Saturday, August 5, at the Amana Performing Arts Center "Meet the Roosevelts" an engaging, entering evening with President Teddy Roosevelt and the first Lady, Edith Roosevelt.

Tickets are just \$15 and can be ordered by called 319-899-3799. This is a production of TKM Theatrical Productions, the nonprofit created to host and produce theatre in our community with artists Deb Kennedy and Tom Milligan leading the company.

Several years ago my husband and I were in Medora, ND, at the Theodore Roosevelt National Park when we spotted President Roosevelt crossing the lawn near the visitor center at the park. Well, at least he certainly looked like Roosevelt, talked like him and walked like him (according to newsreels) and he had that same high wattage, hat-waving grin and greeting that we would expect from the hero of San Juan Hill and the gentleman who practically invented the high adventure sportsman of the American west. Genial and funny, he was a dead ringer for Roosevelt.

Turns out this was Larry Marple, an Ohio teacher and historian, actor and story teller who has presented his amazing portrayal of President Teddy Roosevelt across the country – including historic sites closely associated with the 26th President. He and his wife, Julia Marple, are in high demand, but Deb Kennedy and Tom Milligan were able to persuade the Marples (whom they met while working in theatre at Medora) to come to Amana for a visit and a showcase performance here. Do not miss it Saturday night at 7 p.m. If you enjoy American story-telling, history, the theatre this will be fun.

The Marples have performed at the Sagamore Hill National Historic Site in Oyster Bay, Long Island, the Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural National Historic Site in Buffalo, New York and the Roosevelt Memorial Island in Washington DC. You know, if the National Park Service and the Smithsonian Institute enlist them for these high-visibility performances at national historic sites, then they are have to be accurate and engaging.

So come meet President Teddy Roosevelt and First Lady Edith Roosevelt who, much to our delight, will have plenty to say about their White House years with words of wisdom on all sorts of subjects.

RAGBRAI 2023 in the Books Now

History will harken back to the 2023 Register's Annual Great Bike Ride Across Iowa as a hot ride, a very hot ride. The day the Register's bike trek passed through Iowa County the actual temperature reached 99 degrees and the heat index topped 115 degrees.

"My boots kept sticking to the pavement on US Highway 151 as I was directing traffic," said Iowa County Sheriff Rob Rotter, who was happy to report that the day went pretty well despite the heat.

"We had a small handful of bike spills resulting

in basic medical attention. Between the RAGBRAI dedicated EMS service and the Iowa County Ambulance Service, everyone was well cared for, and no one suffered any life threatening injuries. . . . Between the local organizers in Marengo and Amana, along with first responders, it went extremely well. It helps that RAGBRAI is nothing new to many of us. We heard many compliments from participants saying their ride through Iowa County was a pleasant one. I would also like to point out that I have personally helped with these large scale events for many years, and I do believe the participants of this year's RAGBRAI was made up of some of the most polite, considerate, and appreciative folks I have ever encountered in a large event."

"Iowa Nice' was alive and well throughout this event," Sheriff Rotter said.

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to have heart problems and a move to Iowa City seemed the best option. After her death George moved to Las Vegas Nv. and lived with his daughter, Virginia, for many years until it was time to seek professional care.

The three children, Milton, Lois and Virginia, and one grandson, made regular visits making him feel loved.

George was quiet and not a boastful man. He always had a smile and quiet/dry sense of humor.

Thoughtful and kind was the way his family always thought of him. My father would be able to lean on him and ask for advice and know that the advice would be well thought out. After my father died in 2004 I would continue to write George asking questions. Finally, his children would write back for him. Truly he will be missed.

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He added that there were a fair number of riders who chose to ride the "SAG" wagons from Marengo or Amana to Coralville due to exhaustion and heat, but there were surprisingly very few actual heat-related emergencies in Iowa County.

Iowa County EMS was on hand to assist and transport if need be. Iowa County Sheriff deputies and the Iowa County Highway patrol, along with volunteers provided traffic control at many locations in the county.

"It was certainly a big crowd. But it was not surprising that so many riders came through town at sunup or before 10 a.m. And then we even saw some long after sunset," said one Middle Amana resident.

Bikers seemed to love crowding under shade trees near the Middle Amana Fire Department where they had water hoses available for cooling down and home-made pie for sale. "That pie was a big, big hit," said one Middle volunteer. "Thank you to everyone who contributed a pie or two."

Steve Rose, Middle Amana, said that the fire department sold over 40 pies and distributed many gallons of much needed water.

Nearly everyone we talked to commented at how polite, respectful and generally nice the bike riders were. Gloria Alexander who was on duty at the Visitor Center said that she was thanked many times by riders who wanted her to know they appreciated her providing shade at the center and keeping the restrooms at the Visitor Center clean. "I even had one gentleman hold the dustpan for me while I swept up," she told us.

For the most part bike riders did follow the planned route into Main Amana though a few went down Highway 6 via South Amana. They might have done so to avoid the huge "Homestead hill" which proved a huge challenge for weary riders heading to Coralville for their overnight stop.

Talking with Stacey Colledge, executive director of the Amana Colonies Convention and Visitors Bureau Monday, she is planning to contact ACCVB members about a post-event debriefing meeting to discuss the day, but overall felt the day was a good one for Amana, if challenging and hot.

