LACE: LAY ACADEMY OF CHURCH EXCELLENCE

The mission of the Lay Academy of Church Excellence (LACE) is to provide an integrated program to educate, energize, and empower lay people in each United Methodist local church to become faithful disciples and effective leaders who create vital congregations for the transformation of the world. LACE accomplishes this mission by assisting faithful disciples to identify, develop, and enhance their spiritual gifts leading them into leadership roles in diversified fields of ministry.

Completion of the core curriculum prepares LACE participants for three options.

- 1. Complete the basic requirements to become a lay speaker.
- 2. Learn more about United Methodist history and theology.
- 3. Sharpen leadership skills to become a more effective servant leader in the Church.

More about the program

- The program is taught entirely within the boundaries of each district. Thus, there is no need to travel very far to attend the classes.
- The program is taught in five (5) sessions.
- The district response teams (also known as District Leadership Teams) will have the discretion to schedule the sessions depending on the needs in each district. Each district response team will designate five (5) strategic host churches throughout the district to provide classrooms and lunch for the participants.
- The Board of Laity designed the program at no expense to participants except their time to participate. However, participants will be asked to give a love offering to the individual churches providing lunch.
- The instructors will consist of local people including pastors, deacons, district superintendent, and lay people proficient in the different classes being taught.
- Districts may bring in additional speakers who are experts in their fields providing funds are available.

If you have ever had a desire to learn more about Methodism, become a lay speaker, or acquire skills that will help you become an effective church leader, then this program is for you. Remember, God works through each of us to make our local churches vital congregations for the transformation of the world!

DISCIPLESHIP TEAM NEWS: FASTING

I just recently attended Class 201 with Pastor Ted. My purposes were to dive deeper into my faith and learn more about Methodism. One of the things that sparked my interest was fasting. We have all heard of it, and I knew that Jesus spoke of fasting. I really didn't know much about it, so I did some research. This article can in no way cover everything but as a member of the discipleship team I would like to give you some food for thought. (No pun intended)

Why Fast? Jesus talked to others about fasting. It was an expected discipline in the Old and New Testament. Did you know fasting is mentioned more in the bible than baptism? John Wesley fasted every Wednesday and Friday and required all his clergy to fast.

Some other reasons:

- Fasting gives you more time for prayer.
- Fasting demonstrates the depth of your desire.
- Fasting releases God's supernatural power. Moses fasted forty days before receiving the Ten Commandments.

Some things fasting IS and some things fasting IS NOT.

- Fasting is not earning an answer from God. It simply prepares us for an answer.
- Fasting is to draw us closer to God, not to impress others with our spirituality.
- Fasting is not so much about food as it is focus.

- Fasting is not so much about saying no to the body as it is saying yes to the Spirit.
- Fasting is not a means of seeking God's blessing as much as a means for seeking God.
- Fasting is not a test for Super Saints, or a means to twist God's arm, and it is not a secret formula to get through to God.
- Fasting is a feasting on the Lord. Looking to him for comfort, strength and guidance, for forgiveness, and hope.

There are several ways to fast. It could be a total fast of only water, a partial fast of juices at meal times. It could be just skipping one meal a day, or building up to skipping two meals in a day.

It is very important if you are considering fasting to think about your health. If you have any health problems you should have a complete physical from your physician and tell them what you are going to do. Be aware that fasting can affect your mood and your tolerance for activity. Be prepared to answer questions from loved ones and coworkers. Satan will do everything he can to interfere because he hates to see us grow in our faith.

Some scriptures I would recommend on fasting: Mathew 6:16-18, Psalm 35:13, Ezra 8:21, 2 Chronicles 7:14, Acts 9:9, Deuteronomy 9:9, 1Kings 19:8, Psalm 66:16-20.

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LETTER FROM BISHOP DAVIS

BISHOP DAVIS AND COUNCIL OF BISHOPS RESPOND TO WESTERN JURISDICTION ELECTION RESULTS

July 16, 2016

"Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I awakened this morning to the news that the Western Jurisdiction had elected an openly lesbian elder to the episcopacy.

The Southeastern Jurisdiction had already concluded, so can take no action. However, the South Central Jurisdiction meeting in Kansas was still in session and voted to ask the Judicial Council of our church to render a declaratory decision on the legality of this action as soon as possible.

