### Barrick submits environment study on Pascua gold find

SANTIAGO, Aug 16 (Reuters) - Canadian miner Barrick Gold Corp. (Toronto: -) has submitted to Chile's state-run environmental commission the environmental impact study for its \$950 million Pascua Lama gold project that straddles the border with Argentina, the government's gazette said.

Located in the Andes Mountains, the project would produce annually 615,000 ounces of gold, 18.2 million ounces of silver and about 5,000 tonnes of copper contained in concentrates, the Diario Oficial newspaper said.

Construction is set to begin in February 2001 and last two years, it said. Production would begin in 2003, and the project would have a lifespan of 20 years based on current reserves, it said.

With this much lighter lode, it seemed like only months before I emerged from the darkest depths of the bush and onto a road that ran beside an airstrip that occupied the same ground as the red X on my 20-year-old map. Both S.O.B. and I started to growl and grumble, then he bit me.

After applying the necessary first aid, which consisted of a band aid for me and a tourniquet that I placed around S.O.B.'s neck so he would have to open his mouth for air so I could extract my leg, I decided to

corrode the airstrip's surface with few choice remarks and drag my gear, myself, and my choking dog upstream a couple of miles to at least rid myself of the road's view. It was at this location that I commenced prospecting and building up my mastery of goldpan usage. first I made the

usual mistakes, like spilling the pan into the creek, along with its hopeful contents. I have two favorite ways of accomplishing this act. One, is to take the pan containing my sluice box holdings, which I've spent the whole day shoveling to acquire, and set it tipping on some rocks while I danced around on the slippery stream bottom replacing the sluice box riffles. Somewhere within this routine, something like a shovel or a pick is knocked over. The success in this method lies strictly in the odds. Considering the size of a gold pan as compared to the size of the earth, I find it amazing that the pick or shovel handle will land directly onto the pan's edge nine out of nine.

nine out of nine times, and spring free its imprisoned contents.

These episodes have been known to invoke verbal outbursts that have caused cured hickory pick handles to curl up and touch ends. The second, but less desirable method I use, is to pick up the pan and stumble over slimy rocks to my panning pool, which is located some 40 feet down stream.

"Why," you ask, "doesn't he just pan it out right there?" Well, it's like this: After I've picked and shoveled gravel all day, I feel entitled to the comfort offered by sitting on a rock

while panning out the day's pay dirt, or in my case, below minimum wage muck. It's not my fault that the only rock suitable for this task was irresponsibly misplaced by, "Mother Nature". During this 40-foot frantic shuffle,

gravity has been known to intensify its efforts causing me to execute Olympic class dives and belly flops into the creek, some of which scored perfect 10's.

Another common mistake made by most inexperienced pan handlers, is to place an empty gold pan on the nearest flat surface, then turn away. The problem in this being is that the only flat surface along a creek, is the creek, and empty gold pans float. I've personally swam, ran and stumbled countless downstream miles in pursuit of just such ocean-bound gold pans.

## Precious metals mixed in quiet trading

NEW YORK (CBS.MW) -- Precious
metals futures closed mixed Thursday in lackluster trading as gold and
silver shares ended lower.

On the Commodities Exchange division of the New York Mercantile Exchange, December gold rose 30 cents to \$282.60 an ounce and September silver added 0.8 cent to \$4.883 an ounce.

In the equities market, the Philadelphia Gold and Silver Index (\$XAU: news, msgs) and the CBOE Gold Index (\$GOX: news, msgs) fell by 2.8 percent and 3.2 percent, respectively.

Within the indexes, shares of Barrick Gold (ABX: news, msgs) fell 3/4 to 16 7/8 and shares of Placer Dome Gold (PDG: news, msgs) slipped 5/16 to close at 9.

Comex gold warehouse stocks, as of late Wednesday, were unchanged at 1,953,207 ounces. Silver stocks were also flat at 100,936,555 ounces.

In other metals highlights, September palladium slipped \$14.90 to \$745 an ounce and October platinum fell \$3.50 to \$568.50 an ounce.

September copper rose 0.05 cent to 86.70 a pound. The London Metals Exchange said copper supplies, as of early Thursday, were down 2,050 metric tons at 450,950 metric tons. Comex stocks fell 356 short tons to stand at 65,103 short tons.

Others took a more low-tech approach, making the trip with only a


simple wheelbarrow. It's hard to

To prevent the reoccurrence of such happenings, I put into production my golden retriever's inbred ability to fetch gold pans. Now S.O.B. swims, runs and stumbles countless downstream miles.

Along with totally enriching one's life, and freeing your inner consciousness so it can unite harmoniously with the inner-galactic cosmos in the form of screeching curses, panning also increases the prospector's vision by tenfold over the average Joe. For instance, what I call a nugget, I can spot from 10 paces through three inches of murky water while it sets silently at the bottom of a sluice box riffle three quarters concealed by a grain of sand. ### The Bill Gates Car

## Facts About Gold

G

old has played a prominent role in the social and economic fabric of civilization for thousands of years.