Jon Childers, Amana Heritage Society executive director, talked about the day's highs and lows adding, "From our perspective, it seemed that the riders were all having fun and trying to 'figure out' what Amana was. I had one man early in the day, about 8:30 a.m. at the Festhalle grounds who had me give him a tour of the Festhalle barn, give its communal history and how it became a festival barn. Then, he asked me to tell him about a building he took a

picture of on the wall of the Visitor Center but didn't know where it was. It was the Amana Church Building. He loved the architecture and I told him about it and pointed it out to him and let him know he could visit it because it was as cooling zone. So, overall we had many wonderful people, and although they were hot, they made the best of it."

He added that they served a steady stream of bike riders at the Amana Heritage Society's food and beverage stand at the Festhalle. Childers added that the largest crowd they had was after 1 p.m. when folks stopped to enjoy Becky and the Ivanhoe Dutchmen.

The Amana Heritage Museum and all its sites were open for free on Friday. Dennis Roemig who is a docent at the Amana Heritage Museum showed the slide show presentation on Amana's history to 90 people. They also had a good number of "walk through" number of visitors who didn't stay for the slide presentation but walked through the museum or the grounds, Childers said.

"Most were really focused on just getting to their next stop. RAGBRAI folks are ...willing to endure heat, rain, dust, and the prospect of riding a bike for 100 miles in one day. They are very nimble with their decisions, and many of them stayed only for a short time because they wanted to 'keep moving.'"

Those that did stay told volunteers that they loved Amana. "I heard that many times, 'This is our best stop,' so many told us," said John Zuber, Amana Heritage Society volunteer.

"I heard so many people say, how nice Amana is – how pretty, how charming," said Elise Heitmann, "You have to think that many will return to see more of Amana."

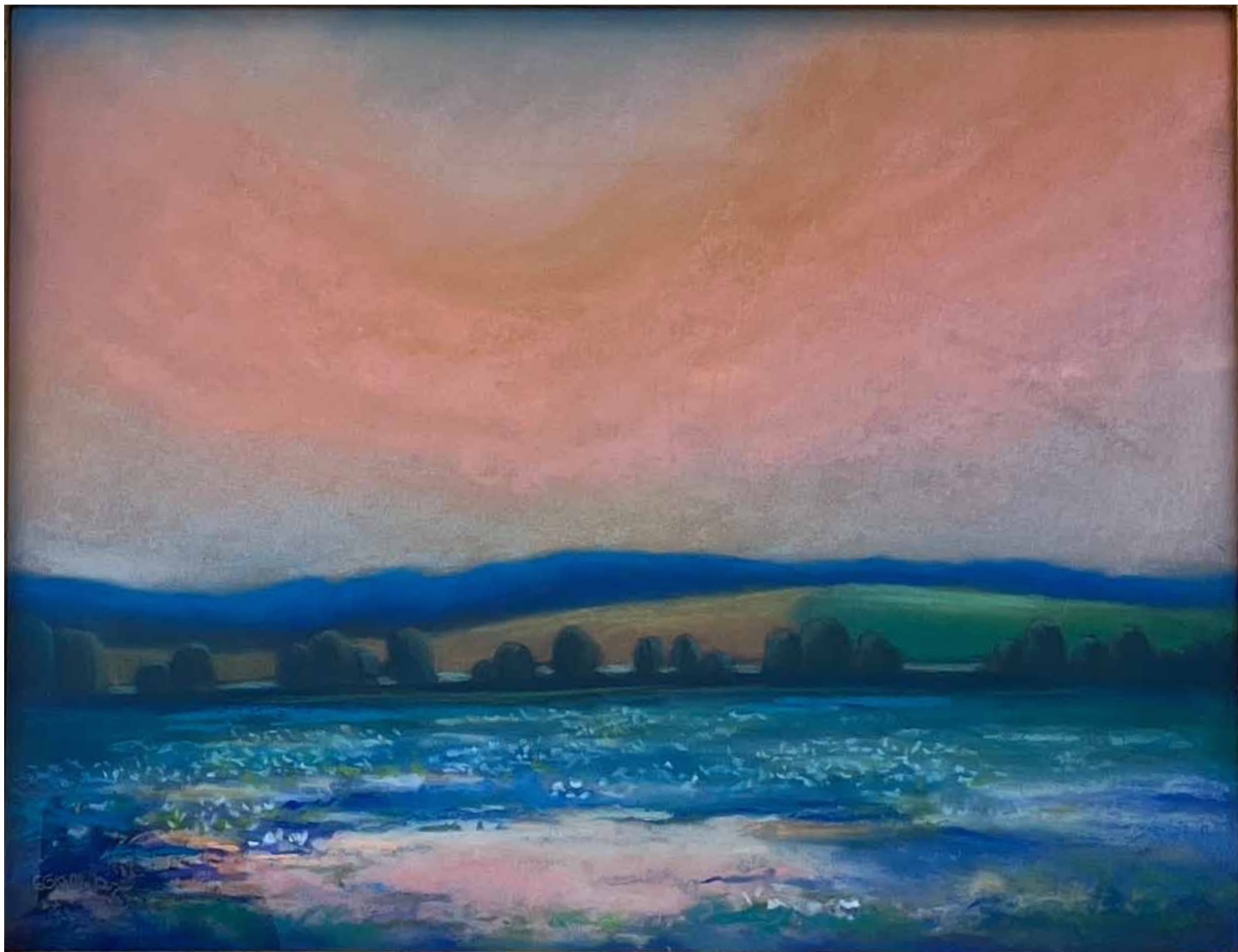
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FOUR WINDS FARM FIELD DAY