I am hopeful that the Judicial Council will declare this action by the Western Jurisdiction null and void. Below is a statement by Bishop Bruce Ough, President of the Council of Bishops, which I hope will be helpful to you. Please continue to be prayerful and steady in your witness during this time.

The Western Jurisdiction has elected the Rev. Karen Oliveto of Glide Memorial United Methodist Church in San Francisco to serve as a bishop of The United Methodist Church. Rev. Oliveto has been described as "an openly lesbian clergyperson." This election raises significant concerns and questions of church polity and unity.

Our Book of Discipline has clearly delineated processes in place for resolving issues even as complex and unprecedented as this election.

The authority to elect bishops is constitutionally reserved to the jurisdictional and central conferences. Any elder in good standing is eligible for election as a bishop of the church. An elder under an unresolved complaint is still considered to be in good standing. Being a self-avowed, practicing homosexual is a chargeable offense for any clergyperson in The United Methodist Church, if indeed this is the case.

The Council of Bishops is monitoring this situation very closely. The Council does not have constitutional authority to intervene in the election or supervisory processes at either the annual conference, jurisdictional or central conference levels. And, we are careful to not jeopardize any clergy or lay person's due process by ill-advised comments.

However, we clearly understand the Church appropriately expects the Council to provide spiritual leadership and for bishops to uphold our consecration vows. In May, prior to General Conference, the Council again affirmed to keep the promises made at our consecrations, including, among others:

- · Shepherding all persons committed to our care;
- Leading the church in mission, witness and service;

Ordering the church including administering processes for handling complaints; Seeking unity in Christ, including the work the Council proposed to the General Conference in "An Offering for a Way Forward."

There are those in the church who will view this election as a violation of church law and a significant step toward a split, while there are others who will celebrate the election as a milestone toward being a more inclusive church. Others will no doubt have questions as we find ourselves in a place where we have never been. Still, others will likely see this election as disrupting or even rendering moot the purpose and work of the Commission currently being formed by the Council.

The Council continues to place our hope in Jesus Christ.

Though conflicted and fragile, The United Methodist Church remains a strong witness to the transforming love of God and the saving grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ. We affirm that our witness is defined, not by an absence of conflict, but how we act in our disagreements. We affirm that our unity is not defined by our uniformity, but by our compassionate and Spirit-led faithfulness to our covenant with God, Christ's Church and one another.

As a Council, we continue to maintain that the proposal for a way forward and the formation of the Commission is the best path. An endless cycle of actions, reactions and counter-reactions is not a viable path and tears at the very fabric of our Connection. The current and incoming COB Executive Committees recently met by conference call to initiate the implementation of our Offering for a Way Forward and the formation of the Commission called for in the proposal. We will resume this work at our regularly scheduled meeting on July 19-20 following the Jurisdictional Conferences. A progress report will be released shortly after the meeting.

Our differences are real and cannot be glossed over, but they are also reconcilable. We are confident God is with us, especially in

BISHOP FAIRLEY TAKES OFFICE SEPTEMBER 1, 2016

LEONARD FAIRLEY ELECTED UM BISHOP

Leonard Fairley, a native of Laurinburg and a district superintendent in the North Carolina Conference has been elected a bishop of the United Methodist Church.

The election was announced Wednesday, July 13th, during the meeting of the denomination's Southeastern Jurisdiction at Lake Junaluska. Delegates from nine Southern states began meeting on July 13th. The conference concluded on July 15th with the consecration of Fairley as Bishop on Friday morning.

Bishops are appointed leaders of conferences (geographic areas within one or more states). Appointments are for four years and can be extended for another four years. Fairley cannot be appointed to his home conference for at least four years.

As the capital District superintendent, Fairley

served as the chief missional strategist and spiritual and administrative leader to 96 churches and 134 active pastors in a geographical area that included Raleigh, Cary, Garner, Clayton, Smithfield, Benson, Goldsboro, Knightdale,

Wendell, and Wilson. The North Carolina Conference includes churches in 56 Eastern North Carolina counties.