### What is Gold?

Gold is a heavy, yellow, metallic chemical element. It is a precious metal, with a high degree of ductility and malleability, that is used in the manufacture of a wide range of products including jewelry, electronics, and coinage

### How is Gold Weighed?

The weight of gold or gold articles is usually expressed in troy ounces.

1 troy ounce = 1.097 ordinary ounce 1 tonne = 32,151 troy ounces

### How is Purity Measured?

The purity of gold articles is generally described in three ways:

### What Does it Mean?

Gold Filled: Also called gold overlay, a layer of at least 10-karat gold permanently bonded by heat and pressure to one or more surfaces of a support metal, then rolled or drawn to a prescribed thickness. The karat gold must be at least 1/10 by weight of the total metal content.

Rolled Gold Plate: Material consisting of a layer of plating of 10-karat gold or better which is mechanically bonded to a base metal. The karat gold content may be less than 1/20 but must be properly identified by weight in terms of total metal content.

Vermeil: Gold at least 15- micro-inches thick, bonded to sterling silver by an electrolytic or mechanical process.

Gold Leaf: Pure gold that is pounded into sheets applied to other surfaces by hand. Usually about 3 micro-inches thick.

This is the first in a series of articles on gold. Next month we will cover the history of gold. Ed.

## Extraordinary Women

The fair sex was not exempt from "gold fever" - one out of ten stampeders was a woman.

Journalist Annie Hall Strong offered some advice for women headed to the Klondike. Her article, "Hints

to Women," first appeared in the December 31, 1897, edition of the Skaguay News and was reprinted in newspapers around the country.

She wrote that "women have made up their minds to go to the Klondike, so there is no use trying to discourage them."

Speaking for the female stampeders, Strong boasted that "when our fathers, husbands and

brothers decided to go, so did we, and our wills are strong and courage unfailing. We will not be drawbacks nor hindrances, and they won't have to return on our account." Strong herself had been one of those who contracted what she termed "acute Klondicitis." She arrived in Skagway in the late summer of 1897.


Over a thousand women crossed over the Chilkoot or White Pass trail between 1896 and 1900.

along the trails was noted in the letters and diaries of male stampeders.

In at least one instance, their presence encouraged one man to continue on. In a letter to his wife, Kitty, Fred Dewey

wrote, "It is a big day's work haul 100 to pounds a distance of four miles. There аге three women alone on the trail and they are taking their own stuff in. I would be ashamed back down before difficulties those that women surmount."

These are the stories women whose lives were caught up in the Klondike Gold Rush in very different ways.



Women pulling sled loaded with provisions through the muddy streets of Skagway, Alaska in 1898.



### Monday August 21, 11:28 am ET Europe gold ends weaker, silver set to test support

LONDON, Aug 21 (Reuters) - Europe's precious metals markets ended a subdued session on Monday with rangebound gold still looking for inspiration while silver and the platinum group metals (PGMs) were virtually unchanged.

But silver was proving to be the central talking point in the market place for a change, as it was seen heading for a test of the \$4.80 support level, which would take it to its lowest since December 1998, when it touched an intraday low of 4.81.

Dealers said the gradual decline in prices had revived speculation that U.S. investor Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway was liquidating some of the huge silver holding accumulated several years ago. As of 1998, it was thought to have amassed up to 130 million ounces, or about 16 percent, of world silver supply.

While no evidence has emerged of any Berkshire sales, the market often turns to Buffett rumours when silver is caught in a bearish phase.

"The rumours are getting stronger and louder day by day," said one London-based trader. "There is a sort of feeling that people who normally do not trade in the market are trading in the market."

But other dealers attributed the price slip to talk of renewed official Chinese sales.

Spot silver was last unchanged from the New York close at \$4.83/\$4.85.

Gold met producer selling on Friday and on Monday continued to slip lower, last at \$274.90/\$275.40, falling back from opening levels and erasing all early gains made since Friday's New York close at \$276.40/\$276.90. The afternoon fix was at \$274.60, down from the morning one at \$276.40.

"The metal is finding good support on the downside...volumes remain thin for now due to the summer, so that currency moves often appear to be the dominant factor in the market." Weakness in both the euro and Australian dollar against the U.S. dollar capped any intraday upside potential.

Traders said the market was also waiting for the U.S. Federal Reserve Bank's rate-setting committee meeting looming on Tuesday with consensus building for the Fed not to raise rates.

In PGMs, spot prices were steady but the equities were strong, boosted by the positive market response to the friendly takeover of South African miner Kroondal by Australia's Aquarius (Australia: AQP.AX - news)(quote from Yahoo! UK & Ireland: AQP.L). Kroondal released better-than-expected maiden results on Monday, with results from Amplats due out on Tuesday and Implats next week.

Platinum was last firmer at \$566.00/\$574.00 from \$563.20/\$571.20 after session of very thin trade, while palladium was virtually unchanged at \$730.00/\$745.00 from \$730.75/\$750.75.
