses this double screen method and the new queen to prevent swarming.