Fairley graduated from Scotland high School in Laurinburg and received a Bachelor of Arts from Pfeiffer University and a Masters of Divinity from Duke. Previously, he has served as pastor at the Sanford Circuit, St. Peter's United Methodist in Cary, and as the Rockingham District superintendent.

He was married to Priscilla Fairley, who passed away in 2013, and is the father of two children and the grandfather to three children.

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FINANCE: SCRIP CENTER PROGRAM VOLUNTEER



Several of our members are very aware of our Scrip Program at Chapel Hill. The Scrip Program is a source of revenue to the ministries of Chapel Hill without "extra giving" from our members. If you are not aware of how the Scrip Program actually works, (or have not read the synopsis that appears weekly in our Sunday bulletin) here is a condensed version.

Over 700 retailers offering products from gas, groceries, clothing, restaurants, hunting/fishing supplies, home improvements, entertainment and lodging offer full-value gift cards to participating groups and organizations at discounts from 2-13%; Chapel Hill is one of those participating organizations. In other words, when you buy and use a Scrip card from Chapel Hill you receive full value in goods and services and the church gets the applicable discount. If you buy a \$100 Wal Mart card from Chapel Hill, we pay only \$98 for that card.

With a little bit of planning and by utilizing more of the participating merchants, your financial aid to the ministries of our church is greater, benefiting many lives; and it costs you nothing! One might be amazed at the amount of benefit available to our outreach. Simply log on to www.shopwithscrip.com; this will show you the participating merchants and the applicable percentage of discount. Again, with just a bit of planning and by entering our code (CD24A19C362L8) you may order cards to fulfill most of your purchases for a one or two week period; you don't have

to carry cash and your church gets much needed revenue.

We are aware of a neighboring high school that uses the Scrip program. One recent week's purchases of Scrip card purchases totaled over \$57,000! If all those cards were only discounted the minimum of 2%, that was over \$1,100 "extra" money to that school. See what a little effort can accomplish?

The Finance committee plans to have a small kiosk for the Scrip card center placed permanently in the Fellowship Hall for your convenience to facilitate your weekly purchase of cards we keep in stock. The church has need of a dedicated volunteer to oversee the Scrip program and to help increase its usage by manning, or scheduling someone to man the Scrip center kiosk for short periods after the 8:00 and 9:30 services each Sunday and to coordinate the online ordering and distribution of weekly purchases. The time commitment for this should be minimal and will be of great benefit to the church.

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3 COMMON TRAITS OF YOUTH WHO DON'T LEAVE THE CHURCH

WHAT IS IT THAT SETS APART THE KIDS WHO STAY IN THE CHURCH?

"What do we do about our kids?" The group of parents sat together in my office, wiping their eyes. I'm a high school pastor, but for once, they weren't talking about 16-year-olds drinking and partying. Each had a story to tell about a "good Christian" child, raised in their home and in our church, who had walked away from the faith during the college years. These children had come through our church's youth program, gone on short-term mission trips, and served in several different ministries during their teenage years. Now they didn't want anything to do with it anymore.

The <u>daunting statistics</u> about church-going youth keep rolling in. Panic ensues. What are we doing wrong in our churches? In our youth ministries?

We can all look at the 20-somethings in our churches who *are* engaged and involved in ministry. What is it that sets apart the kids who *stay* in the church? Here are just a few observations I have made about such kids.

1. They are converted.

The Apostle Paul, interestingly enough, doesn't use phrases like "nominal Christian" or "pretty good kid." The Bible doesn't seem to mess around with platitudes like: "Yeah, it's a shame he did that, but he's got a good heart." When we listen to the witness of Scripture, particularly on the topic of conversion, we find that there is very little wiggle room. Listen to these words: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come." (2 Cor. 5:17) We need to get back to understanding salvation as what it really is: a miracle that comes from the glorious power of God through the working of the Holy Spirit.

We need to start getting on our knees and praying that the Holy Spirit will do miraculous saving work in the hearts of our students as the Word of God speaks to them. In short, we need to get back to a focus on conversion. Churches, we need to preach, teach, and talk—all the while praying fervently for the miraculous work of regeneration to occur in the hearts and souls of our students by the power of the Holy Spirit! When that happens—when the "old goes" and the "new comes"—it will not be iffy. We will not be dealing with a group of "nominal Christians." We will be ready to teach, disciple, and equip a generation of future church leaders—"new creations"!
—who are hungry to know and speak God's Word. It is

converted students who go on to love Jesus and serve the church.

