Beware of Phone Scams Local Women Report Calls

In the last two weeks, two women in the Amana Colonies report that they were contacted by telephone scammers who were able to string them along causing upset and worry.

Details vary but both scams used a story about a close relative in trouble.

Iowa County Sheriff Rob Rotter reports that these scams are persistently active. "This type of activity is a constant and has been for as long as I've been an officer. The methods have changed somewhat due to the internet, but the results are the same. We are told of one or two a month. I think the actual numbers would be higher, but oftentimes victims are embarrassed and don't want to talk about it."

Using special software that masks the location of the caller so that the call cannot be traced, the victims are often randomly selected. "The two most successful scams are folks being told that they have won a lottery and that they need to pay the taxes before millions of dollars (in prize money) can be forwarded to them. The other is when a scammer poses as a family member in trouble and asked for money to be wired or sent by cash cards. The IRS scam is pretty active as well, but not all that successful."

Both of the Amana women were approached with the "family member in trouble" scam. The caller posed as a grandson or granddaughter calling to report that they had been involved in a hit and run accident; and then falsely arrested for possession of pot. They then asked for money for bail.

The phone scammers seemed to have enough information and used enough details that the stories sounded somewhat creditable. Plus they were able to scare and befuddle their victims.

The key bit of advice - Never share any credit card, debit card or agree to wire transfer or send cash cards to someone who calls you. Never respond to a telephone charity phone call.

What can we do if we are called? "Hang-up," Sheriff Rotter urges.

Adding, "The majority of these calls are generated from offshore locations even thought the caller ID seems to look more local. Because the calls are made using internet protocol, the call is untraceable. . .Once cash is wired or sent by cash cards, it is gone and no one can get it back."

He added, "The most helpful thing anyone can do is have a conversation with everyone in your family, especially the elderly, about these scams. Ensure them that no one in the family would ask for money to be wired. If someone does get a call they think might be legitimate - by all means, call my office. I, or one of my deputies, will personally look into the situation and determine if it is legitimate."

These crimes can be prevented and the best way to do that is be forewarned, ask guestions and communicate directly with family, Sheriff Rotter concluded.
