#### WE ARE NOT FINISHED PRODUCTS

I wonder why we lie. I wonder why we sometimes pretend to be who we are not. I wonder why we wear masks, even porous ones. I wonder why we cover up our weaknesses. One of the reasons behind these actions could be because of the low level of tolerance in the people around us in our families, communities (including religious), school and work places and in the larger society. One reason behind our low tolerance could be because we do not look at others and ourselves the way we should. We look at ourselves as finished products. Yes, we know we're not finished products. But in reality, when it really matters, most of the times the way we actually relate with each other shows we expect ourselves and others to be finished products.

In the Gospel today (Matthew 16:13-20), we see the finest

moments in Peter's life. I just shook my head as I read it. This same Peter that proclaimed, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God," was the same Peter who later said, "I do not know this man" (Matthew 26:74). Peter was never a finished product. Did Jesus ever expect Peter to be a finished product? No! No! No! But He did want him and all the disciples to grow and blossom into great

disciples and children of God. And they all did. Indeed, they all did. And it took time and lots and LOTS of work and tons of patience.

So, what about you and me and the next person beside you? What do all these teach or remind us? For one, a clear message is that there existed a division within Peter, just as there exists and will always exist a division within each of us. The level of division differs though. Jesus knows that and is patient with us as He was with Peter. He did not condone or encourage this division; but again, He knew Peter and his brothers and sisters were not finished products. This helped them to be themselves before Jesus, and hopefully in the presence of one another. It helped them to be patient with one another and grow in virtues.

May each of us recognize that God is constantly at work in us and in the brother or sister beside us. May such comforting knowledge help us to accept the division within us and constantly work on growth. May we then, in our relationships, be sincerely patient with each other. Amen.



It is a New York State authorized adoption agency, offering a full range of counseling, education, and placement services to the expectant mother and father. CGHSB's professional social workers provide sensitive, compassionate, and confidential counseling to any client regardless of age, legal status, religion, race, or economic status. All services are free. Maternity services social workers are available to schedule visits with the client at a convenient location, either an office setting, the client's home or a site requested by the client.

Home studies and placement services for prospective adoptive parents planning to adopt domestically or internationally are also provided. They have instituted an International Adoptive Placement program with the Democratic Republic of the Congo and expect to do so with Bulgaria.

# FEAST OF THE PATRON SAINT OF OUR PARISH, BARTHOLOMEW THE APOSTLE

#### **AUGUST 24**



In the New Testament, Bartholomew is mentioned only in the lists of the apostles. Some scholars identify him with Nathanael, a man of Cana in Galilee who was summoned to Jesus by Philip. Jesus paid him a great compliment: "Here is a true Israelite. There is no duplicity in him" (John 1:47b). When Nathanael asked how Jesus

knew him, Jesus said: "I saw you under the fig tree" (John 1:48b). Whatever amazing revelation this involved, it brought Nathanael to exclaim, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God; You are the King of Israel" (John 1:49b). But Jesus countered with, "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than this" (John 1:50b).

Nathanael did see greater things. He was one of those to whom Jesus appeared on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias after His resurrection (see John 21:1-14). They had been fishing all night without success. In the morning, they saw someone standing on the shore though no one knew it was Jesus. He told them to cast their net again, and they made so great a catch that they could not haul the net in. Then John cried out to Peter, "It is the Lord."

When they brought the boat to shore, they found a fire burning, with some fish laid on it and some bread. Jesus asked them to bring some of the fish they had caught, and invited them to come and eat their meal. John relates that although they knew it was Jesus, none of the apostles presumed to inquire who He was. This, John notes, was the third time Jesus appeared to the apostles.

**COMMENT**: Bartholomew or Nathanael? We are confronted again with the fact that we know almost nothing about most of the apostles. Yet the unknown ones were also foundation stones, the twelve pillars of the new Israel whose twelve tribes now encompass the whole earth. Their personalities were secondary (without thereby being demeaned) to their great office of bearing tradition from their firsthand experience, speaking in the name of Jesus, putting the Word made flesh into human words for the enlightenment of the world. Their holiness was not an introverted contemplation of their status before God.

The simple fact is that humanity is totally meaningless unless God is its total concern. Then humanity, made holy with God's own holiness, becomes the most precious creation of God.