2. They have been equipped, not entertained.

Recently, we had "man day" with some of the guys in our youth group. We began with an hour of basketball at the local park, moved to an intense game of 16" ("Chicago Style") softball, and finished the afternoon by gorging ourselves on meaty pizzas and 2-liters of soda. I am not against fun (or gross, depending on your opinion of the afternoon I just described) things in youth ministry. But churches especially need to keep repeating the words of Ephesians 4:11-12 to themselves: "[Christ] gave...the teachers to equip the saints for the work of the ministry, for building up the body of Christ." Christ gives us—teachers—to the church, not for entertainment, encouragement, examples, or even friendship primarily. He gives us to the church to "equip" the saints to do gospel ministry in order that the church of Christ may be built up.

If I have not equipped the students in my ministry to share the gospel, disciple a younger believer, and lead a Bible study, then I have not fulfilled my calling to them, no matter how good my sermons have been. We pray for conversion; that is all we can do, for it is entirely a gracious gift of God. But after conversion, it is our Christ-given duty to help fan into flame a faith that serves, leads, teaches, and grows. If our students leave high school without Bible-reading habits, Bible-study skills, and strong examples of discipleship and prayer, we have lost them. We have entertained, not equipped them...and it may indeed be time to panic!

3. Their parents preached the gospel to them.

The common thread that binds together almost every ministry-minded 20-something that I know is abundantly clear: a home where the gospel was not peripheral but absolutely central. The 20-somethings who are serving, leading, and driving the ministries at our church were kids whose parents made them go to church. They are kids whose parents punished them and held them accountable when they were rebellious. They are kids whose parents read the Bible around the dinner table every night. And they are kids whose parents were tough but who ultimately operated from a framework of grace that held up the cross of Jesus as the basis for peace with



FROM THE NURSERY

This month, your preschoolers are blasting off into a new school year by reviewing our 3 basic truths: God made me; God loves me; Jesus wants to be my friend forever. Think about those 3 truths for one minute. Think about how powerful they are. If your preschoolers have those 3 truths tucked into their hearts by the time they enter elementary school, they will have an amazing foundation on which to build their faith.

Your preschoolers will be hearing these 3 basic truths from us regularly throughout the month (and the months to come), but that's not enough. They need to hear them from you. They need to hear them every day. Think about how many times you sing the ABC's with your preschoolers so they can learn their letters. That's how many times they need to hear these truths. Make saying them apart of your daily



routine as they get up in the morning and go to bed at night. God made them! God loves them! And Jesus wants to be their friend forever. That's something worth repeating.

MORNING TIME

This month let your child wake up to, "Good morning! God made you! God loves you! And Jesus wants to be your friend forever!"

Throughout the day, look for times

to say each of these truths to your child while giving him/her a high five.

CAR TIME

As you drive along, ask your child to name a few things he loves and why he loves them so much. Maybe he loves Mac n cheese because it tastes so yummy or a favorite toy because it's a lot of fun. Tell your child that God loves him just because He made him, and nothing will ever change that!

BATH TIME

Bath time is the perfect time to teach your preschooler the names of her body parts while you wash the day away. But instead of saying, "This is your arm," and, "This is your knee," say, "God made your arm," and, "God made your knee." Do this with your child from head to toe and end with, "And that's why God loves you so much. God made you!"

CUDDLE TIME

Cuddle up with your child and pray. "Dear God, thank You for making (name of child)! Thank You for letting me be his (mommy/ daddy). I love the way You made him with (name unique characteristics and abilities about your child). I hope every time (name of child) looks in the mirror and sees the face You made, he will remember how much You love him. We love You, God. In Jesus' name, amen.

PLAY TIME

Play-Doh is a fun way to talk to preschoolers about how God made our bodies. Show your child how to form a head, body, arms, and legs out of dough. Use a sharpened pencil to carve facial features. As you play together, tell your child that God loves us because He made us, and nothing will ever change that.
